

Dear All

I want to tell you the story of Joe.

When I worked in London most Wednesdays at 8am I would attend a service of Holy Communion at the Church at the end of our street. Wednesday mornings were special, and when I introduced Sara to these services, she found them special too. In my hurry to get ready for work I was often late arriving after our parish priest had started the service. There were only ever a few of us, but invariably at the back there were three men – two called Joe, and another called Maurice.

Over the years, Sara and I grew very fond of both the Joes and Maurice – all three are all now safely with God.

When I plucked up the courage to speak to our priest about ordination, I needed a reference from the Church so I approached one of the Joe's. Joe kindly agreed. It was then I began to get to know him better. One day he told me some of his story.

Years before his marriage had broken down, miserable, he turned to the bottle and began living on the streets. One night, oblivious to all, he found a porch to sleep in - it happened to be a church porch. The next morning (it could have been Sunday, I don't know) people from the church came across him.

Joe told me how kind they were, how they fed him and helped him. He said their kindness transformed his life: he stopped drinking, he managed to make contact with his daughter. He got his life back together.

This remarkable turnaround was because some strangers sacrificed some of their time to help a man in trouble.


Joe thereafter faithfully served the Church, eventually becoming Church Warden. He went about quietly caring for the Church and those in the community. You wouldn't have thought twice if you passed him as he was unassuming and quiet. For me, he was a walking saint.

On 22nd February Lent began with Ash Wednesday. Right at the heart of our Lenten journey is the discipline of self-sacrifice. That morning when Joe awoke in the porch and those people began caring for him something remarkable happened – Joe was given a glimpse of something fantastic – a future, hope. Joe might have been unassuming, but if you looked carefully you would see the smile of a man of deep kindness who would help all whom he met without counting the cost. Was this because of those life-changing acts of kindness? He said he was forever thankful.

During this Lenten period I would urge us all into acts of generosity, whether it is giving to the earthquake appeal, praying for those who are suffering, or reaching out to someone like Joe and giving a little of your time. Lent, with Easter as its promises, is a journey teaching us that when we sacrifice some of what we have God bring abundance in ways we cannot imagine.

May God be with you this Lent

I looked out and there sat No 2! She had returned after two years confident that her brother was no longer in residence!! After 12 days he did return and the uneasy relationship has been resumed.


farm in the mid-1930s. She attended Miss Preston's private school in Holt and later New Hall in Essex, a Catholic boarding school for girls. After time spent in Sudan and Kenya in the 1950s, she married David Spalton in 1956 and settled first in Somerset and then Hampshire. Following the death of her mother, Joan Watson-Cook in 1974 and the subsequent sale of Brownwood house, the family bought the Old Schoolroom adjacent to All Saints Church, Hempstead, where after a number of years in Holland, she and David settled in the early 1990s.

Diana had a deep affection for the natural world and was a country girl at heart. Brownwood farm was a huge part of her





Following her mother's example Diana was active in the village and for many years served on the Parish Council and was chair for a number of years. Her long



association with the village meant she was known to all and a great source of local history and local knowledge. She was Village Correspondent up until the time of her death, writing with characteristic understatement in the February issue 'I am not in such good health as when I took it over' and 'I am sorry to give it up'. She will be greatly missed by all.

Work is under way in St Peter's churchyard to thin out the screen of fir trees along the western side. This will allow more warm sunlight to play on the church and in particular on the tower, which suffers from chronic dampness, while preserving the quiet and peaceful feeling of God's acre.

The church council is investigating drainage for blockages and looking at ways of improving air flow within and around the church to help tackle damp.

St Peter's has stood on this site since about 850AD, though it has enjoyed several medieval makeovers. It is a living monument to the Christian gospel of reconciliation after conflict.

In the summer, a Norfolk archaeologist plans to radar survey the area of our chancel (at the east end of the church) that fell down during a service in 1726. This should tell us how big the chancel was, and possibly whether there are any currently unknown graves in that area.

We are holding a picnic for the Coronation on Monday 8th May from 3pm just inside Barningham Park where the fete is held. There will music. Please keep this date free. More info in next month's newsletter.

Challenges at St Andrew's

Last year's survey of residents found strong support for keeping St Andrew's Church, Saxthorpe, open and in use in a variety of ways - but the scale of the challenges became clear at the PCC annual meeting on 7th February. To allow for a greater range of uses the installation of a servery and WC have already been proposed, along with improvements to heating and lighting and other facilities. But, as with any ancient building, there are also major maintenance costs. The

roof covering on the south aisle needs renewal, likely to cost close to £200,000, and the Queen Anne 'Peal Boards' on the north wall of the tower also require refurbishment. There are a number of other smaller items, and the crenellations around the top of the tower also need checking.

A grant of £10,000 has been offered by the Norfolk Churches Trust, but considerable fund-raising and further grants will be needed. These pressures come at a time when income has fallen, partly through fewer services. A card reader is being provided to make it easier for people to donate at the end of services. (Thanks to Heather and Brian Monks for this!)



