As this month kicks off with bonfires, tea parties and other events, all marking the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, it seems only right to write about the Queen.

There are, I believe, some incredible qualities to admire in the Queen. Some of these you may find if you brave the churchyards and follow the amusing corgi trails, but there is I think one quality that reflects her faith.

Steadfastness is not a fashionable quality. We don't shout from the rooftops about "how wonderfully steadfast she is", like we would about someone who is an amazing singer or athlete. Yet steadfastness is not just a wonderful quality, it is an essential quality. In the Bible the psalmist repeatedly writes "the steadfast love of the Lord endures forever" (Psalm 136). The repetition of



this phrase reminds the readers of the psalm how God had been present through a whole series of events from Creation to the rescue of the Hebrew slaves from Egypt, and how God continues to be present through all we encounter.

The Queen's steadfast presence at the centre of our Nation has seen us weather all sorts of storms, from Suez to COVID and the tragedy in Ukraine. And not just storms that the nation has had to endure but storms which we have witnessed unfold in her own family. Through all she has remained steadfast in her service to all who make up this nation.

This time last year I wrote about the faith we understand the Prince Philip held, and it seems right to point to the faith of the Queen. At her coronation at Pentecost (Whitsun), the feast which celebrates the Holy Spirit descending on the disciples in Jerusalem, she was anointed and enthroned before and homage was paid. After this elevation to the highest state in our nation, she was invited humbly to kneel and pray and to receive communion.




I do not know, but I wonder, whether her steadfastness for the Nation and for her family, is bound up with her humility and prayer, which is reflected in Holy Communion; that while she is head of our Nation, she is firstly just like each and every one of us a child of God, who is valued and beloved in the sight of the Almighty.

Perhaps as we enjoy teas and bonfires, we can contemplate how we may be steadfast presences in our communities and for our families, as we mark the long reign and give thanks and hold her and this Nation in prayer.





Is There a Future for Hempstead Village Hall?

This dismal result brings into focus the role of the Village Hall and its role in community life of Hempstead. Indeed what is a village hall for, apart from a space to hire for private events? Over the last twenty years the Hall has organised and led annual events such as the May Feast, quizzes and the Christmas Party and in conjunction with All Saints Church the very popular Fete and Dog Show, the annual Hempstead Arts show, and the monthly Coffee & Gossip. These events have been popular and well supported and valued. They have been resourced

from the good will of the organisers, the facilities of the Village Hall and dedicated helpers from the village and participation by the community. Is this model and these activities now past their "sell by date"? I am sure the majority of the people in the village would be sad to see the end of these annual community events. But there comes a time when the splendid people who have helped to run these events feel they have done their bit for the community and are in need of a well-earned rest. That time has perhaps now come. So now, what for the future? Perhaps the future has been answered. Recently we have enjoyed two 'one-off' events: the Open Gardens of last year masterminded by Jill Roy and the Yard Sale last weekend, led by Jonathon and Moira. Both were resounding successes. It is ironic that the hiatus in village activity caused by Covid and lock-down came at the same time as the village celebrated the purchase of the village hall freehold, after many years of negotiations with the owners. This success should now open the way to obtain grants for badly needed improvements and repairs. But if there is a will in the village for this, it needs a strong committee to take on these needs and for the continuation of community events. An injection of new blood is needed! Plumstead Church Path

At last, the new resin-bound, aggregate church path has been laid. This is an eco-friendly, permeable, weed-free surface which requires little maintenance. The steps into the church have been incorporated into the path, which means access to the building is much easier for all. The cost of this path has been covered, in large part, from the estate of Thomas Wormald who served the church as churchwarden for around 30 years. An additional £1000 has come from a grant from The Paul Bassham Trust and a small part from the church's Fabric Fund. A plaque in memory of Thomas will be erected in due course.

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Saxthorpe with Corpusty

Platinum Peal

It's been pretty quiet in St Andrew's bell-tower of late, but the Saxthorpe ringers will be celebrating Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee and to fit in with other bells across the country we will be ringing at 11.30am on Friday 3rd June, the same time as St Paul's Cathedral in London. A band of ringers from St Peter Mancroft, Norwich are going to attempt a peal at St Andrew's starting at 10.00am on the Thursday 2rd June. The same band will attempt a peal on the twelve bells at

Mancroft that evening. The two towers house the lightest and heaviest rings of bells in Norfolk. A peal is a continuous ring of 5,040 changes with no repetition and on six bells it generally takes about two and a half hours. The 'weight' of a ring of bells is defined by the mass of the biggest bell, the tenor. At St Andrew's is 2.25 cwt (144 kg) which is very light in bell-ringing terms. There are six bells. St Peter Mancroft has twelve bells and the tenor is 37 cwt (1,925 kg). This is an exciting and significant target which has not been attempted before. I'll let you know how they get on.

Barn Dance



Dick was brought up in Cambridge, where his grandfather had been Headmaster of what was then called King's College Choir School. He was educated in Hastings and then at Gresham's School in Holt and spent many family holidays at Cley Windmill.

