Dear All,

What is hope?

During Lent, a group of us watched The Old Oak directed by Ken Loach, over 3 sessions of 30 mins, followed by a lively discussion. The film, as some may know, depicts a group of Syrian refugees arriving into a deprived mining town near Durham. They are met with hostility. Yet the publican, TJ, reaches out to them, making friends with Yara a young Syrian woman. He offers the back room for a meal for the community. The locals, many his friends, are furious as before he had refused their access to the room for an anti-immigrant meeting. They plot their revenge.



The Old Oak

We learn that TJ has been through difficulty – he was an alcoholic whose wife left him and had contemplated taking his own life, only to be rescued by a puppy whom he adores and then loses in devastating circumstances. As he grieves the loss of his dog, the Syrian family console him returning his friendship.

At one point TJ takes Yara to Durham Cathedral, they sit in the light and Yara speaks:

Such a beautiful place . . . makes me want to hope again. When they torture, when they target hospitals, when they murder doctors, when they use chlorine gas, when the world stands by and does nothing, that's when the regime lives. When the world does nothing. That's what they do to break us. It takes strength to hope, but they want to smash it.

It takes faith to hope.

Yet even knowing this, TJ falls into deep despair when disaster befalls the pub, and his friends taunt him. He has had enough. He has been betrayed.

On Good Friday Jesus cries from the cross: "My God my God why have you forsaken me". He has been betrayed, his friends have abandoned him and he is taunted. TJ's hope appears to be killed; he too feels forsaken.

Unexpectedly the film climaxes with an outpouring of compassion from all the community (contrasting their hostility at the beginning of the film) to Yara's family when they learn of her father's death in Syria. More than they realised, TJ and Yara's community meals have sown a sense of solidarity between the two cultures. The film concludes with a procession of the old miners' clubs in Durham to a blessing at the Cathedral, with TJ and a Syrian Refugee holding a banner depicting an Oak Tree with the words Strength, Solidarity and Resistance written in Arabic and English.

Had the communities found hope?

Good Friday cannot not be understood without Easter Day – the pain of Good Friday demonstrates Christ's solidarity with our own suffering, and his resurrection on Easter Day demonstrates that with God there is always hope: nothing is impossible. In the Old Oak, TJ found his Easter through unexpected kindness from strangers, it gave him hope when all seemed impossible.

May the hope of Easter inspire us to reach out with kindness and compassion to all we meet,

Hempstead Toads

The season is nearly over now for the Toad Patrol at Rookery Pond and Tim Venes reports that the total to date is 1,420 toads, plus a few frogs and newts (including three great crested newts, which we don't normally see). We've lost about 140 toads to traffic, i.e. 10% of the total saved, which is about normal. The total is fewer than last year, when it was about 1,830 toads. This was lower than our average total over the years, so it looks as though there may be a reduction in the local population, although we can't be sure of this, or of any possible causes. Selbrigg seems to have experienced a much bigger reduction in the last couple of years based on their reported numbers and some other sites also look to have seen a decline, although others are holding up well - quite baffling!

The 80th Anniversary of D-Day – 6th June 2024

On Saturday 13th April, from 2pm 'til 4pm in the Village Hall, the Crafty Creations group will be making poppies to display outside the Village Hall for the 80th D-Day Landings celebration and remembrance at the beginning of June. These poppies can be made in any way - knitted, crocheted, sewn, made from recycled materials or anything else that can be reshaped into a poppy. As is being chosen by most places around the country, the colours chosen are mostly red for people, with purple for animals and white for peace.

We invite anyone, young or not, who would like to come along and join in, to do just that. We are a friendly, informal bunch so you can be sure to receive a warm welcome with tea or coffee and a biscuit to keep you going. Please bring your preferred choice of poppy materials along with you if possible although we will have a small selection available. Anyone also wishing to continue making poppies at home after this event will be very welcome, between now and the end of May when we will be assembling the display - the more the merrier. Hopefully in June there won't be quite as much rain so the poppies made will survive the weather outside as they will be on display for a few weeks, including the Open Gardens event on 6th and 7th July.

It's a hoot!

Wildlife measures in Bure



Regular walkers along the village green river bank upstream of the Mill will have noticed the log baffles that have appeared in the water with the aim of gently diverting the flow where the river was dredged last year. The Environment Agency asked the parish council to take these measures, along with the planting of small groups of trees and shrubs on the river bank, to improve the area for wildlife. Breaking up the flow in this straight stretch of river creates eddies and currents that help keep the river bed in good condition. The two baffles secured on the privately-owned far bank have been installed with the agreement and help of the owner, and at its March meeting the parish council put on record its thanks to Tom Robinson for all his help, including supplying the logs.

Volunteers have also tackled the nettles and brambles that were taking over near Duck End where horses were once able to go down to the river to drink. This will enable easier access to the river bank.

Trimming playground trees

Some of the trees close to the village green playground are beginning to overgrow the play equipment and will be trimmed back. The parish council consulted tree surgeons and has been advised that, while some trees need relatively minor work, the weeping willow needs cutting back by about half to reduce the risk of branches falling under their own weight. It may be unsightly at first, but the tree is in good health and will recover strongly.

