

Meet the Neighbours



Whenever I meet Michael McMahon I feel ashamed at my lack of Christian spirit. For he does the good deeds today that most of us put off for another day. McMahon and his wife Catherine, Head of St Michael's School in Aylsham, have lived in Plumstead Green since 1987. He came to Norfolk in 1985 to teach English at Gresham's. For years now he has been a freelance journalist, often for *The Spectator*, and an author – the film rights have just been optioned for his book about the extraordinary story of May Savidge who moved her mediaeval hall house, beam by beam and brick by brick, from Hertfordshire to Wells-next-the-Sea.

But it is McMahon's voluntary work that is perhaps more remarkable. After being a visitor at Norwich Prison for 13 years, he was invited to join the chaplaincy team and eventually became the Roman Catholic Chaplain.

More recently McMahon was a founding Trustee of the Cromer & District Food Bank, which now has distribution centres in Sheringham, Holt, Aylsham and North Walsham. In the year to March 2014, the food bank received more than a thousand requests for food from some 630 individuals,

couples and families. Food to feed 2,357 people for three days was issued. One in three were children. At Christmas the kindness of local people enabled around 260 disadvantaged families to receive seasonal treats and all food bank clients were given chocolate eggs at Easter.

It is a scandal that we need food banks and he is surprised at the range of people who end up needing help, McMahon says. They include middle-class people as well as those who exist close to poverty much of the time. Causes of crisis include redundancy, the slow processing of benefit changes for the sick and unemployed, family breakdown, debt, bereavement and homelessness. Only two per cent of clients have been over 65. A significant number need help for mental illness.

Last autumn McMahon was a prime mover in establishing a homeless shelter in the Canaan Christian Centre in Sheringham. In the six months that it was open, thirteen street homeless people were housed and all but one found permanent accommodation. Two had been living in cars; others had been living in tents. Four ex-residents have now got jobs as well as homes. The shelter re-opens in October and will run for at least the following twelve months.





Spring Clean

Spring-cleaning for the Annual Patronal Festival at St Peter's, North Barningham, is harder work than ever this year because of the huge spattering of bird-droppings on every surface (particularly the altar table and the pews) left by a great-tit who became trapped in the church in the late summer of 2014.

Initially it sang to its friends outside and would try to break through the east window. It drank from a flower vase on one of the sills and pounced on any little insect that it saw. Some kind soul put out food for it on the altar table. This seemed a step too far. My husband and I, who look after this redundant church, hung a peanut-holder in a less conspicuous place, and put out a large, shallow dish of water on top of the cupboard beneath the west window, where the bird was able to bathe as well as drink. Whenever we checked, there was always a splashy puddle there.

After a while the great-tit became less active and more silent; was it becoming withdrawn? It certainly came to life for the Advent Carol Service in early December. The music and singing, but most of all the candle-light, entranced it. It kept swooping down to the altar to catch the insects attracted by the flickering flame and was in serious danger of setting itself alight. The congregation paid

more attention to it than to the lessons. Alas! There were no more services after that, and the poor little bird became increasingly miserable, sitting in the highest recesses

of the window and no longer responding to our voices.

One day, towards the end of Lent, it was gone. No sign of a small corpse anywhere: Did it squeeze itself under the door? Did it manage to fly into the bell-tower and from thence make its escape? We will never know. But one thing is certain: it has left an indelible impression behind it.

Consider the welfare of these happy but inquisitive little song-birds (and perhaps that of the church cleaners too). Please close the bird-screen behind you on both the way in and on the way out of the church! Many thanks.

Village Gardeners



The days have been quite sunny but the nights have remained cool so plants probably have not grown quite as quickly as you would have liked. Nevertheless perennials will soon be at their best, and unfortunately taller species like delphiniums can be spoilt by strong winds. A few canes and string put around the plants now will give support. Do not over support as this will spoil the natural beauty of the plant.

Camelias should be pruned now so that the plant keeps it shape and if the shrub has got too big then prune to reduce its size.

My tomatoes have produced two or three trusses and to help the fruit set when there are not many insects and bees about, try tapping the stem of the plant gently. Do not start feeding until the first truss of fruit is set, you can then feed once a week in June with a high potash feed. I always put a few strong smelling tagetes plants in the greenhouse to deter the green and white fly. It does help. Also keep the greenhouse free of weeds as these harbour pests.

This is the time to carry on sowing salads but only sow a few at a time, so you are able to eat them while they are still young. If you love runner beans then sowing a few beans in early June should mean a crop to pick until the frosts.

I also plant a row of early variety of potatoes in June to give lovely new potatoes at the end of the summer.

If you grow winter greens then make sure they are planted this month. To prevent club root, mix a little lime in the hole first before planting. You do not have to lime the whole area, just treat the ground where the plants are going to grow.

Sweet peas need to be cut regularly and remove any dead flowers before they form the seed-pod. Feed generously with a liquid feed to maintain flowering as long as possible. Enjoy the colourful garden.

Nature Notes

It's funny how certain smells, tastes and sounds have the power to stir up long forgotten memories. A particular perfume that I wore whilst pregnant two decades ago can still make

me quite queasy, immediately transporting me back to those glorious morning-sickness filled days!

Similarly, but thankfully more pleasantly, the screaming sound of swifts, conjures up images of childhood holidays by the sea and long sun-filled evenings, filling me with a deep contentment, confirming summer is here.

As happy in urban areas as they are out in the countryside, their scythe-shaped silhouettes and screaming chases fill our skies for a few short weeks from May until early August, when, once again, they depart for the warmth of an African winter. Their brief sojourn coincides with the presence of our winged insects, 100 000 of which a single swift can consume each day.

Catching winged insects, is weather dependent, and like many of our own summer

activities, not always guaranteed. Should the Great British Summer not play ball and halt the parent's feeding frenzy for a few days, all is not lost, for by lowering metabolic rate and temperature, and entering a semiconscious state, the chicks can evade starvation.

Unrelated to the swallows and martins with which we associate them, swifts are actually part of the same order as

hummingbirds - the Apodiformes - sharing the same ability to rotate their wings for increased manoeuvrability. Literally meaning footless, birds in this order have small toes and short legs so limited in function that for generations many erroneously believed them not to exist at all in swifts.

Whilst seldom seen on the ground, forward and backward facing toes have earned swifts the German name mauersegler or wall glider, for they are proficient in clinging to the vertical surfaces on which they build their nests from saliva mixed with airborne material caught in flight.

Cooping up nesting material is just one of the swift's many flying skills, for they mate, eat, drink and, by shutting down half their brain at a time and using the alert half only, even sleep on the wing. Indeed only ever really landing to rear their young, the average swift clocks up an astounding 3 million miles over the course of its lifetime - the equivalent of circumnavigating the Earth 120 times and surely enough air-miles to rival