Having finished school Dick went to New Zealand and spent two years working his way round the North and South Islands. Dick returned to the UK, and thanks to an inheritance, bought a cottage in Holt which he renovated himself over several years. Having learned many useful skills, he then bought Upwood Farm, North Barningham in 1980. The house had stood empty for four years, also needed complete renovation and is now a beautiful home for him, his wife Debbie and their children, Charlie and Daisy.

Over the years Dick has gone from building fences to working for the National Trust where he did amongst other things empty the septic tank on Blakeney Point and put in the railings at Wimpole Hall. He has maintained woodland, made playgrounds – the one at Gresham Village School is still going strong – and done landscaping for the renowned garden designer George Carter. He has grown Christmas trees, is an expert digger driver and a totally practical person.

Next to the house at Upwood Farm there was a farm pit that was used as a dump. Dick has emptied the pit and created the most incredible garden there in the two acres next to the house. Dick and builder Sam built the first folly in 2015. It was supposed to be a grotto to use some of the architectural salvage items Dick had bought at auction, but it turned into a folly with a tower.

Since 2015 the number of follies has increased and every time you turn a corner there is something else to look at. There are structures, waterfalls, ponds, a bridge and a vegetable garden. The development of the garden has been an organic process. Dick draws what he wants and Sam builds it from the drawing making any adjustments as they go.


In 2018 Dick was badly attacked on the face by the family's rescue dog which accounts for the large scar on his forehead and now has another Labrador, appropriately called Digger, but this time owned from a puppy.

Dick first opened his garden to the public for the Norfolk Churches Trust in 2019. Since then, it has been opened for The Norfolk Gardens Trust in 2020 and this year it will be opening for the National Garden Scheme on 3^{rd} August. Dick and Debbie have also hosted many private tours by gardening clubs.

The garden featured on the front cover of *Follies -The International Magazine* in the Spring 2020 edition and there was a four-page article in the *Norfolk Gardens Trust Magazine*, written by Roger Last from Saxthorpe, in the Autumn 2020 edition.

I would encourage anyone who likes gardens to visit Fiddian's Follies at Upwood Farm, North Barningham on 3rd August between 11am and 5pm for a truly magical experience and to take in the most beautiful views of North Norfolk behind the house. As I write this at a somewhat ungodly hour in the middle of May, it feels as if June has kicked off early this year, it is just glorious! There is the delightful thrum of the dawn chorus (there has to be some advantages to being an insomniac!) and the light of a beautiful new day. The garden is a delight, for now we will gloss over our own somewhat hefty to-do list (extensive and possibly unrealistic) and just enjoy instead.

Still, within the realms of enjoyment there are plenty of jobs in the garden to be getting on with. First up is a gentle reminder to prune all early flowering shrubs if you haven't done so already. Make sure you give them some care afterwards, a good water/feed and mulch will set them up well for the next season. My next tip is to deadhead your roses properly: it's OK to just pull the heads off, but if you actually take the time to cut back to the first leaf below the spent flower you will then get a new shoot from that point, so it's a good habit to get into. Finally now the threat of frosts have passed, we can also happily plant out anything that's a bit tender. Not that we were inundated with frosts, it was more that they were at times a bit unexpected this year!

In the kitchen garden there is plenty to do, make time to sow carrots, French beans and sugar snap peas. For the last few years we have set our courgettes in two batches; it works well, just as the first lot have slowed down the second lot gets going, so instead of having an absolute flood of courgettes we get a steady amount throughout the season. Less emergency marrow chutney more finely griddled baby courgette slices...it is a lot less stressful! This month I will also try and find a space for overwintering chicories, it's tricky to find room this time of year but it always pays off in late autumn. The other task is to keep on top of the weeds as they really get going in June. I swear by Monty Don's tip of a sharp hoe on a sunny morning, then clearing them later in the day, it really does work.

In the greenhouse there is a sense of relief to be able to get stuff outside, which has been queued up waiting on the side-lines, then the focus can be on looking after the remaining inhabitants. Do keep an eye on the temperature in your greenhouse and consider dampening the floor down on really hot days to help keep the temperatures sensible.

Now to one of my favourite things to grow in the garden, which are herbs, as they can make so much difference to your everyday cooking, they just take it to another level. So I will be planting lots this month. I was listening to a good Sarah Raven podcast the other day when the golden tip for germinating parsley was alluded to but not actually mentioned. So here it is! Parsley germination takes a long time (about 21 days) but what I have always done is set the seed and then poured a kettle of boiling water over the said row of freshly set seeds. It may sound somewhat random but it does in my opinion work. The other tip I have is not to set basil too early in the year as it just sulks and can dampen off all too easily, I also read just recently to only water basil in the morning as it hates to sit in water overnight, I have taken note on that one too. Bizarrely I have been struggling with a lack of mint plants in our garden, so will be rooting some stems in water to plant out later this month. I was sent some beautiful alpine strawberry plants from my Mum's garden in Shropshire and they have completely crowded out the mint, something I thought was nigh on impossible (I think the clue was in the fact they survived being sent by Royal Mail 2nd class in a jiffy bag!!) I am not sad as they are so pretty and fruit well and are obviously very happy here... I have just missed the mint!

This month's question is regarding unruly rhododendrons. Tim Scott asks how and when he should deal with his. June is a good month for this, you can prune them back hard and for a while they will look rather resentful about it but they will come back and in better shape.

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
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
