#### Dear All

I have been asked to publish the following sermon which I preached on 11<sup>th</sup> September 2022, the first Sunday following the death of Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and the Accession of His Majesty King Charles III. With my prayers for all David



Like so many others I am conscious standing here before you, that what I am going to say will be said far more eloquently by others and that already, and in the years to come, much ink will be spilled as we

endeavour to capture or articulate something of a woman whom so many have come to love.

Indeed as I prepared this homily, I again realised that words are nothing without action for it is in our actions that we show what we hold dear. Our actions show what we love: alas, sometimes they show how we fail to love.

Our late Queen in many ways was a woman of few words: in the one time I met her, it was others in the room that filled the place with words, but when she spoke all listened, especially when she spoke of her late husband, Prince Philip.

So often for our Nation, it was the Queen's presence that brought not just delight to those who encountered her, but comfort and security to us in times of difficulty.

Today she does not speak to us through words, rather we meet her anew as we reflect on her life in her death: as our new King prayed on that first Friday evening "*may flights of Angels sing thee to thy rest*".

*Angelos*, a Greek word, from which we derive the word angel which means a messenger from God. And our Queen in her death, is, I believe, imparting to us the most important message of her reign: an angelic message.

It is a message that finds its origin, not in the things that are temporal, sullied by jealousy, pride and selfishness, but in the Divine, in the Eternal: in the love of God.

At the heart of Jesus' message is message of hope, of compassion, of a new vision for us to live as a nation and a community. Increasingly this is not an isolated community, but a global community.

As I prepared for the first service of prayers for the Queen in Plumstead, I confess I looked briefly at my telephone and saw I had received a message from a friend who is a priest living in Washington DC. He wrote:

"[My wife] Deb, and I join a world in mourning. As others have noted, it's like a member of the family has died. No doubt the case for so many and we feel the loss here too. Thanks be to God for her life well lived and may God bless King Charles III with wisdom, patience and courage for the time to come. May Elizabeth rest in peace and rise in glory."

Considering all, it was perhaps surprising that President Putin called her death an "irreparable loss" in a condolence message on Thursday, with his spokesperson praising her "wisdom and authority", adding: "Such qualities are in very short supply on the international stage at the moment." However, whatever we may make of these words if you Google you will see just how much many in Russia appreciated our Queen.

So perhaps we can begin to understand how much she and the Royal Family are a unifying presence beyond these isles. This is truly a remarkable and vital role in our world, a role that is desperately needed particularly as we consider that today we mark a tragedy that affects us all 21 years ago.

Her death has for a brief moment allowed so many across the globe, friend and foe alike, to put aside worries and concerns and meet together to share and reflect in the love we have for this extraordinary individual for whom it was a privilege to be a subject of.

This is the angelic message: it shows us the way we are to live. A way to live where selflessness and steadfastness are preeminent as they were in her life. In a life that had within it, kindled deep within a soul, Faith, Hope and Love.

So as we carry our love for Our Queen in our hearts, and pray for our King and our Nation, and as she is borne on the wings of angels, I pray that we too may be stirred by angelic voices. Our own souls kindled and inspired by the very voice of God, as revealed in our Lord Jesus Christ, so that we may be renewed in hope, invigorated by faith and determined in love, to live lives worthy of the God who formed us and the God who now calls our Queen to eternal rest in him.

God save the King. AMEN

#### **The Village Gardener** To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



Hurrah for Autumn! It is with a big sense of relief that I can write October's article, with this season feeling so much more normal. There have been some beautiful misty mornings followed by some glorious proper Autumnal days.... the water butts and water troughs are all full. The lawn has been cut for the first time in weeks and after some really good overnight rainfalls the garden is looking far less sorry for itself. Thank goodness!

Now for the humongous to-do list that is October! First up is bulb planting, not I hasten to add tulip

bulb planting, you need to hold fire on those until the temperatures have dropped and there is a proper nip in the air, tulips are so susceptible to diseases and funguses that thrive in warmer weather, so the best plan is to be patient then you 'should' avoid those hazards. The bulbs I am thinking about are alliums that can give your border some good vertical interest, these need a warmer start so to speak, so October is a good month to get them in the ground whilst there is still some warmth in the soil. The other bulbs to consider are narcissi. It's worth going through last spring's photos of your garden and looking at what areas would benefit from a bit of early spring sparkle, remembering that those first spring shoots are always so encouraging when the winter months seem to be never ending.

