Dear All

It's Christmas time, there's no need to be afraid At Christmas time, we let in light and we banish shade. And in our world of plenty we can spread a smile of joy. Throw your arms around the world at Christmas time But say a prayer, pray for the other ones At Christmas time it's hard, when you're having fun. There's a world outside your window And it's a world of dread and fear, Where the only water flowing Is the bitter sting of tears.



Jesus Feeding the Five Thousand

And the Christmas Bells that ring there are the clanging chimes of doom.

...Feed the world - Let them know it's Christmas time!

How many of us only know the opening line of Geldof and Ure's 1984 song Do They Know it's Christmas? written to raise money for the famine in Ethiopia, and echoing in homes again this Christmas? Its words, listed above, challenge us. The song encourages us to think again about Christmas and, perhaps, to question why we bother with decorations or placing a 'cute' baby Jesus in the crib.

In her article, Why I am now a Christian (a twist on Bertrand Russell's 1927 lecture) Ayaan Hiris Ali explains how she was influenced by the Muslim Brotherhood's literalistic interpretation of Islamic texts to take the "straight path". She says it "...articulated a direction: a straight path...a manual of do's and don'ts ... the difference between right and wrong, good and evil, God and the devil." It was right to wearing the burqa; wrong to go the cinema. As she began to question this perceived clarity, she found comfort in atheism. Russell's comment that "Religion is based... upon fear...fear of defeat, fear of death" resonated.

Dissatisfied with atheism, Ali detected the moral fibre of the next generation "being eaten away" as we struggle with issues such as the resurgence of authoritarianism in China and Russia. "What unites us?" she asks, is it that "...there is no God"? Still unsatisfied, she explored the Judeo-Christian tradition learning about the sacred nature of life, of freedom, dignity – factors uniting us beyond national boundaries and ethnicities.

But this doesn't address the fundamental question of "what is the purpose of life?" It was in Christian response to this question with compassion, humility and respect, that Ali appears to find solace.

Is this why those decorations and Geldof and Ure's lyrics blasting on the new Bluetooth speaker are important? Do they show generosity, compassion and humility to be at the heart of Christmas? They point to solidarity with those near and far away - whether cowering in Gaza (I write in November) or fearful in Ukraine, or hungry in Ethiopia. This 'cute' baby is not so distant - born in an occupied country to poor folk - is not about fear, rather freedom, light and hope in all the tragedy we see.

For this baby is Jesus, Light of the World, Prince of Peace, the Wisdom of God. May you have the most peaceful and wonderful Christmas. David

Edgefield Fuel Fund Distribution

*To be eligible:

(b) you must have been permanently resident in the Parish of Edgefield for five years and be a resident on the day of distribution;

(c) you must apply in person;

 $\left(d\right)$ the infirm or incapacitated may send a representative, who must bring a written authority signed by the person who qualifies.

Please note: The distribution of funds is at the discretion of the Trustees. Rude and abusive behaviour is not acceptable and is likely to result in a refusal to release a payment to an applicant or their proxy.

Stories Gleaned From The Matlaske Burial Register

Duncan Wood 570293

CRICKET CAN BE A COSTLY GAME. Samuel Tolman of Matlaske, 59, was

buried on 10th July 1929 by Revd J Whiteside, Rector of Matlaske. A marginal note by the Rector says that Mr Tolman "fell down while playing cricket in Barningham Park" [? unclear] for Aldborough. July 6th The coroner's certificate said "heart failure through over exertion". The Northampton Chronicle and Echo of 9th July 1929 reported: "While batting for Aldborough at Haveringham Park [?] against Cawston, Norfolk, Samuel Tolman collapsed between the wickets and died before a doctor arrived. Tolman, who was 58, was a well-known figure in North Norfolk cricket."