New Battery Recycling Service



North Norfolk District Council residents can now recycle used household batteries by placing them in a freezer bag, or similar sized clear bag, on top of either their black or green bin on their usual collection day for them to be recycled. It is important that the batteries are placed on top of the bins because if they are not separated, they will go into the body of the vehicle where they risk being crushed which can cause vehicle fires and fires at the processing facility.

To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



Hurrah for March! Whilst not always the easiest or most predictable of months (I think we can all recall the Beast from the East...fingers crossed we don't revisit that entity). March can be an utter joy. Firstly, and if we are fortunate there is a softening of the air, some warmth to the sun and the evenings also start to properly draw out giving us extra precious hours of daylight. What felt impossible in February now feels doable in March, the year is turning and there is an exciting number of projects to crack on with in the garden.

First up is the greenhouse, if like me you had all the good intentions in November to get the greenhouse cleaned and sorted for the next year and then your plans went pear-shaped. Then this where you need to start. So much is led from the greenhouse this time of year. Even if you are like

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me (horribly) behind, if you start here you are on a much better footing going forward. I would suggest taking everything out of the greenhouse, giving the glass a gentle brush down first, then move on to washing it down, probably an obvious tip this one but do start at the top and work down just so you don't make more work for yourself. Once that is dried, I would remove any old border soil you need to refresh with new. Keep this new soil covered with black plastic to not only retain moisture but to also help warm the soil up. Another helpful tip is to bring any potting compost bags you have on the go into the greenhouse to warm up too. This just means when you are setting seeds, you are setting them into a much more conducive environment and they will get going that much better. Make sure all your potting trays/pots are clean whole and all set to go too. Then I would return any greenhouse staging so that now you are all set for what is probably the busiest seed growing time in the year. May I also suggest (if you don't already have one) you invest in a max min thermometer? It's good to get any idea of how your greenhouse behaves temperaturewise (when you're not in it) so that you know what to look out for. Peaks during the warmest parts of the day can be combated with opening a window, real drops in the night can be made easier with fleece or extra insulation. The aim with a greenhouse is consistency, we are after a steady good growing temperature, because that in turn will ensure everything thrives rather than struggles.


The list of what we need or can sow in March is pretty endless, but I would start with annuals and any perennials that need a good length of time to get going. Priority is tomatoes; if you're growing them inside then cucumber leeks beetroot and then courgettes. I feel courgettes don't like a stop start growing time so if March is looking on the colder side I would wait until there are warmer days in April. My other suggestion is to go through all your seeds and place them in order of when they need to be sown, it's so frustrating if you miss out anything that needs a long growing season (just because it had fallen to the bottom of your seed tin).

Finally, and happily, it is time to set any new dahlia tubers you might have invested in, it's always best to plant them in a good 3 litre sized pot when you start them off in the greenhouse as they are large plants and they won't thank you if you try to cram them into anything smaller. Do check over the tubers for any rot before setting them. The next tip is not to water them until they have strong shoots showing and then only in moderation. Dahlias are prone to rot so you don't want the tubers to sit in cold waterlogged compost. They just need warmth and soil at the start to get going rather than moisture.

Finally, this month's question, Sue Hall asks if March is too late to set a bare rooted hedge? The answer is yes and no! On the positive side this is a great time to buy bare root as the season for it is coming to an end so there might be a bargain or too, on the negative you might not have quite so much choice so do your homework first before you buy and perhaps come up with some alternatives if your first choices aren't available. Another positive is the soil is warming up so the bare root should just get going, the negative is with some of the very dry springs we have had just lately you might well need to ensure you have enough time to water them regularly if we hit another dry patch. So, make sure your water butts are full and Good Luck!

Yes, history and nature can be combined should you take a trip to nearby Warham Camp, so please read on...


Our family once visited Stonehenge – never again! What a disappointment. The stones were ring fenced: you couldn't get anywhere near them. The lay by/car park being chock full of visitors resembled a cross between a car boot sale and a rubbish dump!

Contrast this with a journey to our Warham Camp. Quiet and peaceful, no crowds here, no main road location, no stalls selling souvenirs and junk food, no rubbish, just a beautiful countryside location for all to enjoy. And enjoy it you can, for nature and history are together here, the area now being designated an SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest), due to those rare plants that can be found. No great big stones either, just deep ditches and high embankments dating back to the Iron Age, about 200 BC.

Even today, an excavation of this magnitude would be considered impressive if created using JCBs, so imagine digging all this out by hand using just deer antlers as picks. Back in pre-Roman times these excavations would have been two metres deeper than at present, a remarkable achievement, and all done to provide protection for any inhabitants who resided in that central area between the ditches.

Historians are convinced that Boudicca, queen of the Iceni tribe would have been at Warham at some point, probably before moving south to Colchester, there to take on and defeat the Romans.

The chalk grassland of this site gives rise to a rare selection of plants, insects and wildlife. Wild thyme and orchids grow here, chalk hill blue and argos butterflies flourish, and songbirds can be seen and heard in the springtime. Yes, this is indeed a magical place. Forget Stonehenge – our county beats that place hands down!



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
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
