#### Dear All

David

The church is often criticised for putting its nose into politics; sometimes such an accusation is accurate and sometimes not. The church must never be silent in the face of injustice and it has inspired many to work at great personal cost to ensure there is justice, such as William Wilberforce in banning the slave trade, Martin Luther King and the Civil Rights Movement, or Archbishop Desmond Tutu's pivotal role to end the injustice of apartheid.

These individuals show Christianity at its best, by pointing to a way of life that models and embodies the Common Good, justice, fairness and leads individuals

and communities to live in ways that allow all to reach their potential (which is always far more than we can imagine).

By the time this letter is read, a new Prime Minister may have been appointed, or will be so shortly, following an election by Conservative Party members. Over the last few weeks I have become intrigued by those who have put forward for the most difficult job in the country.

Rarely should the church say whom one should vote for, but I do think the church has a role to point to the qualities it believes a leader should exhibit. Indeed, the Bible has quite a lot to say on the subject.

St Paul, in his first letter to Timothy (cf.3.2-7), writes about Bishops noting that they should be "above reproach, monogamous, temperate, sensible, respectable, hospitable, an apt teacher, not a drunkard, nor violent but gentle not quarrelsome and not avaricious" and neither must they be conceited. His final comment is interesting: the Bishop "must be well thought of by outsiders".

Reflecting on the qualities of a king, the writer of Proverbs observes that "inspired decisions are on the lips of kings, whose mouth does not sin in judgment" (16.10).

Temperance, inspiration and wisdom are attributes difficult to find in one human being. Let alone finding a leader who can hold their own position with integrity, as well as appealing to those who hold different faiths, creeds and political opinions.

The Coptic Pope is selected in an interesting way. After fasting and prayer, three names are selected, placed in a hat and a child is called forward and asked to pick the name of the next Pope from a hat. The reason for this is simple: Copts want to be guided by God and Jesus said that to enter the kingdom of heaven we must become like children. In truth, we often see the work of God more clearly in young children than in adults.

Whoever our new Prime Minister is (it is unlikely to be a Bishop!), I pray they may exhibit many if not all and more of these qualities; qualities that inspire, shape and create communities where divisions are overcome, the Common Good upheld and ways of living are pursued which are generous and life-giving to all.

# **Barningham Winter**

The season of Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme visits is back, along with the seasonal month's rain in a day. There have been many disconsolate bands of drowned-rat teenagers trudging the lanes. St Peter's, North Barningham is a way mark for many, a stop for a snack and shelter from the rain. Many years of experience show a pattern. The majority of the Duke of Edinburgh Award visitors are thoughtful and treat the church with respect, but each season there is behaviour which should disqualify for an award: a litter of used tissues round the

churchyard, half-eaten sandwiches in the pews, doors left open to let in the birds. They have, in the past, torn the handle off our yellow cleaning bucket to convert it into a dustbin (left prominently in the porch).

This season brought a new variant. The crucifix and two ceramic candlesticks on the altar table had been inverted and stood on their heads. Outside, a large stone cross marking a grave had been inverted in the same way. This would have needed considerable strength to lift and stand on its head as it had been lying flat on the ground since escaped sheep pushed it over last year. Our yellow bucket, once more the subject of their attention, had been kicked – or thrown – into the top of a high blackthorn hedge and it was a struggle to retrieve it.

Of course, this may not have been a Duke of Edinburgh Award party. There was no signature in the Visitors' Book. It would be interesting to know whether other churches in this Benefice received similar visitors.


## Children's Holiday Club



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# **Prawn Skewers**

150g fresh basil leaves 1 clove garlic chopped 40g grated Parmigiano Reggiano 3 tbsp olive oil 30 raw jumbo prawns salt and pepper to season 6 wooden skewers

Rural Music Schools Association 21<sup>ST</sup> BIRTHDAY FESTIVAL, The Royal Albert Hall, Sat., Nov., 18<sup>TH</sup> 1950

With which is incorporated "Making Music" Nº 14 (Autumn 1950)

The above Association was most popular in our area in the late 40s and early 50s. Does anyone now remember it?

Consisting here mainly of female vocalists from Baconsthorpe and Plumstead, the association was in fact countrywide, having grown substantially since its founding in 1929. The director for Norfolk was Sidney Twemlow who was based at the Artillery Drill Hall, All Saints Green, Norwich.

As befits its name, many of the songs reflected its country nature. Some still remembered today are *The Cuckoo*, *The Turtle Dove*, *Spring Comes Laughing* and Ralph Vaughan Williams's *Linden Lea*, evoking memories of an English countryside, now alas lost forever. Sacred music was also included in the repertoire; *Handel's Messiah* and J S Bach's chorale *Jesu*, *Joy* 

of Mans Desiring, the latter a difficult piece to accompany, I should imagine, where the vocals have to come in at precisely the correct time.