Help our Hedgehogs

Not many years ago virtually every garden had spiky visitors every night. Not so any more. A national hedgehog population of 30 million in 1950 has crashed to 800,000 – and it is still falling. The ball of spines defence that served hedgehogs so well for generations is no protection against the threats brought by humanity – not just the wheels of vehicles on the road, but slug pellets, strimmers, too tidy gardens and impenetrable fences.

In Corpusty & Saxthorpe public green space is being managed with wildlife in mind by the parish council, Village Hall Committee and hard-working volunteers. We can follow this example in our own back yards, and hedgehogs can be helped by a few simple actions:

Avoid using slug pellets and other chemicals. Don't be too tidy – leave some undisturbed piles of branches and dead leaves in a quiet spot. You could even have a hedgehog house for shelter. Leave some areas of longer grass and check for hidden hedgehogs before strimming or mowing.

Make sure they can travel between gardens – cut a small hole in the fence (the size of a CD) to create a hedgehog highway.

Provide water. With warmer winters many do not hibernate and struggle to find food. If you feed them (they love kitten biscuit) it's best to have a flapped feeding station to deter rats.

The children of Corpusty Primary had a visit from Hallswood Animal Sanctuary to learn all about hedgehogs! Caroline Randell is championing the hedgehogs' cause on the parish council.

Are you ready for digital phones?

The switch from the old analogue phone system to a digital network is already underway - but this may not be good news for everyone. The big issue is that, unlike the old system, in a power cut the new digital system will also go down. Last month's presentation by county councillor Stefan Aquarone at Corpusty Village Hall stressed the importance of vulnerable people (aged over 70, ill or disabled) contacting their phone provider (BT, Sky, Virgin etc.) to register for extra support, such as battery back-up to keep their phones live.

Anyone who has a special landline service, such as telecare support, personal alarm, medical monitoring, or security system, should contact the service provider or device supplier for advice. Be aware that fraudsters may see this as an opportunity, so don't buy anything or sign up to contracts without first checking with your current provider.

Finally, in an emergency dialing 999 on your mobile, even in a poor signal area, may well get through, so keep your mobile charged!

The Village Gardener-To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

April can be one of the busiest months of the year in the garden and one of the loveliest if the weather gods play fair! Fingers and toes crossed on that one, so far, we have only had a few good days in the garden, but those we have had have been a joy. You can really sense the year finally turning into easier times, there is something so magical about seeing the hedges finally starting to green up and the trees about to burst into leaf . . . Thank Goodness for Spring!

Talking of spring . . . we are having to rethink our tulip collection in the walled garden here, we had been growing some stunning Menton tulips (very tall and a beautiful pale pink colour) Last spring I did notice a couple had split colour wise but hadn't been too concerned. This year the whole Menton bed has come up with striped leaves, so that sadly is the end of growing tulips in the walled garden (for at least for the next three years!) as we believe it's the Tulip breaking virus (TBV). This is the same virus that caused 'Tulipomania' an absolutely fascinating 'craze' in the Netherlands in the 17th century, where these flower break patterns (they can be very beautiful to look at) were highly prized and as such commanded huge prices. Sadly, the bottom literally fell out of the market due to the instability of the break patterns as they would not necessarily repeat each following year and so the craze ended. Whilst in no rush to re-enact 'Tulip Fever' in our own back garden, part of me would like to see how stunning they are going to look, before we have to dig them up but only when I have done lots of homework on the TBV just in case it causes issues for other plant groups. I will report back!

Elsewhere in the garden we are trying to simplify some areas and make others more effective, we have decided to try and designate one large area to 'no mow' May, we'd love to see more wildlife in the garden and both of us have always been fond of mowed paths through long grass so we are going to try it this year to see if it works. We've also been looking at any other areas in the garden that are either not happy or not thriving or who are really labour intensive, at the end of the day the aim is to try and garden as effectively as possible, with the most harmonious results . . . Well, that's the plan!

Now back to April's to do list! This month is all about getting set for direct seed sowing in May or as soon as the ground feels warm enough, it's also the time to get the greenhouse ready to get your tomato plants in, it always helps to give the compost or new grow bags a chance to warm up first if you can, before planting them out. Also, if you want to get a head start with your salad leaves then do try the gutter method, it really works. Basically, you get short lengths of gutter (the same widths as your beds ideally) fill them with compost and set your salad leaves in them in the greenhouse, this works particularly well for repeat sowing as you can keep refreshing your salad bed as soon as it starts to look depleted. A much better solution then those bags of salad at the supermarket that seem to go over as soon as you get them home.

Now to this month's question, which is from Jill Roy regarding the various Bergenia's she has in her garden, especially with what sounds like a rather lovely red leafed one from Beth Chatto's Garden, which is reluctant to flower. Tricky one to answer without seeing them in place, but sounds to me like it might be being a bit fussy about where it's situated, even though it sounds like you have other varieties that are happy there. I would keep cutting off any unhappy leaves, but I would also consider splitting them to remove any spent plants from the middle to invigorate the ones you have left, but I wouldn't feed them (they really don't like being fed) could you also possibly try moving some of them to a patch of your garden that has poorer dryer soil with more sun and see if they thrive there? Do let us know how you get on and good luck!

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
