### Letter from the Rector - Reverend Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

### Dear All

In March, a group of us returned from the Holy Land, a place of such beauty and alas such tragedy as the conflict fractures cultures and people. In this letter, I would like to share three incidents that shaped our trip.

First, we visited Aida Refugee Camp in

Bethlehem. Formed in 1948, this camp came into being when the British Mandate for Palestine expired and the state of Israel was formed. For the Arab inhabitants this was known as the Nakba, the catastrophe: huge numbers were forcibly removed from their homes to refugee camps. Seventy-five years later the tents are now teetering buildings dwarfing narrow streets as there is no land to provide for the growing population.

Here we met B. He explained how Israeli soldiers often stormed their houses and arrested neighbours. B explained how he had been filming a raid when he was shot in the head. We asked B about the Israeli soldiers who now stand in solidarity with the Palestinians. He said "Unless they stand up to their government, they should all go home." I asked "What about reconciliation?" B paused; there was silence: we were shocked. The concept of reconciliation is evidently difficult. B responded that he felt the soldier who shot him was experienced and knew exactly what he was doing.

Next we visited Yad Vashem Holocaust Museum. Learning further about the horrors of the Holocaust left us distressed and speechless. I was devastated by what I saw including a presentation of the antisemitism that the Church's false dogmas had promulgated.

We were left with so many unanswered questions, knowing that millions of words have been written trying to address them. Why when the state of Israel was formed was there a Nakba? How could any institution, Church or other, engage in antisemitism? Where was the hope? Where is the peace?

Finally, we met G. G is a Christian (Christians are a tiny minority in the Holy Land – 2-3%) and a teacher at a school in Bethlehem. G explained how he had been driving with his family to buy groceries. Turning a corner, they met a barrage of Israeli gun fire. G was hit in the hip and face. His 12-year-old daughter was hit too. Climbing out of the car, G asked for medical assistance, but the unit would not let the ambulance approach. His daughter died in his arms. We were silenced. Then G said that he felt as a Christian he had to forgive. G began to reach out to Israeli families who had lost children in the conflict and joined *The Parents Circle*. This joint Israeli-Palestinian organisation of families who have lost a family member in the conflict works to end violence and achieve an accepted political agreement. G gave us the glimmer of hope we desperately needed.

On Good Friday Jesus cries from the agony of the cross, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do", showing not only how difficult forgiveness is but how vital it is in our broken and torn world. Jesus's cry in pain brings hope not that day, but unexpectedly two days later at the resurrection. Is this what gave G, in the midst of his grief and suffering hope? Does the resurrection mysteriously and beautifully offer hope and light?

I pray that whatever we face the light of Easter will be a light of hope for us all.

Local farmers have asked people not to walk dogs across fields that seem to be unused. "We make hay crops from these fields, and dog poo can be dangerous to other animals. We will be stopping people as we see them. People need to understand that this is not unused land, it is farmed land and our livelihoods," said farmer Richard Harrold. Wherever you walk your dog, don't forget to clear up after you. Dog poo can contain bacteria and parasites dangerous to humans, especially children and pregnant women.

### The Village Gardener To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



As I (attempt to) write about the beauty and hopefulness of April, the house is being repeatedly buffeted and battered by 55mph winds which combined with threat of more sleet/snow is a tad off-putting. So far, this month has not played fair. Never has the adage 'March came in like a lion and out like a lamb' been more pertinent here - we can but hope it will sort itself out! And I do say this with both fingers and toes crossed. A slow start to spring can be tough to bear, the resilience that was to the fore in earlier winter months has been somewhat stretched thin. I am reminded that despite the nights drawing out (thank goodness) we have gone the longest stretch without any decent sun

and warmth by this time. But the year will turn, we will have our joyful Spring just not today - instead.

So, putting our best chirpy foot forward and choosing to ignore the horizontal sleet that I can now spy out of the corner of my eye, let's instead look at what we should hopefully be doing in the garden in lovely April.

Firstly, there are lots of hardy annuals that you should be able to be sow straight in to the ground but here is where you'll need your common-sense, as there is no point sowing in cold ground, the seeds will either struggle to germinate or struggle to thrive, so you will need to wait until the soil has warmed-up. One solution is to cover your beds in black plastic which helps absorb more heat from the sun, and so warm the soil up. However, I like the trick of using lengths of guttering to get salad leaves, lettuces and annual herbs started in the greenhouse. This works well on lots of levels: the shallow dip of the guttering means the compost warms up nicely so the seeds germinate well and the seedlings thrive. The black plastic absorbs more heat in the greenhouse so again helps everything along nicely. It's best to use manageable effective lengths of guttering, so if (like us) you have raised beds, then cut your guttering to the width of your bed, which in turn will make the guttering easier

to manoeuvre and will be less wasteful of both compost and seed. So, the trick is when your seedlings are ready to go out, create a shallow channel where you would like your gutter seedlings to go. Then to break the seedling length into manageable sections and to push it out one section at a time. There is a knack to it, but once conquered it is ridiculously satisfying, as where there was sad, barren winter soil there will now be a whole new fresh bed of promise, and just for a moment, the veg garden can take on the charming wholesome look of Mr McGregor's garden in *Peter Rabbit*. Once the soil has properly warmed -up, the year has got going and the guttering is no longer in service, I treat them like any other seed trays and clean them up and pack them away, just so they don't get inadvertently used for any roofing issues!

My final tip for April is to nudge you not to forget to harden any seedlings or young plants off properly before planting them out. The theory is to ease them into the idea of outside life gently so they keep a steady constancy of growth. You don't want leggy seedlings that will struggle and be miserable if they are put straight outside into the ground. So the idea is to bring them out for part of the day but then to bring them in again before the temperatures dip too much, do this for about a week before you put them out for good. It can feel like a bit of a faff but is really worthwhile as your plants will be that much more accustomed that they thrive and flourish!




Refreshments in aid of Matlaske Benefice

"Oh, to be in England now that April's there." Like Robert Browning, April is certainly one of our favourite months: winter has been kicked into touch and springtime beckons.

There's so much to enjoy in this lovely period. My recommendation is to visit Foxley Wood in late April to see the profusion of bluebells there. This ancient woodland, some 6,000 years old, is a delight to visit at any time, but especially in April when the whole area seems to be carpeted with a lovely sea of blue. Certain rides may be roped off to avoid the bluebells being trampled on, but most of the wood is open for you to roam freely. This is not a visit to be rushed: allow about two hours to stroll around the various paths – perhaps take a picnic – and so let this unique atmosphere sink in.

It's hard to believe that what is now mostly deciduous woodland was once almost totally coniferous, the timber produced being used for pit props in the coal mines. Sanity prevailed, however, and with nature restored we now have one of the most attractive areas of ancient woodland in Norfolk, and, indeed, the whole country.

Since 1988 the wood has been under the auspices of the Norfolk Wildlife Trust, so its future is secure, which is just as well, as more and more of our county is now being subjected to concrete.

Apart from the bluebells, the wood is a haven for other interesting and rare species – white admiral and speckled wood butterflies, different breeds of owls, and 250 types of plants, so it's a great place for any nature lovers out there. Deer may also be seen. They can forsake the wood to enjoy early emerging corn and then, like lightning, leap across both the security ditch and fence and so back into the safety of the wood. Quite a sight, believe me – I have seen them do it.

The Wildlife Trust put out boards which give out interesting information about birds, trees and flowers etc. for you to absorb as your walk proceeds. So – give it a go. You will never forget it!

NB The wood is not open on Thursdays and dogs are not allowed.