Concerts were occasionally given to members of the public; one took place at Norwich Castle Museum, another was at the Royal Albert Hall in 1950, attended by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth (later Queen Mother) to celebrate the Association's 21<sup>st</sup> birthday. The programme for this event showed Norfolk to be well represented with participants from Attleborough, Beaconsthorpe (sic), Cromer, Diss, Garbaldisham, Holt, North Lopham, Plumstead, Sprowston, Swaffham and Walsingham.

Her Majesty, in a letter from her private secretary to the chairman of the Association, said how much she enjoyed the concert, that it was a wonderful tribute to the work of the Association, and she asked for her congratulations to be conveyed to all those who took part.

Perhaps some others out there still have their memories of this Association which certainly gave enjoyment to many, the writer's mother included.

Beautiful July, when hopefully we can take time out to view and savour the fruition of all our hard work - if the weather will allow us to! What a contrast to last year when we had the never-ending drought. All our water butts here have regularly overflowed in June, when last year they were empty from the middle June onwards. Extraordinary weather - and more than a little unnerving.

We may have reached the height of the gardening season but there are still plenty of tasks to keep up with. First off is a cautionary tale! I have been training a series of small-leaf lime trees into a pollarded border, but sadly I had neglected to check my tree supports in the very unseasonal strong winds we had at the start of June and because they had a full canopy of leaves, they incurred much more wind damage than would have been expected. Absolutely gutting. It's worth taking a turn round the garden to check all your climbers and young trees have enough support to keep happy in these unusual weather conditions.

Now to the border: keep on top of your dead-heading roses, and use it as a nice excuse to have a moment in the garden. Our roses have been superb this year and I am reminded of my motherin-law's words (a most knowledgeable gardener) who believes that roses do particularly well the following year after a very hot summer. Do feel free to contradict me on that one!

Now off to the veg patch to keep on top of the weeds: do remember the hoe is your best friend at this time of year. Keep an eye on peas and beans so you can pick them nice and young rather than depressingly large and past their prime. Make sure you keep your tomatoes, chillis and peppers well-watered and well fed. This year we appear to be battling a huge amount of slugs and I have been given a really revolting sounding garlic recipe to spray in the greenhouse to ward them off... I will report back! Do you have any tried and tested methods? I would be most interested to hear!

Great question this month from Keith Cotgrove, who says, "The leaves on my swede are being eaten. They are next to my turnips that have no damage. My question is, will the root still grow well or do I need to get rid of whatever is decimating the leaves?" Well, Keith, that's an interesting one! Firstly, you do need to get rid of whatever is eating them if it's either flea beetle or cabbage root fly, as both can affect the roots. If your crop is too far gone, I would reset and cover with a fine mesh to ensure it doesn't happen again...it's curious why they haven't gone for the turnips...keep me posted on that one!

## Meet the Neighbours Andrew Chevallier from Edgefield



Andrew is an internationally recognised medical herbalist who lives in Edgefield. As a medical herbalist he was trained in medical sciences and diagnostic skills and sees patients in roughly the same way as a GP. Using a holistic approach to treatment, herbalists typically prescribe a range of plant medicines and make recommendations on diet, exercise, rest and a positive mental attitude to help patients on the path back to good health. Herbs can be used to treat acute and chronic problems – helping bones and tissues to knit back together after trauma, restoring the health of the gut, supporting the heart and circulation and reducing joint pain to mention only a very few.

Andrew worked for a housing association and taught creative writing to fund his herbalist training. Once he had obtained his qualification he worked in an NHS-funded complementary health clinic in North London. Andrew then went on to become a Senior Lecturer at Middlesex University where he was involved in creating the first BSc (Hons) Herbal Medicine course in Europe. He has also been president of the National Institute of Medical Herbalists.

Andrew's work has taken him abroad. Whilst at the Middlesex University he went on a trip to China and saw how traditional medicine (including herbal treatments and acupuncture) sit side by side with modern medicine, with pharmacies dispensing herbs and medicines. He led a conference in Zimbabwe in 2006. At the time Zimbabwe had no functioning health care system, the people could not afford medicines and were growing all of the vegetables and herbs that they ate. The conference produced a booklet to educate people on which herbs and plants could be used as remedies.

With more than thirty years of experience in practice, Andrew has written nine books (some of which have been translated into other languages) including the Doreen Kindersley *Encyclopaedia* of *Herbal Medicine* now in its third edition.

At his home in Edgefield (where he has lived for twelve years) Andrew has an organic herb garden and a dispensary. Now working part-time, he treats patients in the Holt Holistic Centre and the Complementary Health Care Centre in Norwich. The picture shows Andrew surrounded by the tinctures in his dispensary.
