

Dear Friends

In 2014 I said 'Goodbye and God bless you' after being with five of the Parishes since 2009. Well, here I am again! It is with great joy that I have agreed to the Bishop's request to look after the newly formed Matlaske Benefice until the Rev David Longe arrives in October.

It is not a case of 'mixture as before' because things move on, develop and, hopefully grow. We are seven different Parishes, each one has its own identity and we, as a Benefice, must seek to grow together in friendship and in trust. By worshipping together we shall grow in strength. We have a rich variety of liturgy and it is good to experience different forms of service - everything from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer to Common Worship in both traditional and modern language.

On Christmas morning more than seventy adults and about fifteen children came to 'Family Communion' at Baconsthorpe. This is most encouraging - especially for the faithful souls who keep the church running no matter what! There are green shoots of growth and each one of us has a job to do in nurturing - by the warmth of our welcome, by encouraging neighbours to 'Come and see'.

We are lucky to have two Licensed Readers and several retired Clergy who give of their time generously. Support them with your prayers. The Benefice Choir is a joy and enriches our worship - thank you all who enliven our services.

When the magazine reaches you, Lent will be almost upon us. We begin Lent on Ash Wednesday (14th February) with Communion at Saxthorpe at 10am. There will be extra services during Lent on Wednesday evenings at 7pm. A hymn, an address by a visiting Preacher and the evening service of Compline. What is Compline? As I said earlier in this letter 'Come and see' - each Wednesday night service lasts for about forty minutes - and a warm welcome awaits you.

Please remember that I'm here for you and remember me in your prayers.

The sixties band with their Beatles renditions and other melodic inclusions


Bringing the evening of merrymaking to a successful, and reluctant conclusion,




Saxthorpe with Corpusty

Recipe of the Month

All-in-One Chocolate Cake

This recipe makes a really nice textured and moist cake. I have in the past substituted some gluten free flour for half of the 4oz required, or you could try using all gluten-free -I don't see why it would not work.

To make a deeper cake please double the recipe, but also make sure your tins are deep enough, and don't forget to grease and flour well.

To make one 8-inch cake

100g / 4oz fine caster sugar 100g / 40z butter or good quality margarine 100g / 4oz self-raising flour 1 tablespoon cocoa (unsweetened) (Bourneville is good quality) Half heaped teaspoon baking powder 2 eggs

Blend all ingredients together until well mixed (do not over mix)

If the mix seems too dry (it should just drop off your spoon) add a little milk.

Bake in pre-heated oven at 180c / 350f / gas mark 4 for 30 mins until well risen and springy to the touch. Paul Boast

Happy New Year to you all! So far (touch wood) we've escaped any damaging snow, just significant rainfall. However, now is the time to wrap-up warm and prune your wisteria, cutting back summer side shoots to two to three buds.

While you have your secateurs to hand, cut back shrubs such as Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow). These are both grown for their colourful winter stems, but they will need cutting down right to the base. This treatment promotes vibrant new growth that isn't woody, so helps prepare for a really good display next winter. Lastly, winter flowering shrubs such Mahonia and Viburnum x bodnantense will need the tops taking out after they have flowered.

If you are tired of looking at one lonely clump of snowdrops, then seize the moment: be brave, and lift them just after they have flowered (in the green). Separate them into smaller clumps - odd numbers always look better in the garden than even numbers. Now, if you can face it, is a good time to move any small trees and shrubs whilst they are thoroughly dormant. But whilst they might be dormant do not neglect to water them back in properly.

Good housekeeping in the greenhouse will pay off huge dividends when it finally warms up, so take the time to properly clean out all your pots and seed trays, attempting to recycle any that are beyond their best. Now you've earnt that warm cup of tea and cosy armchair by the fire with a stack of seed catalogues...dream on!

Many Thanks for all your questions! Peter Enis has asked when is a good time to harvest hazel for garden structural supports. In my opinion I would harvest it now, because the later you leave it, the greener it will get and the quicker it will shed its bark and deteriorate.

Nature Watch - Red Kites



Since moving to Matlaske I have been pleased to see the red kites on numerous occasions swooping over the land as they glide and fly right over our house. You don't often see them in still and quiet weather as they like to fly with the wind under their large wings as they then don't have to expend too much energy.

Their effortless flight resembles that of the kites that are flown by many enthusiasts today. Close up, the raptor is marked beautifully, and when the sun shines upon them it shows striking colours – mainly golden and with the rich, red-brown that gives it its name.

The red kite is mainly a scavenger, only sometimes catching its own prey. It mainly feeds on road kill and animals such as rabbits, sheep and other carrion that have succumbed especially to the cold winter months.

Red kite nests can often contain paper, fabric and even soft toys, so that it's a cosy nest for its young: as Shakespeare wrote in *A Winter's Tale*, 'When the Kite builds, look to lesser linen'.

After being persecuted in the late 18th century, they are doing well now, and their numbers have increased dramatically since 1992, when feeding stations especially in Wales were introduced.

You can always recognise a kite because of its long slender wings often set at angles at the knuckle and also the classic forked tail. Its call is like a shrill mewing "weeou-weeou".

One issue that has come to light in recent months is that as these raptors are mainly scavengers, like the buzzard, many are being killed now because farmers are putting out poisoned bait to kill foxes and other predators that threaten their livestock. If not checked this could threaten their survival. We must manage at all costs the preservation of this beautiful bird; long may it soar over our homelands!