MATLASKE MAN KILLED BY NAZI BOMB. Daisley Charles Montagu Burton of Matlaske, 30 years old, a labourer, was buried at Matlaske on 23rd August 1940 by the Revd J Pallister, Rector of Wickmere. A labourer, he was killed by a German bomb while at work at Scottow Aerodrome on 19th August 1940. His wife Ethel was from the Quantrell family and the couple had been married in Matlaske Church on 17th November 1934 by the Revd Whiteside. He has relatives in the village still.



Looking After Our Trees

The recent loss of a number of trees, including mature oaks, in both Corpusty and Saxthorpe has led to several more tree preservation orders (TPOs) being made in the parish. (These can be seen on North Norfolk District Council's website.) However, TPOs can only be made where trees are under threat, so can come after felling has already started.

At its November meeting the Parish Council agreed to create and publish a list of trees that are considered important either as fine individual specimens, or as groups that contribute to the village scene.

Trees also improve air quality, including the removal of CO2 and pollutants, and are vital to many wildlife species. Oak trees are particularly important, supporting more wildlife than any other type of tree in this country.

The purpose of the tree survey is to make local people aware of important trees in the two villages, improving the chances of action to protect these trees before they are damaged or felled. John Birchall will be coordinating production of the list and would welcome suggestions. (See page 2 for contact details) The Parish Council will then decide what should be included and how it should be published.

The Village Gardener - To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



It is with more than a slight sense of shock that I write December's article, despite the almost hourly bombardment of 'Festive' advertising, when the weather outside is trying to convince us otherwise. Christmas feels like it's rather reluctantly, soggily making its presence known, instead of crisply announcing its arrival with some good hard frosts, which would help everything feel a bit more seasonally 'normal' - whatever normal is!

I have been taken aback with just how waterlogged some of our garden is. The walled garden has been distinctly boggy, which in all the 12 years we have been here is a first. Normally, it is extremely free draining so much so we are having to regularly top it up with extra oomph to help it hold onto moisture, but now it's distinctly soggy under foot, which is a bit of a worry for the dahlias who have thrived in there so far, thoroughly enjoying its free draining disposition, so fingers crossed it will all come good!

Elsewhere in the garden we have been very keen on having a good 'sort' before the weather gets too tricky, but it feels as if we have perhaps missed that boat, just because the ground is so waterlogged. I'm a bit of a petrol head. I love cars and driving and I was lucky enough to be the Evening News motoring correspondent during the 1980s when worrying about global warming was left to a few scientists. Now, climate change is rarely out of the news, and it's easy to feel that the issues are just too big for us to deal with. Take transport, for example. Living out in the sticks, it's hard to do without a car, and not everyone can afford to go electric. Hopping on a bus or a bike isn't always possible.

But, as I found out, there's a lot we can do without changing cars or becoming hermits in our homes. The last time fuel prices went through the roof, I took a serious look at ways of getting more miles for my money, with the bonus of cutting CO2 emissions at the same time. I am, of course, the best driver on the planet*, but I had to admit that I was locked into a way of driving that was to squeeze seconds off my journey. I wouldn't ignore speed limits, but I would drive at the speed I thought I could get away with - 33 in a 30, 65 or 75 on the open road. My car told me I was doing 53 miles per gallon. It was capable of doing more than that - but was I?

It took a while to break the habit of hard on the accelerator and hard on the brakes, and to stick to speed limits, but the results were astonishing. Quite soon I was getting 60 mpg out of the car. Spurred on, I tried harder, and now maintain almost 64 mpg. That's 20% more miles for my money, and a big reduction in CO2, and little difference to journey times.

If you want to give it a go, it's quite simple:

The big fuel-eaters are speed and braking. Allow a little more time, take it easy. Don't whizz up to bends or junctions and slam on the anchors. There are plenty of other tips that can add up, but for goodness' sake avoid using a roof rack - it's like driving around with a parachute. If you have to use one, take it off afterwards! And remember that any unnecessary weight in the car is costing you money, so keep your car free of stuff. Best of all, think twice about when to use the car. It's the perfect green machine when the engine's not running.

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


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
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
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
