

Letter from the Rector - Revd Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

Dear All

I am often asked: "what is the point of church? Surely it is so out of touch... it's irrelevant". Sometimes I am told the church is a cult or a sect (it is neither if one accepts the mainstream definitions of these words).

Such comments are part of the territory of being a parish priest, and while I disagree with them, I understand their origin. The church can be perceived as wrapped in caring for its ancient buildings, in a muddle over sex, and fighting over the Bible and the myriad of books that it contains - poetry, history, letters and mystical writing (I do recommend reading the Song of Solomon).

The problem is that these issues detract from what the church is really about: showing through action and prayer

the love that was shown to us by this extraordinary figure Jesus Christ. It is the love of Christ for all that is the focus; everything else needs to be measured by this. The question is not whether it's relevant; the question is: "does the church show the love of Christ in all it does?". This is the marker by which it should be measured.

Early on in Lock-down, the church in the Benefice made two decisions:

First, we would ensure - to the very best of our ability - that with the Parish Councils we would care for all those in our community as best we can. The aim was that no one would be left wanting – all could access shopping, prescriptions, or a friendly voice if they were lonely. I pray that all who needed help received it. From what I understand we succeeded in this because of the incredible and selfless work of volunteers.

Second, we felt that we had to in some way provide some worship. With the help of some amazing individuals in the community a virtual service was born, with a virtual choir. This led to over a 100 people from the Benefice participating in the service, whether singing, reading, preaching or leading the prayers. The challenge was, and to a greater extent we succeeded, that we would not have the same person read twice.

Lock-down has eased, and we are all nervous about what the next step may be. Whatever the next step is, it is clear to me that we are a community (or 7 communities) that know how to care for each other. We knew it instinctively before lock-down and put it into action these last months. This should give us confidence that we will survive.

And as for the church: whatever the comments (and whatever our mistakes, for which I apologise for I know we all fall short of the mark) we will continue to serve, and through this service radiate the love of God through Jesus Christ. For that is our raison-d'être.

I continue to keep the Benefice, and all who pass through, and work in this corner of God's creation in my prayers, day-by-day.

Village Hall News

As I constantly tell people that all the money we raise goes towards maintaining and improving the hall, here is a list of what we have done over the last eight years:

The main hall ceiling completely re-insulated and redecorated, store room re-floored, ceiling reinsulated, a new double glazed window and additional shelving. Surround sound, PA system, projector camera, screen and blackout blinds in the hall. In the kitchen, new commercial microwave and dishwasher, refrigerated drinks cupboard and deep freeze, Rangemaster oven, kitchen hatch, radiator, storage waste bin cupboard, new boiler and extra worktops installed. Toilets reconfigured and redecorated, new flooring in passageways, toilets and kitchen. Ten new metal drinks tables and a custom-made tombola box. During Covid closure we have redecorated the hall, kitchen and passageways, as well as having external re-pointing work and internal plastering completed. In total these works have cost over £60,000.

Lock Down Down Under

Bridget and I set off on a six-week visit to New Zealand financed by our four children. After a brief recovery from jet-lag and a tour of the South Island we heard of the impending lock-down, while still travelling. Luckily, with two or three days to spare, Jen, our daughter, got accommodation for us via Facebook with a hockey friend of hers who had an empty AirBnB.

The first active case in NZ was on February 28^{th} . By March 19^{th} the borders were closed to all bar NZ residents (with 14-day self-isolation). Then, two days later, a four-tier lock-down was imposed.

What was allowed: Exercise for one hour no more than five km from home base; essential shopping for food, medicine, etc; one person per household 'bubble' as the designated shopper. Exhortations to wash hands etc. on TV (not quite as bad as US TV). Grateful for Netflix!

Ubiquitous hand sanitiser at shops with screens erected for the protection of staff and customers, with most people being respectful of two-metre distancing. Police had occasionally to persuade people to obey the lock-down and the cells were sometimes used. A government minister was subjected to the ire of Jacinda Ardern (PM) and was demoted (he would have been sacked had his role in government not been crucial in the emergency).

Teddy bears and other soft toys started appearing at windows to brighten up the lives of the many children (and adults). We like to think we were the trend setters in this as our granddaughter's 'Power Ted' had been given the task of protecting Bridget on our travels and he was at the window on the second day of lock-down.

We had a pleasant, leafy park virtually on our doorstep, with nice views of the hills to the south of Christchurch. There was also a small park nearby and a riverside walk. We count ourselves very lucky both in our accommodation and as the care home close to us had several Covid related deaths.

NZ is a lovely cosmopolitan country and the Kiwis are an open and friendly lot with few exceptions. It is a country well worth visiting, when it becomes possible!

