Barningham Park Lambs



Lambing started slowly on March 20th, but by the first weekend of April we were all working around the clock! The weather at this stage was particularly good for new born lambs. Lambs were being born every few minutes and the individual pens in the shed were soon full each day.

In the pens the lambs must take in a full dose of colostrum from the ewe (the ewe's first milk which is rich in antibodies) within the first six hours of life. Without this they cannot survive, so we monitor this carefully. If all is well, the following day a rubber ring is put on their tail and the male lambs are also castrated by the same method.

The lambs then go into nursery yards (usually eight ewes with their lambs) for 24 hours to allow them time to adjust to finding their mothers before being taken and released into Barningham Park.

The Easter Passion

I have just walked in the woods along the railway line in Holt where I am living temporarily and discovering new pathways. There are yellow carpets of the lesser celandine (a small star shaped yellow flower for those not familiar with the name), interspersed with an occasional bluebell. It is the beginning of Holy Week as I write, and by the time this reaches the Church & Village News, the bluebells will be both prolific and enchanting. The Easter Passion and its sorrow and hopeful salvation will be a powerful memory which we will return to throughout the year, as we grow in theological and spiritual understanding. Easter will come again just like the bluebells and I for one will never tire of their beauty or the meaning of the Easter Passion.

One of the few benefits of not living in our stunning Seven Churches (or is it now called the Matlaske Benefice?) has been the opportunity to worship in different surrounding churches. Yesterday for instance, was an ecumenical procession of the palms with Anglicans, Methodists and Roman Catholics in Blakeney on a very hot and appropriately sunny Biblical day. The service in the parish church included a white pony or colt clip-clopping around the church with a young and accomplished rider bringing to life the Palm Sunday Gospel reading. Last night too, there was a contemplative prayer service of silence, candle lit and a calm and quiet beginning to a busy week of Easter liturgy and their complexities. I am hopeful that when our new priest arrives, there will be opportunities for us all to explore and experience different styles of worship without losing those styles which we hold so dear and sustain us.

Some readers may be aware, that I have been in training as a lay minister these last two years and hope to be licensed in the Cathedral this autumn. I look forward to our new incumbent being prayerfully selected and the opportunity to come together to explore and deepen our love and understanding of The Father, under her or his guidance.

Finally, this May we move through Easter time towards Ascension Day on the 25th, when Jesus ascended into heaven, 40 earthly days after the Resurrection. As you wander amongst the bluebells and the sweet smelling purple and white lilac of our woods, hedgerows and gardens, I leave you with this New Testament extract to ponder:

For God, who said "Let light shine out of darkness" made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. (2 Corinthians 4:6)

Odilia Stasi



It is with sadness we learn of the recent death in Italy of Odilia Stasi. Nick Stasi was a prisoner of war here and grew to love the village so much he eventually settled in Baconsthorpe and in time brought his 18-year-old bride Odilia to live here. They had three children, Peter, Bruno and Catherine. Many will remember Odilia and Nick, in the early 60s they bought The Stores (at a time when Baconsthorpe boasted 3 shops!). The building had previously been badly damaged by fire, so they set about restoring the building and re-opened this very successful business. Later on, they also purchased the adjacent Reading Room, turning it into a Fish & Chip Shop with an upstairs flat. Folk would come from far and wide to sample their delicious fare. In 1984 Nick's health began to fail so the Fish & Chip Shop closed and was converted into housing. The grocery shop was briefly rented out, but eventually this too closed. In December 1988, while on

holiday at their home in Italy, Nick sadly passed away. Odilia remained in Baconsthorpe for many years, keeping herself busy as a foster carer and welcoming many overseas students to her home. Catherine married an Italian and settled in Italy, so when Odilia's health deteriorated she remained in Italy being cared for by Catherine and her family. Her funeral mass was held at St Joseph's Church in Sheringham on 10th April. Our condolences go to Peter, Bruno and Catherine.

APRICOT BARBECUE GLAZE

Thinking of summer barbecues? Here is an accompaniment to go with your favourite grills

Suitable for chicken, lamb and pork.

Ingredients

2 large apricots or 6 oz apricot puree or dried apricots

- 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar
- 2 fl oz Worcestershire sauce
- 2 fl oz light soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger
- I large teaspoon ginger powder
- I clove crushed garlic
- 2 tablespoons tomato puree
- a few drops tabasco sauce
- fresh crushed black pepper

Method

- 1. Heat the apricot with a little water if using dried or fresh apricots, simmer for a few minutes, then add all other ingredients liquidise
- in a food processor till a puree is obtained.
- 2. Spread the glaze onto your chosen items and grill/barbecue
- 3. Any glaze left over should be mixed with a glass of white wine, heat up so as to give an extra sauce to go with meat.

Coffee & Gossip - Hempstead Village Hall



Coffee & Gossip occurs once a month in Hempstead Village Hall except for every August when it has a holiday at Ash Tree Farm, Baconsthorpe.

In 2011 Ian and Su Summers were in Salthouse and saw Coffee & Gossip advertised at their village hall and decided that it
