Dear All

"Hate put me in prison. Love is going to bust me out."

Michael Curry's excellent book, *Love is the Way*, relates the story of Rubin 'Hurricane' Carter. Carter is Rubin's slave name; Hurricane his boxing name.

Curry - the first African-American Presiding Bishop (Archbishop) of the Episcopal Church in the US – at one point uses Carter's story to illustrate that whatever we face we are called in prayer to transcend it. (Christ calls us not to look for that which is transient but that which is eternal (2 Cor 4.18).)

Carter, born in 1937, grew up in Clifton, New Jersey - a segregated society. As a young man he had a stutter which held him back: if someone teased him, he would punch them. Carter became one of the great boxers of the last century. In 1966 however he was wrongly convicted of murder and given a life sentence. Twice he lost appeals.

Lesra Martin, a Brooklyn teenager, didn't learn to read until he was sixteen when visitors to his school offered him extra tuition. One of the first books he read was Carter's *The Sixteenth Round*. Lesra



wrote to Carter and eventually met him in prison. In the movie, *The Hurricane* (1999), the first words Carter says to Lesra are:

"We must transcend the places that hold us."

Lesra took up Carter's cause convincing lawyers to help, and after 5 years of argument, Carter is released. Carter explains that he has never conformed to prison life. He didn't speak to guards and refused the prison clothes, which lead to almost 10 years of solitary confinement. Carter said prison allowed him to find out who he really was, and that he would transcend the walls: "[e]very time I sat down to write, I could rise above the walls of this prison... I could look out... I could see Nelson Mandela in his cell writing... I could see Dostoyevsky... see Victor Hugo, Emile Zola."

At times we all find ourselves hemmed in (I write isolating with COVID), overwhelmed by fear, concern, stress, anxiety, worry. Curry's point, which I agree with, is that love with imagination allows us to ascend, to transcend what we have before us. It takes us to a new place. This is the aim of prayer: to allow God to reveal God's purpose to us; to renew and refresh us. (It is not to get just what we ask for.)

Lent (starting on 2^{nd} March) is a time of self-reflection, discipline and prayer. It is an opportunity to seek afresh the transcendent reality of God, to ascend to perceive God's vision for ourselves and the world around us. Neither Carter nor Lesra appear to profess Christianity, yet Curry makes it clear that the story is one of transcendence bringing hope, bringing freedom.

I commend this book (which is the Benefice's 2022 Lent book), the film, and the Lent Group. With my continued prayers for you all,



Covid Memorial Plaque

At the January meeting of the Parish Council Thomas Courtauld, Deputy Lieutenant of Norfolk representing The Lady Dannatt, HM Lord-Lieutenant of Norfolk presented the Parish with the Covid Memorial Plaque to express appreciation for the collaborative community action taken to support each other during the Covid-19 pandemic. Most, probably all, communities came together in these testing times and many other parishes in Norfolk have been similarly awarded. In Hempstead the immediate action we took was to deliver a leaflet to every house in the village to tell people whom to contact if they needed help of any kind and to appeal for volunteers to give that help. There was an impressive response; a significant number of people quickly came forward to offer help and were able to deal with requests for medication to be collected, for help with shopping and other practical matters. This was all very much appreciated and perhaps just as important people had the reassurance they were not alone in those anxious and worrying times and knew help was at hand if needed. As a small village we should expect to look out for each other and we did. That crisis may have passed and life is returning to a semblance of normality, but we know there are people in the village who live alone, not as active as they once were, without nearby friends and relatives. They may not need much by way of practical help but some might welcome the occasional visit or chat. Now the world is opening up, perhaps those of us who are active and busy widening our horizons could bear that in mind.

Broadland Housing Association Development

Nature Watch - Wild Geese Arthur Pentney



If there is any better sight or sound than skeins of wild geese flying over our villages then I have yet to experience it. The first thing you notice is hearing them from some distance away. Where exactly are they? Look around, and – yes – here they come, two or three skeins all proceeding in the same direction, seeking out fields with sugar beet tops or early emerging corn to consume.

Author Henry Williamson shared this affinity with wild geese: in *The Story of A Norfolk Farm*, he describes their arrival thus: 'Hark, what's that? A strange jangling, honking, cronkling noise, the wild geese are coming in from the sea, this is the coast of the wild geese! Beauty was come again.'

