Nature Notes

I seem to have a certain affinity with water. Since childhood nothing has quite "rocked my boat" as much as, well, rocking about in boats! And certainly, for me, no picnic site is complete without

some watery backdrop, whether it be a windswept clifftop in January, or a sleepy millpond in August. Every time I travel over a nearby ford, this magnetic attraction compels me to linger and watch the light dance on the rippling water and scour the banks for signs of life.

A recent visit there paid dividends in the form of two Grey Wagtails. At one time these "Water Wagtails" would have been a rare sight here, preferring the fast flowing streams and rivers of upland areas, only taking shelter at lower levels during winter before returning to the hills to breed. Whilst still preferring higher altitudes, the species has gradually increased its range over the last 150 years, nesting within old bridges, culverts and derelict mills.

A vast array of hungry predators make dents in numbers, so a long breeding season allows more than one brood to be produced annually, and it is not uncommon for the care of fledglings to fall to the male whilst the female turns her attention to the next clutch of eggs.

The name suggests a rather underwhelming bird - no allusion to the striking yellow breast, or yellow-green rump; no hint of the white eyebrow, or the black bib and white moustache of the male; no suggestion of the smooth slate coloured upper parts, or black wings. Of course, the bird's tail, longer than that of other wagtails, does get a mention. It helps provide stability as the bird dips about in the shallows looking for tadpoles, insects or minnows. It also increases aerial agility, both whilst the bird catches flying insects, and again during courtship where the male performs fluttering dances, leaping from nearby trees, rump feathers puffed out, wings and tail spread and lowered.

What really makes the tail noteworthy is its constant motion, which, some suggest, is part of an elaborate warning system, moving faster when threats are detected. Others think it a territorial display or even a means of flushing out insects. Personally, I'm undecided, but just quite like the fact that there are still some things in the world that perhaps we will never really know the answer to!

Reflection from the Rectory

As I sit and listen to the birds sing their evening salute to the setting sun, I feel that spring is well under way.

This is confirmed in the fresh green leaves that are beginning to colour our hedgerows and the primroses growing on the banks surrounding the fields. Birds are no longer visiting our bird tables as frequently as in the winter months but are busy preparing nests for this year's crop of fledglings. I feel the urge to leave my winter's den, the warmth and dryness provided through the cold and dark days of winter by my home, and stretch my arms and legs in joyful anticipation of a long dry and warm summer.

Is the winter really over? Or has the wonderful and welcomed warm weather of the last month and a half lulled us into a false sense of winter being over. How do we know?

We can decide that winter is over. Put away our thick winter clothing, pull out our summer best from the back of the wardrobe and greet the sun with confidence in its continuing journey to our northern hemisphere. 





Village Gardeners



As I am writing this, we are having some lovely warm sunny days and, more importantly, fewer cold nights. It is the perfect time to keep on top of the weeds. Spring bulbs have been a picture this year so try and leave them as long as possible before cutting them back so that they can make and store energy for next year's display.

These are good growing conditions for plants especially the tomatoes and cucumbers that have just been planted in the greenhouse. When the plants are young it is best to water in the morning. I like to keep the soil just moist so that it encourages

the roots to search for water and thus make a good root system. Until cucumbers are well established, never leave the plants wet around the roots at night as this may cause the plant to collapse.

For a continuous supply of young plants like carrots, lettuce, radish, spring onions, and beetroot, make small sowings spaced over several weeks. Frosts should have finished so runner beans can be planted. They love a rich moisture-holding soil. Dig a good deep trench and incorporate plenty of well-rotted compost and some general fertiliser. This will provide the nutrients they need and help hold moisture in the soil over the dry summer months.

This is the time of the year when there will be plenty of material for the compost heap. As you add grass clippings etc. keep the heap level and gently firm down the surface. A proprietary composting chemical can be added. Woody stems will not rot so do not put them on the heap but burn or dispose of in another way.

Annuals are now appearing in shops and garden centres. There are plenty of colourful plants available for baskets and tubs, but chose carefully, selecting healthy strong plants and plant in good quality new compost. Moisture retaining gel can be added in to the compost. The gel expands by taking up the water which is then released as the compost dries out. A word of warning if you do use it, make sure you mix it well into the compost because if left on the surface it will look like frog spawn when it expands and be of little use to the plant.

Beware of the late frost.

Meet the Neighbours



The Corbetts have been in Corpusty since 1964 when Rob Corbett opened his first furniture workshop at the rear of his house in The Street. The Old Workshop Gallery opened in 1983 and was run by his wife Mary and daughter, textile artist Jill. Some of Jill's exquisite dresses are exhibited at the Gallery. Kay Corbett, Rob's other daughter, has followed in her father's footsteps as a master carpenter working from Corbetts Workshop further east along The Street, overlooking the River Bure and with an acre of wildflower garden which includes a beehive. One day, she hopes, it will produce beeswax.

She works with John Sizeland and they specialize in quality furniture, joinery, fitting, lettering and relief carving using English hardwoods – oak, ash, sycamore, cherry, elm. She tries to avoid using rainforest wood but sometimes needs must if she is to earn a living. Earning a living has meant that she now makes less quality furniture since most people can buy what they want off-the-peg. That's a pity given the quality, beauty and sheer presence of her work.

Kay is photographed here at work on a cherry and walnut wardrobe and drawers

for a customer in Reepham. Nearby is another project, a corner desk with shelving and room for a computer. She has had commissions from as far away as Scotland but mostly prefers to work within an area of 50 miles. The job which made her proudest was walnut library fittings for a family who had moved from Norfolk to Cheshire. It was a long distance commission but fitted to the inch. Most of her business, she says, comes from her ad in this magazine: at the moment there is a run on gates and she has three on the go.

Kay has mostly lived in Corpusty since she was four, although her home is now in Norwich. She always wanted to follow her father into carpentry and studied for her City & Guilds at Norwich City Technical College. She started in his first furniture workshop. To savour her craftsmanship, which includes an ingenious flat-pack table, a New Columbine chair with a taller back and larger seat than the original, and a commemorative millennium chest, Google Kay Corbett/woodworker, or better still visit the gallery or workshop.
