

The first aircraft to be seen in our area landed at Barningham Hall circa 1912. This fact is known as the writer's father, together with his friend Stephen Sewell, 'bunked off' from Baconsthorpe School and ran all the way to Barningham Park to look at this new-fangled flying machine. Both boys were good runners, but not quick enough to evade the attention of the then Headmaster, the tyrannical William 'Billy' Crary, who handed out a beating to both boys as punishment for their absence.

At this late date, we can only surmise as to the identity of the pilot and his aircraft, but possibly it was flown by Bentfield Charles Hucks. Hucks was a pioneer aviator at the time, and gave exhibition flights in his Bleriot monoplane all over the country. He was also famous for being the first British pilot both to fly inverted and also to loop the loop. The accompanying photograph is famous as it shows the very first powered flight over Norfolk, with Hucks and the Bleriot flying quite low, thereby providing a wonderful achievement for that early photographer of the time.

The war of 1914-1918 soon made the Bleriot obsolete, as technology rapidly advanced and turned aircraft from a harmless curiosity for children to look at into efficient killing machines. Hucks was to join the Royal Flying Corps in 1914, but sadly did not live to see the end of that conflict. He died just 4 days before the end of hostilities due to pneumonia following Spanish 'flu. He was 34 years of age.

Dear All

On 9th November if anyone had looked into Norwich Cathedral, they would have been a bit surprised. Bishop Graham Usher was 'enthroned' as the new Bishop of Norwich. As I watched him climb the steep steps to the throne at the end of the Cathedral, I imagined that his legs must have turned to jelly as he realised the task before him.



When he arrived at the Cathedral, the door was closed and he had knock to be allowed entry by the Dean. He was then licensed (a formal legal declaration) before he preached, and then led up the nave and asked to kneel as he was robed in incredible green vestments.

For me, beyond the inevitable pomp, three things stood out; three messages that I felt we all should be reminded of. They are messages that we will hear again and again over the Christmas period as we listen to those familiar stories of old, reminding us of the incredible gift of love revealed in the child born in a manager. The first message was buried deep in a hymn:

Praise to Christ, who feeds the hungry, Frees the captive, finds the lost, Heals the sick, up-sets religion, Fearless both of fate and cost.

The second message caught us off guard. Half way through the service, down the nave came a troop of dancers. Not any sort of dancers, but a fully integrated and inclusive group, ranging from the old to the young, from the professional to the amateur, from the disabled to the able-bodied. They pirouetted and turned with such grace, that we were entranced and transported to a different place. This I felt was surely a sign of what we should be as a community - seeing and knowing no barriers and finding harmony and grace to live in peace with one another.

The third message was a challenge. The Bishop walked down those steep steps and crouched down as three children approached him. They dared him – would he dare to walk into God's future? Would he dare to lead us in new paths? And would he, with God, help us accomplish more than we can imagine?

The Christmas message is daring. It dares us to imagine God revealed as a child born in a cave into a broken world; it dares us to hope for a future that is far better than we can imagine. Above all, it dares us to love, to love those who challenge us, those who are different, those on the margins, those who are sick, those who are lost, those in prison. It dares us to love all. So, I pray that we hear afresh the message of the Prince of Peace who urges us to feed the hungry, free the captives, find the lost, heal the sick, and up-set religion so that the love of God may truly abound.

May you have a blessed Christmas David

Aldborough Village Care: New Drivers Sought



There are observations of events within living memory too. Recipe of the Month - Christmas Pavolva

6 large egg whites 350g caster sugar 600ml double cream 1tsp vanilla bean paste 200g strawberries quartered 300g raspberries 200g blueberries 50g pomegranate seeds Mint leaves and icing sugar to decorate

Preheat oven to 160c/140c fan.

Line a baking sheet with baking parchment and draw a 30cm circle on the paper and a 15cm circle inside that.

Place the egg whites in a large bowl and whisk with an electric whisk until stiff. Gradually add the caster sugar a little at a time and whisk on high speed until stiff and glossy.

Spoon the mixture between the two circles on the baking parchment to make a wreath shape. Using a large spoon make a trench in the mixture for the cream and fruit to sit in.

Place in oven and reduce temperature to 140c/120c fan and bake for 1 hour 10 minutes. Turn off the oven and leave pavlova in overnight to dry (do not open door).