Usually just one goose heads the vee, and no map or sat-nav is needed here: instinct bred over hundreds of years has brought

them from the Arctic wastes of Greenland to provide us here in North Norfolk with this wonderful annual spectacle. Long may it continue!

There are several ponds in our group of parishes that are used by toads, as well as frogs and newts, for breeding. Unlike the other two amphibians, toads are faithful to their birth pond. They migrate up to a mile or more at night during February and March back to this pond to breed.

For some ponds, this makes them particularly vulnerable to road traffic on migration to and from the pond, and they often use roads and tracks as it's easier for them to crawl along these than through thick vegetation. Also, male toads will often sit in roads where they can see around them, waiting for a female to grab and hitch a lift to the pond, where they are in 'pole position' for fertilising her eggs.

There are organised toad patrols by local volunteers to help toads and other amphibians get safely

across roads near breeding ponds at Hempstead and Edgefield. If you'd like to help with these, please see the information under these parishes.

But you can also help by being aware of where toad patrols take place during February and March, watch out for warning signs, and drive carefully near these, to help both the toads and the patrollers (there are also patrols nearby at Selbrigg Pond and North Barningham).

And do please develop 'toad awareness' if you are driving on rural roads at night, especially in February and March, but also any time over the spring and summer, as toads still come out to hunt at night when migration is over.

They're most likely to be out in mild and wet or damp weather. If you drive reasonably slowly and watch the road carefully, you can see them on the road in the car headlights and hopefully avoid them with your wheels.

Not all local ponds with breeding toads have a patrol – please also be especially careful in early spring near Pond Hills, Hempstead and Plumstead Hall Farm up to Baconsthorpe. Thank you for helping our local toads!





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
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The Village Gardener To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

Somewhat belatedly may I wish everyone a Happy New Year! Hoping your start to the year was good. It has certainly been a mixed bag of weather in 2022 kicking off with the warmest New Year's Day I can ever recall; with an element of disbelieve I actually ate my breakfast outside, but still felt no enthusiasm for a New Year's Day dip in the sea despite the ridiculously mild temperatures. Now as I write this we have a stunning and impressive frost, a proper old -school hoar frost that has somewhat tempered my gardening plans today, but that might also be to do with the huge pan of glorious Seville oranges that need attention. It's possibly the perfect combination a wonderfully sharp frost outside and the delightful smell of marmalade making inside... just heavenly! Once I've finished procrastinating with preserves, here are just some of the jobs on my to do list this month! With absolutely no guarantees on what weather we will be landed with at present, I try and have a rolling list of prioritised tasks both inside and out so that everything hopefully gets done. Having

Having a mixture of good weather and bad weather jobs seems to help. There certainly will be a lot of pruning going on, after the huge amount of growth in our hedges last year the plan is to revert back to doing two cuts a year. Last year's hedge cutting seemed relentless because of the sheer volume of growth, so two cuts feels like the right way to go. We had also been quite shocked by just how high the hedges had become in our 'walled garden'; it's curious how these things creep up on you... the lack of light had really affected the growth in some of our raised beds. So this year the plan is to keep the hedges lower and airier in there, which will with any luck help our two beautiful espaliered quinces that have been struggling with powdery mildew these last few years. Last spring we put in some soaker hose to ensure the quinces weren't becoming too dry (powdery mildew seems to thrive on trees and plants that are particularly stressed) but needless to say we then had the biggest rainfall last year. Ah, the irony of gardening!

In the veg patch there are cloches to go out to warm the ground for early sowing of carrots and lettuces; those of you that are super keen could also get your potatoes chitted at the end of the month. This year I think we will have a breather from potatoes as last year we had the most miserable time with blight and it just feels like the garden needs a break from it, and I am also curious to see if the impact of blight is reduced if I only grow tomatoes without potatoes nearby... I will report back on that one! In theory, our walled garden should be good for outdoor tomato varieties but they have been hammered with blight these last couple of years, so we shall see if this different approach works. Fingers crossed!

This month's question is regarding dogwood, and how to keep it looking its best. Late winter is the perfect time to prune dogwood: if you thin out the largest stems at their base, that will leave it open for new bright shoots that in turn will look vibrant and fiery next winter.