At present we are taking lots of photos of our large border because it needs a big autumnal overhaul, so they are not 'Oh, look how lovely' photos but more to highlight what we need to work on. It is a beautiful spring border with a lovely soft fresh palette that moves into a good summer border with our roses but then it completely loses its way in autumn. It suddenly struck me the other day that the look I am actually after are within the bunches of flowers I have been picking from our walled garden. So I am talking far richer colours with good pops of orange and rich yellows. I have really loved the combination of rich dark velvet like dahlias with French marigolds and the wonderful orange of Tithonia rotundifolia 'Torch' and the mixed colours of the sunflowers in our kitchen garden. It feels like the right way forward but will require a fair amount of planting and upheaval but that's the best bit about gardening and gardens, they are not set in stone but can change and evolve.

Now back to the to-do list! I would still keep going with the dead heading, although certain flowers I am letting go so I can collect the seed from them. I am also being mindful of not clearing away everything but leaving some seed heads for the birds too. I would also recommend keeping on top of the perennial weeds. You don't want those ones to seed and to then get even more

established. Once plants you have supported have died down, it's a good moment to take the plant supports in to clean them up and leave them in a good orderly fashion so when you come to find them out in late spring, they are all set to go and not in a hideous 'Jenga' like muddle. Another big project this month is to get all your climbing and rambling roses pruned and tied in, this is a good job to get under your belt before the Autumn winds get going and cause any damage. Try to also clear away any dead rose leaves underneath the plants so they don't harbour diseases, I would also give some serious thought to under planting your roses with salvias to help keep your roses healthy. Now for a quick word about dahlias! Depending on where your dahlias are located by the end of October early November could be either the right time to either lift them (if they are in a cold and exposed spot) or cover them (if they are sheltered and in a warm spot). If you are lifting them, they need to be firstly kept somewhere warm and dry so they don't get packed away damp, then pack them in dry compost in boxes lined with newspaper. I would keep them somewhere that doesn't get cold and damp over winter. If you're happy to leave your dahlia tubers in situ then I would still cover them with a mushroom compost/ leaf mould or some spent potting compost just to protect them from the worst of the frost and damp.

Now for the veg plot! If you have any pea or bean plants left that you are just about to clear away, remember to leave the roots in the ground. The legume family have nitrogen fixing nodules in their roots that if left to break down in situ will give your soil a nitrogen boost. Remember to plant your winter lettuces, chicories and mustard leaves if you haven't done so already. Admittedly they are a bit of a faff as you will need to protect them a bit, but they have so much more flavour than supermarket leaves and they (obviously) will be so much fresher. If you are in the mind for keeping some winter lettuces ticking over during the winter months then spare a thought for herbs too, the ones from the supermarket are mere shadows of the home-grown varieties and they come swathed in plastic. I appreciate they are convenient but that's about it, every herb you can grow yourself will have way more flavour and you can just pick exactly as much as you need, no more sadly decomposing sad bundles in the fridge door. All it takes is a bit of time and thought and maybe acceptance that basil should be saved for the warmer months and then it will be that much more appreciated. I am going to try and keep a supply of coriander and parsley going the former under a bit of cover. I am also going to cover some of my thyme/sage and rosemary plants to see if they benefit from a bit of extra TLC too.

Now to this month's question which is from Linda Davies from Corpusty, who, whilst rejoicing at the lighter soils at her new home since moving from a heavy clay soil garden, is struggling with ants. That's a tricky one Linda, you also mentioned how dry your soil is too so I would suggest working on building up the structure of the soil with garden compost and after a good rain I would recommend mulching your garden well too, this I feel would help discourage the ants. I would also try planting some lavender near any particularly infested areas or vulnerable plants. Ants don't like strong smells so I would also try growing plenty of garlic, mint and chives in a hope of putting them off. If your also getting stung I would try wearing lavender essential oil yourself too when you're in the garden too. Hope that helps and thanks very much for your email.

#### Nature Watch – Wild Plums Arthur Pentney



"I know a wood where the wild plum grows." Not exactly Shakespeare, I know, but still its veracity is clear. Take the road from Tuppenny Grove toward Barningham Winter and check out the spinney on the left. Here, the wild plum growing there was a magnet for the youngsters of the day, and its abundance of fruit quickly devoured by any of those kids knowing of its whereabouts.

Our friendly gardeners Michelle and Mick @redmaple tell me that the species' correct name is Cherry Plum prunus cerasifera. They also have a similar tree, and advise that its fruit is indeed edible, can be made into jams and wines, and at one time was used as a remedy for bad behaviour!

Another specimen could be found in the boundary hedge joining Baconsthorpe with Hempstead, a sure sign that the tree was very old. It bore a few fruits until a few years ago.

For me, the tree's real beauty is early in the year when its tiny white blossom is in profusion despite frosts and snow still being prevalent, a real harbinger of spring, signalling better weather to come.

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
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