To assemble, whisk cream and vanilla paste until just stiff. Carefully transfer pavlova onto a serving plate and spoon the cream into the trench. Arrange the fruit on top of the cream and decorate with mint leaves and a dusting of icing sugar. Marion Shepherd

The Village Gardener To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

As I write December's piece, it is with half an eye on the weather. We seem to have had the most tremendous amount of rain just lately, although after the drought the previous summer we do have a lot of ground to make up. The forecast as it is (am I alone in thinking that the weather forecasting is off beam at the moment?) is for a cold winter. Cold and crisp I feel is good for the garden, cold and soggy less so... or is that just my own preference? It's certainly much more enjoyable to be out on a crisp clear day! Even if the weather is challenging there are always jobs to do; a good attitude to have is a flexible attitude to when you can get certain tasks done, even if you're confined to barracks for a couple of weekends on the trot. If you've pushed on with some indoor work, like clearing out the potting shed and cleaning tools or washing out this year's pots and seed trays, you are still achieving and you won't feel like you've got too behind.

If you can get outside, then I would suggest at having a good go at the leaves, especially if they have fallen in any water you might have or on your lawn. It's a good, warming task on a chilly day, and will leave the garden looking a bit chirpier. We seem have a lot more moss this year, so pay attention to any steps or paths that are over-run – a good stiff broom will sort that out. Double check that all your tree stakes are whole and secure too, it's too sad to lose a tree to a dodgy stake. Do make sure all your outdoor pipes and taps are lagged – it just saves so much time, money and hassle.

There's not a huge amount to do in the veg patch, but I would suggest if you have some tender herbs that you cover them with cloches just to eke a bit more out of them. I would also clear any beds that have finished producing so your decks are clear for the New Year. Finally, do make sure at some point there is a cosy spot by the fire, a pot of tea and a nice big pile of seed catalogues, as half the fun of gardening is planning and dreaming what you want to do next!

This month's question is on the best way to have a safe bonfire. Firstly, do ensure the ground and surrounding area is not too dry. Be vigilant with brambles – they can go up at a terrific rate and can get you in a muddle. Secondly, make sure you have no prickly visitors inside your heap. Hedgehogs are still in decline, so we don't want to add to that. Do pick a still day if you can, one person's satisfying bonfire is another person's ruined wash if the wind is up! Thirdly, do ensure you site your fire well away from trees and overhanging branches, to escape any unnecessary drama!



Meet the Neighbours

Jonathan & Maggie Cooper - Baconsthorpe

Jonathan was born in Baconsthorpe in the 1960s - hence his love of music. He went to Baconsthorpe School and has lived in the village all of his life. When he left school, he went to work at Randall's in North Walsham where he gained a City & Guilds qualification in agricultural and motor engineering. When Randall's bought the Aga franchise in North Walsham Jonathan went to work



there as "lying by the side of an Aga was better than lying underneath a sugar beet harvester"! In 1997 Jonathan became an independent Aga supplier and engineer and 'John The Aga' has become a very familiar face in so many local and some not so local homes.

Jonathan's love of music developed into a part time job and he was the resident DJ at both the Highwayman in Sheringham and the West Runton Pavilion - he played at the very last night of the Pavilion when it closed 1983. He also DJ'd and played the organ at private events including four weddings and a funeral!

Maggie was born and brought up in Heydon. Her father was a farmer and had a haulage company but his real love was horses and donkeys - a passion which was passed onto Maggie who has always had horses and donkeys in her life. Maggie can be seen in the picture with her father, donkey and foal at the farm in Heydon.

Jonathan's father also kept donkeys on what is called 'Donkey Corner' at the end of New Road. The picture shows a donkey and cart at Baconsthorpe Rectory where Jonathan's father, Norman, was giving donkey cart rides at the village fête - Jonathan is in the cart. If you recognise any of the other children in the cart can you let Jonathan know who they are?

In 2012 Jonathan and Maggie moved into Dales House after



very extensive renovations had taken place. Jonathan's father had bought Dales Farm in 1955 with the intention of moving the family into it but it never happened, and the house stood empty for over 60 years, housing only the combine and chickens. They have now nearly completed the dreams of Jonathan's parents at Dales House.
