Letter from Ádám Bak - Visiting Hungarian Priest Revd Canon D Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

Dear All

Let me introduce myself. My name is Ádám Bak, I am a Hungarian priest and I spent a short period here at Benefice for a very special reason.

I am on the process to recognise my Holy Orders in the Church of England. William Gulliford, who is in charge with my transition and a good friend of David Longe, had the idea, it would be very supportive to see this kind of ministry in England.

I don't want to bore anyone, especially not those who heard my sermon.

I would rather share my experiences in your villages, and about the graces, I have received.

To be honest, I was a little scared at first that I was going to spend ten days in the middle of nowhere.

The next day, when Father David and I walked around the grounds, I remembered from my childhood, the beautiful

stories of Beatrix Potter, Agatha Christie, her rural murders or what I am currently reading, the Grantchester mysteries. In that moment I knew, I am not in the middle of nowhere, but in the middle of British reality.

I was, and still I am, fascinated by old buildings and churches. I can touch the history and I am able to connect it, because these buildings are not museums but spaces in use.

I had also a number of amazing meetings with you and that was, what I appreciate a lot. Maybe you didn't realise it, but the conversations with you were the most significant experiences. They were supportive and I saw clearly, that this place, the middle of nowhere for you, and in these days even for me, the middle of everything, the place what you keep in your hearts.

I am very thankful, and I do hope that I could continue my ministry perhaps somewhere in this area. That challenge would be for me to build the Kingdom of God in a lovely place, with charming people.

Thank you for spending time to read this short article, and please keep me in your prayers.

The Annual Vestry Meeting (also known as the Annual Meeting of Parishioners) will take place in Baconsthorpe Village Hall at 6pm on Tuesday 7th February. (For the first time, all the parishes in the benefice will be holding their meetings simultaneously, and at the same venue.) At this meeting, churchwardens are elected. All those whose names are on the church electoral roll are entitled to

attend, and vote at this meeting. In addition, any resident of the civil parish of Edgefield whose name appears on the local government electoral roll (as opposed to the parliamentary electoral roll) is entitled to attend, and vote, at this meeting, whether or not they are churchgoers. The Vestry Meeting is followed immediately by the (ecclesiastical) parish's AGM, known as the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM). Only those whose names are on the church electoral roll are entitled to attend, and vote at, this meeting.

Hempstead Toads will be Active This Month – Volunteers Welcome

Toads will start to migrate to Rookery Pit near Green Farm, west of Hempstead village, sometime this month depending on the weather. Generations of toads have used this local pond for breeding, as well as other local ponds such as at Pond Hills, Edgefield and Selbrigg. Left to their own devices, the toads manage the journey from their winter/living quarters and back well enough, but they're not well adapted to road traffic and if they have to cross roads they're at high risk. To help more to survive the migration, a group of volunteers is active at Rookery Pit during early spring. Volunteer patrollers don't need to be available every evening, they work in pairs and usually do one or two 90-minute shifts a week on a rota, between dusk and the first couple of hours of darkness.

If you might be interested in becoming a local toad patroller, contact Tim Venes (timvenes01@ gmail.com, tel: 07876 322406) to find out more.

Even if you can't offer to help with patrols, you can still help local toads and other amphibians (frogs and newts) by:

• Being aware of where toad patrols take place during February and March, watch out for warning signs, and drive carefully near these, to help both the toads and the patrollers.

• Develop 'toad awareness' if you are driving on rural roads at night, especially in February and March, but also any time over the spring and summer in mild and wet or damp weather, as toads still come out to hunt at night when migration is over. If you drive reasonably slowly and watch the road carefully, you can see them on the road in the car headlights and hopefully avoid them with your wheels.

Parish Freezes Precept

At its January meeting Corpusty & Saxthorpe Parish Council agreed not to increase its precept. Mini-Roundabout Ruled-Out

A traffic-calming mini-roundabout at the junction of the B1149 Holt road with Briston Road has been ruled out after a study arranged by Corpusty & Saxthorpe Parish Council. The mini-roundabout was proposed to reduce speeding in the north end of Saxthorpe, as outlined in the Neighbourhood Plan. Unfortunately the County Council's Highways engineers found that sight lines are not good enough. They will be looking at other measures, and the Parish Council has commissioned 'gates' at entrances to the village to remind drivers that they are entering a built-up area. However, this will not be as expensive as the mini-roundabout, leaving the Parish Council with capital that can be spent in other ways. A small working party will put forward proposals to the next PC meeting. The Village Gardener To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

