Nature Watch - The Hedgehog



One morning, during early March, I decided to do a little tidying-up in my garden. Noticing a pile of rotting leaves that lay trapped between a red-hot poker plant and the garden wall, I set about trying to remove them. Imagine my surprise when on removing the last few leaves, I discovered a hibernating hedgehog. Although I have been lucky enough to see hedgehogs in my garden on numerous occasions in the past, I have never

come across one hibernating before. Not wishing to disturb it from its long winter slumber, I quickly covered it up again. All the leaves were absolutely sodden, so I decided to place a small plastic carrier-bag over the top in the hope that its bedding would soon dry out. From what I could see of the hedgehog, for it lay half buried in the soil, it appeared to be quite small, and I took it to be one of last year's young. Hopefully it will survive its hibernation, for I look forward to watching it trundling across my lawn in the coming summer evenings.

Hedgehogs have a surprisingly varied diet. Of course we all know that they are the gardener's friend, eating slugs, worms and other harmful insects, but they will also eat frogs and toads, birds' eggs, carrion, various berries and even mushrooms.

In common with most British wildlife, their numbers are gradually declining. No doubt their biggest threat is from the increasing road traffic, for one often sees them squashed by the roadside. Another threat comes from the use of slug-pellets in the garden. This poison builds up over time in their bodies and they die a slow lingering death. Although they are good swimmers, they have often been known to drown in garden ponds, especially if the pond is steep-sided and they have no way of climbing out.

Hedgehogs roam over quite a large area each night, so please make sure you leave a small gap, either in or under your garden fence if you wish to see this delightful creature bumbling along on his nightly patrol.

March 29th. Good news! On checking on the hedgehog for the first time this morning, I was delighted to find that he had woken from his hibernation.



A Night to Remember



Suffolk Field Hedge Renovation Project – We've Done It!



On the Saturday before Easter we planted all of the 1050 mixed species hedge plants - the final one went in at about 5pm!

We have now spent five Saturday mornings, one Saturday full day, and several evenings converting the wild, rotted, unstable and unsightly incomplete boundary with the beginnings of a new, mixed species hedge which will provide everyone with a pleasant pathway, complete with clearly marked gaps to allow access to and from the field, and abounding with wildlife and birdlife.


This is only the start – the next step is to shred/chip all the old useless scrub that was removed before planting could start, and we are aiming to complete this in the next couple of weeks. The woodchips will be used to cover the path, thus preventing it from becoming a muddy overgrown passageway

that it used to be, in addition to providing better grip when descending to, or ascending from, Horseshoe Lane.

It is thanks to a small group of volunteers who have worked nearly every weekend that we have succeeded with this important project so many thanks are due to all who helped make it a success.

In view of all the hard work put into this, I trust that everyone who uses the path will take great care not to disturb the plants and use only the clearly marked gaps for access to and from the field.

We'll be updating everyone on progress as the hedge takes shape, so watch this space.



CREAMED FRESH ASPARAGUS SOUP WITH LEMON CIABBATA BREAD

A delicious, economical way of using seasonal asparagus


Serves 6

1½lb asparagus
2 onions - sliced
1 oz butter
2½ pts vegetable stock
5 fl oz single cream
salt and freshly ground black pepper

- 1 whole ciabbatta loaf (sliced)
- l lemon
- 3 oz butter soft

Method

- 1. Cut the tender tips of the asparagus and simmer in a little boiling water for four minutes. Drain and set aside for garnishing.
- 2. Cut up the stalks into even sized bits.
- 3. Fry the onion in the 1 oz of butter in a covered pan for five minutes without browning. Then add the asparagus and cook for a further five ten minutes till soft.
- 4. Stir in the stock and simmer for thirty minutes until the asparagus and onion are very tender.
- 5. Liquidise the soup, add the cream, season to taste and garnish with the reheated asparagus tips, and perhaps a swirl of cream.
- 6. For the bread, finely grate the lemon zest and mix with the butter, now spread onto the bread slices, heat in the oven/aga (like garlic bread) and serve alongside the soup.





Meet the Neighbours - Paddy Seligman



OBE, JP, DL - the letters after her name tell only a fraction of what Paddy Seligman does for good causes. JP because she was a magistrate in London and Norfolk for 31 years, only retiring in 2011; DL because she has been a Deputy Lieutenant of Norfolk since 2003 and, among the other duties of the post assisting the Lord-Lieutenant, taken charge during visits to Norfolk by the Princess Royal and Prince Andrew; OBE in recognition of so much voluntary work and public service. Yet as she approaches 75 Mrs Seligman, who lives in Wolterton with her husband Anthony and black labrador Tipple, is still working as hard as ever.

She is a Mental Health Hospital Manager at the secure hospitals at Cawston Park, Huntercombe and Mundesley, where she helps to decide whether mental health patients who don't wish to be detained should be discharged. She was a visitor at four prisons. She is chairman of the Ecumenical Criminal Justice Forum, a network set up by the Bishop of Lynn to engage with criminal justice issues from a Christian perspective. She is a lay canon of Norwich Cathedral, were she enjoys meeting newly ordained priests, and is on the PCC at Wolterton. She is an ambassador for the Girl Guides.

Her main activity now is as chairman of the Eastern Daily Press We Care 2000 Appeal set up in 1998. It has now raised nearly £2 million and the interest has allowed £750,000 to be given to help people caring for sick or disabled relatives - short respite breaks or a washing machine, for instance, or a laptop, hairdresser, bicycle or swimming pool membership. She finds it humbling when she talks to the carers - there are about 100,000 in Norfolk. They are heroic people with modest requests, she says. Applicants are referred by doctors or social workers. She is always happy to give talks to help raise funds.

If all this suggests a rather earnest, goody-goody person, nothing could be further from the truth. Mrs Seligman radiates good humour and our interview was punctuated by laughter - her favourite film is Mamma Mia. Google Paddy Seligman and all the pictures show her with a smile on her face. She even has time for a recreation: duplicate bridge.