They were generous in opening their homes to young travellers in the lurch (no job, no accommodation). Many Kiwis themselves however were hit very hard financially! 20% of their GDP comes from Tourism and there were about 100,000 tourists in the country when lock-down began. We got back home four months later than planned!

Thank you too to all those who helped organise the event especially Nick Fulford who was the brainchild behind it.



Doing a Harvest - Part One

The fith in a series of recollections by Arthur Pentney



One of the biggest changes seen in my lifetime has been in agriculture. My friend David Y summed it up, recalling that in 1955 when he was in the harvest field leading a horse-drawn wagon, hollering "Holdgee!" ('Hold', for the men on the wagon to hold tight, and 'Gee', for the horses to gee up), whereas today, the whole operation is carried out by one combine with the operator doing virtually nothing as the machine is being guided by satellite navigation – quite a change!

As the harvest in those earlier years was very labour intensive, it was inevitable that children did their bit to help out. The long August break from school was referred to as the 'harvest holiday', and examination of early school registers showed that if the harvest was delayed to (say) September,

then school attendance was rapidly reduced accordingly.

Before the advent of combines, the field was cut by a binder which then tied up the corn into 'shoofs' (sheaves) and threw them into the field. The binder, originally designed for three horses

to pull, was later converted to be drawn by a tractor running on TVO - tractor vaporising oil. The binder could not start its work until the headland (field edges) had been cut by scythe to save the tractor trampling down the corn. To see an experienced operator, usually an older man, using a scythe was a revelation. Properly set up and adjusted, the scythe seemed to make the work look almost effortless.

Next, the binder could move in. As a boy, it was my job to sit on the binder seat making sure that the height of the cutting blade was correct, and that the shoofs were tied up properly. This quite boring job was made lighter by a pocket full of boiled sweets and chewing gum, and the three breaks, dinner, elevenses and fourses, when a drink of cold tea was traditional in these parts. On occasion there was the chance to chase a rabbit when one decided to bolt for cover out of the corn. Chasing one close to the hedge, two of us boys were stung in the backs of our legs by shot from a twelve-bore. Fortunately, because the range was too great or the barrels were



well worn, the shot did not penetrate our skin. No 'health and safety' in those days!

'Shocking up' (stooking) took place as the corn was cut. The shoofs were picked up two at a time and stood in rows to dry off for a few days prior to carting. Shocking could be quite an unpleasant job if the crop was barley. The harn, those sharp hair-like pieces of growth worked their way through your clothing causing nasty irritation, making your arms red and sore.

We hope to move on to carting, stacking, and 'troshing' next time.

The Village Gardener

To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tom<u>orrow</u>



September is a month to relish: August can sometimes feel like summer has stretched itself too thin. But September is or rather can be just glorious... fingers crossed!

There have been noticeable successes and failures in the veg patch this year. Our outdoor tomatoes have sulked and struggled and been complete prima donnas, whilst the cucumbers have discreetly and somewhat secretly supplied us with a fantastic supply. After the success of the pumpkin patch last year, we have moved the sites for the climbing courgettes to the same spot, with

much (hurrah!) increased productivity and lots of scrabbling for yet more recipes with courgettes in them. We used the climbing courgette called Black Forest, which I would highly recommend; they produce lovely courgettes with an almost nutty quality to them. They have also coped well with being in very large pots in the walled garden, the key is just to water lots. This year we put our basil in a different style cold frame with more light coming in at the sides and the difference has been astounding, we have had repeated cuttings from the last two months. The plants have all been strong and vital whilst last year they too sulked and looked miserable.

Now onto the tasks for September. Now is the time to lift onions and leave them to dry out before you store them. If you want to have a supply of winter lettuces this is a good month to set them off in, just tuck them on the end of a row under a cloche, in a few months' time you will be grateful you took the time to do this. In the fruit garden, if you're fortunate enough to have a peach tree you will need to remove all the shoots that produced fruit, this will set you up nicely for next year's crop. The strawberry patch will also need some TLC. If you've gone to the trouble of potting up runners, they will be ready to plant out in a new bed, remove any unwanted runners and hoe and weed well between the plants. We grew two varieties this year: Cambridge Favourite that just romped away aside, whilst the variety Christine dragged its heels. As we have found a variety that works well in our soil....we will be moving Christine to pastures new.

In the border, take time to cut down perennials, but leave as much foliage as possible. Both rambling roses and climbing roses will need their shoots that have flowered removing, it's also worth double checking your bush roses haven't grown any suckers too. Finally, do put supports in for your dahlias, for those all too frequent blustery days!

This month's question is from T Williamson, who asks "My lawn is looking rather sorry for itself, is September a good time to re-seed?" Our answer is yes, it should be the best time of the year as you have the whole of the summer's heat in the ground so germination should be quick, but keep an eye on waterfall and if we have a dry September you might need to get the hose out.