First of all, and I appreciate somewhat belatedly, may I wish everyone a Good New Year! Although I find myself quite taken with the phrase left in a friend's Christmas card which was 'Winter well' somehow this conjures up a kinder solution to the January-February blues. Unless you are actually made of Teflon (possibly a preferable option for these two testing months) I would defy anyone to have a Good January or February, too much pressure too much expectation, but 'Winter well' feels a lot cosier and far more reasonable. These months are difficult but joy of joys when we get to the end of February (the one blessing of the aforementioned month, which in my humble opinion is the hardest of the year, is that it only has 28 days...hurrah for small mercies !) we will have daylight from 7am to near enough 6pm. Also, by the end of February there will be those lovely tiny glimpses of Spring that work so hard to lift our spirits. There will be light at the end of the tunnel!!

So, what needs doing in the garden in February? As I write this it is blowing a rather nasty spiteful rain horizontally at the house, so today is for planning and for seed catalogues and a cosy fire. But if we get a few garden do-able days then the following would be a good start.

If the ground will let you then mulching is the way forward, it works wonders at suppressing perennial weeds, helps retain moisture in dryer months and helps improve the structure and condition of the soil. I would also suggest just checking on any supports and structures round the garden, nothing more demoralising than losing something treasured just because its support gave way. Plenty of pruning in the garden to be done too, remember to always ensure your blades are sharp enough and task appropriate, if you use anything that's not quite up to the job you risk making not only a hash of it but also damaging the plant in question. I would suggest feeding-up any fruit trees after pruning, either a sulphate or potash to help give your trees a lift especially after last Autumn's bumper harvest.

If you are hoping to grow potatoes this year then now is the time to both order and by the end of the month chit your potatoes. I will admit to passing again on growing potatoes like last year primarily because the tomatoes I did grew last year didn't get blight...hurrah! It could have been the fiercely hot summer that kept blight at bay, but I'd rather not take the risk. It was a joy to grow tomatoes and not have them succumb to the unhappiness of blight. You can start your tomatoes seeds off in February but my gut says March; in my opinion tomatoes like to grow fast, they don't like to have to look and fight for light. Better to wait for March and grow them strongly than have them limp through from February. Chillies however are a different ball game altogether, they take a long time to get going so the sooner you get them started the better.

Finally, back to 'Winter well': my two biggest tips, is firstly to make a cheerful batch of Seville Marmalade, especially on one of those horizontal rain days, your home will smell glorious and there is something so uplifting about making a jarful of sunshine that you can hand out to friends and family. Secondly, I would have pots of bulbs in the house - it's kind of like watching Spring on hyper speed, as they tend to come to flower quite quickly but it's still a joy and it does remind you that Spring is only round the corner.



History Watch – Norfolk Flooded, January 31st 1953 Arthur Pentney



Exactly seventy years ago, an unholy trinity resulted in terrible flooding along our coast. A combination of low pressure, gale force winds and high spring tides cumulated in a twenty-foot high wall of water breaching the shingle banks protecting the coastal villages such as Cley and Salthouse. Once breached, there was nothing to stop this inundation. The force of the water broke down doors, destroyed houses, and swept people away to drown. This all occurred in the evening with no daylight which made the tragedy all the

worse as recalled to us by a friend who was living in Salthouse at the time. Lights went out, water flooded in, the family were forced upstairs, climbed out of a bedroom window, abandoning their home and possessions. As dawn broke, their house and several others were no more – a desperate situation made even more poignant by hoards of sightseers, scavengers and looters now in the vicinity. Other houses were so badly damaged that they had to be demolished, new dwellings being built further inland up towards Bard Hill, safe from future flooding.

Over 300 lives were lost in these East Coast floods of 1953, the worst post-war disaster to hit the country. But spare a thought for Holland: much of their land is below sea level and was totally inundated by the same tidal surge. 1,500 of their residents perished.

The accompanying photo, taken at Cley some two miles inland, gives a sense of the power this flood had, a boat being the only viable means of travel at the time! When visiting Blakeney, check out the height of the 1953 tides marked on a building on the quay. It gives a real insight into just how high the water came up to on that day.

On two occasions since 1953 similar storm surges of equal intensity have occurred, when again there was some flooding and damage, but the shingle banks, now greatly reinforced, did their job, and people, houses and property remained generally safe. Once bitten, I suspect!
