Letter from the Rector - Reverend Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294

Dear All

Martin Scorsese's 2016 film *Silence* based on the Japanese author Shūsaku Endo's book of the same name is harrowing. It traces the story of the arrival of Christianity in Japan and I believe poses important questions for us to consider, such as: What do we value in this life? What is freedom? What might we be prepared to die for?

We may think these questions are irrelevant, but I disagree. We only need to consider what is around us, as we look at the fires devastating communities over the summer to the restrictions imposed on women in Afghanistan, to realise these questions deeply matter shaping our context and our future.

Such was the rapid growth of Christianity in Japan in the 17th Century that the authorities banned it in 1614. Yet as the ban didn't stem the growth, the authorities introduced Fumie: converts were made to trample on brass images of Jesus or Mary (see image above).



Fumie

Fumie became an annual practice, even for those who were ill or Buddhist monks. Refusal led to torture, including being suspended upside down over a pit of excrement with a small incision made in their heads, until agreeing to trample on Christ. Some who denied Christ later repented and became known as Kakure Kirishitan (hidden Christians).

In *Silence*, Rodrigues, a Jesuit priest, hearing that his mentor, Ferreira, has apostasised (denied Christ) is determined to go to Japan. On arriving he and a colleague meet Christians who for decades have kept the faith and are delighted to have a priest in their midst. The authorities learn of the two priests, and so torture and kill the parishioners, before the priests themselves are captured.

Rather than physically torture Rodrigues, he is made to listen and watch the torture of his parishioners and to meet Ferreira, who urges also him to deny Christ. Eventually as Rodrigues raises his foot on the fumie a/Christ's voice speaks: "Trample! I more than anyone know of the pain in your foot. Trample! It was to be trampled on by men that I was born into this world. It was to share men's pain that I carried my cross." As he rests his foot the cock crows (read: Matthew 26:69-75).

Later, Rodrigues now married and a practicing Buddhist, is writing tracts against Christianity with Ferreira. He dies and Scorsese provides an image of the dead Rodrigues holding a small cross. Was he a hidden Christian?

Having begun with 3 questions, I close with two more to ponder:

- 1. What do you think about those who did not deny their faith yet were tortured and died, and many doing so to protect Rodrigues?
- 2. Where was God in the midst of all of this (where was Emmanuel, God with us)? When the ban on Christianity was lifted in 1873, 20,000 Christians were found (there are 1.92m today c. 1-1/5% of the populous). However had everyone been martyred Christianity would have died too.

For me, praying for those who are suffering and those who face persecution is essential.

The Lost Chancel

On 4th August, local archaeologist Michael De Bootman and his colleague Jason carried out a ground-penetrating radar survey of St Peter's churchyard in the area just outside the big east window, where a chancel and high altar once stood. That chancel fell down suddenly during a service in 1726. Could we find lost graves? No. That was not really a surprise, as grave infill is much the same as the surrounding soil, so the radar scanner can't easily 'see' the grave-cuts. What was surprising was that we found no trace of the old chancel's foundations either. One possible reason is that the medieval foundations were dug out and re-used after the walls collapsed. Some of the old chancel masonry can be seen in the churchyard wall along The Street. Another possibility is that the chancel never had good foundations in the first place, which might explain why it fell down.

August in the garden can be a month of contradictions: on the one hand you can have an abundant harvest and glorious show of flowers, on the other hand your garden can start to look somewhat jaded after the long spring and summer months. But help is on hand if your garden needs a bit of a lift! The other thing to remember is that August is very much a transitional month where we have one foot in summer the other stepping into autumn, and it's better to embrace that than be in denial! So, if your garden like ours is looking a bit spent in August, then the trick is to sharpen up the edges to help give it a lift, so give your hedging a trim and give your lawn edges a good cut too, both these will help pull the garden together. The other trick is to persevere with your dead heading to help keep your borders looking their best, it really does make a huge difference. Pots and planters will not only need daily watering but would also benefit from a good liquid seaweed fertilizer to get the most out of them.

So, looking forward to autumn in your kitchen garden it's worth working out which herbs you'd like to have on hand for your cooking. At this time of year, mint can look a bit sorry for itself, but fortunately mint responds quite well to radical revitalization. If like us you grow it in a pot (or in our case a metal bucket . . . pre drilled plenty of drainage) then you tip the whole plant out, chop it in half with a spade (I did say it was radical!) and re-plant the best-looking half. This rather drastic action seems to trigger the plant into putting on a lot more fresh growth, which is exactly what you want from mint. I have grown a lot of our herbs this year in galvanised buckets, which I have been really happy with. I have stuck with one type of herb per bucket and they have all really flourished. Whereas terracotta looks lovely, the smaller pots tend to dry out too quickly, but the buckets have worked really well and they look charming! I will still grow what I call my fresh green herbs in the raised beds like flat leaf parsley and dill and coriander and those three are very much on my list for re doing in August so I've got them for the autumn winter months. There will also be a concerted campaign to ensure there is a good sowing of autumn winter lettuce leaves too, to ensure there is some fresh leaves for the months to come.

All this forward thinking means we must take care to not forget to look after what we have now in the kitchen garden, and here that is primarily the tomatoes in the greenhouse, as we are now in the race to get as many ripened as possible, the best way to do that is to strip the lower leaves from the plants, this helps the tomatoes ripen (literally because the leaves are no longer shading the fruit) As the weeks pass you can keep stripping off the leaves until you mainly have just ripening fruit. Do keep an eye out for blight too, ventilation is key for (hopefully!) keeping that at bay. I have stuck with my resolve on not growing potatoes in our garden and last year (touches wood) was the first

year our tomatoes didn't get blight, which was just a joy. It is a sad price to pay but fortunately we do have a few really good honesty stalls out our way who sell freshly dug new potatoes... Thank goodness!

This month's question is from Joan White who wrote in saying she struggles to keep her large planted terracotta pots looking good in late summer, as I alluded to earlier any plant displays you have in pots do require you to go the extra mile this time of year. First up are some tips for when you plant up the pots next year and a confession! If you are planting in terracotta pots... whilst they are beautiful you will lose more water from them (evaporation from the porous terracotta) so a good tip is to line them with old compost bags to slow this process down. I would also think carefully about what compost you use in spring. Don't choose one you know dries out quickly, you need a good quality compost that retains moisture well. Now to the confession! We have moved (nearly) completely away from terracotta pots here to galvanised, which is much more our look but I also feel they are much easier to look after. We had lost too many clay pots to frosts and whilst it is preferable to 'bring' under cover any vulnerable terracotta pots before the frosts, logistically that just doesn't work here.

Now to how to look after them well now, the trick is to remember that even if you've used a good quality compost, most of the 'food' so to speak will have been used up by this point in the season. This is where watering with a good quality seaweed feed once a week is essential and when we get to September I would up that feed again just to get a last good 'show' from your pots. 
