Dear All,

Over the last six months I have been in weekly WhatsApp contact with a father (P)*, who with his daughter (M), have been living in the Church of the Holy Family in Gaza. They along with many others sought shelter here after the tragedy of 7th October.

His messages have given me a glimpse into the utter desperation of those who have been in Gaza. And I am conscious that men, women and children - on both sides - have been so deeply affected and will be so for so many years ahead.

In truth my weekly messages (often written early on a Sunday morning) have been hard. How can one understand what it is like to shelter for months in a place where the sound of gun fire fills the air? Any message of hope seemed vacuous, and sometimes I simply did not know what to write other than to assure them of my prayers.

Yet last week when I was on holiday I received a WhatsApp in which P told me they made to the crossing at Rafah and then to Cairo.

"It was not easy for us. The road was dangerous. They fired on us. We don't have any . . . money now." "[M] has lost everything."

Yes, they have reached relative safety, but at what cost? For 6 months they have survived with a regime: M had sweeping duties and made bread. There was a community. They focused on trying to survive and leave Gaza, but what is their future?

So when I returned to the Benefice to take a service at Edgefield after Easter I was deeply struck by a tent pitched in the Lady Chapel (see pic)illustrating what a refugee family may have with them. There was an alarm clock, charger, phone, one photo frame, some food, a sleeping bag and other essentials. Perhaps money, and id documents.

The plight of a refugee is something that is sometimes too hard to think about. Can we imagine what we would take if we had moments to leave our homes? The most important thing for P, was M's safety.

In the Gospels after the resurrection Jesus frightens and confuses his disciples by appearing physically before them. And then he says a word "peace", conveying a sense of security. They need peace – they need courage – as the disciples are worried, they will meet the same fate as Jesus. And yet there he is standing before them showing them that God has triumphed over death in the resurrection.



I do not know the fate of P and M or of my friends in Gaza; we cannot predict how communities will rebuild themselves when all has been taken away.

What I believe we can do – and this was the essence of my early morning WhatsApps – is to place all before God and say as we said on Easter Morning, *kyrie eleison*, Lord have mercy.

Toad Patrol

We're delighted to report that we welcomed some new patrollers this year, meaning a good number of us were out and about covering the main migration routes around the pond each evening. Due to the mild weather the migration started early this year and lasted longer, with the first toad on 23rd January and it continued until 20th March.

The number of toads was up from 283 last year to 322 this year; we also saw an increase in the number of great crested newts, up from 32 to 38, and an increase in common newts up from 239 to 314. The total number of frogs was dramatically down from 118 to just 39. We also lost 22 toads, 14 common newts, 7 great crested newts and 3 frogs to traffic, 6-4% of the overall figures.

The reduction in the number of frogs was down across the county so was not unique to Edgefield; we are all unclear as to why there has been such a decline. We will have to see what next season brings. Many thanks to all of you who undertook patrols.

Norfolk Hedgerow Oaks



Here in North Norfolk, we are blessed with wonderful landscapes, wide open fields and narrow lanes that connect the many small villages so beloved with the locals and visitors alike.

During the winter period this landscape is at its austere best, with its severely clipped hawthorn hedges, fields ploughed and furrowed providing a texture that is all bought to life by the magnificent oaks that bestride the scene, their skeletal and wonderfully articulated

superstructure of branches for all to see, soon to be hidden by their spring and summer clothing.

One particular tree catches my attention, driving from Holt to Hempstead having passed the Hempstead watermill on the left where I am drawn uphill and attended by carefully clipped hawthorn hedges on either side to a gap at the top that is filled completely by an ivy clad oak that I have named, "The Hempstead Oak" it is not the most beautiful oak tree in Norfolk it is lopsided, windswept and seems to be pointing down the farm track that leads to Hempstead Hall.

In its position there, accompanied by the clipped hedgerows it takes on a life of its own and shouts "Look me! I am special! Second only to my dear departed friend the famous or infamous "Sycamore Gap Tree" RIP."

The Parish Council is to revisit the problem of speeding traffic on the B1149 Holt road through Saxthorpe after a disappointing report from county Highways. A mini-roundabout at the junction with Briston Road (B1354) has already been ruled out, but the report provided little hope that other options, such as making a tighter left turn on to Briston Road, would be effective or affordable.

Happy First Birthday 'Coffee, Cake and Chat'

On being appointed as Churchwardens last February Jill Perry Warner & Lesley Last felt there was a real need to increase public use of St Andrews Church at Saxthorpe to make sure it remains a vital place of peace, prayer, and sanctuary in our community.

The idea of Coffee, Cake & Chat was born and, with the blessing of the PCC plans were put in place to turn our beautiful church into a coffee and cake drop-in centre each Wednesday morning - no mean feat given St Andrews has no running water or kitchen facilities. Jill and Lesley's commitment was to be there every Wednesday from 10am until 11am for 12 months although their husbands were sceptical saying that they would be on their own throughout January & February! If only they knew . . .



Knowing church coffee has a bit of a 'dubious' reputation, it was agreed that this would be different. The coffee would be fresh, strong, and hot, the cakes would be delicious and home made - achieved with thanks to an ever-expanding army of bakers.



It was important to be open to all - religious or not and from neighbouring villages too, and there would be no charge, (although people are invited to donate if they are able).

It all began on the first Wednesday in May 2023. And so, you could say, that the rest is history, but that would make it sound too easy. During the year they've welcomed the Marsham Belles (hand bell ringing group), a classic car rally, bug hotel building, calligraphy demonstration, aromatherapy, and hand massages, not to mention the 100 or so members of the local community - retired people, young families, home or part time workers, and



grandparents with grandchildren - all of whom now regularly attend

As winter approached they were successful in drawing down a grant from the Norfolk Community Foundation 'surviving winter fund', which along with support from the Diocese of Norwich's Energy and Warm Spaces fund and the Deanery of Holt Youth Fund, allowed St Andrews to become a designated local 'warm space' – with heating and cosy blankets.

The feedback has been terrific; some from people who've never before set foot in St Andrews, and others who've met neighbours from this and other villages for the first time.

The big question is; what happens now the year is up? Will there be a year two? You bet!! Come along on any Wednesday to see for yourself.

The Village Gardener-To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

Beautiful May! Quite simply the loveliest but busiest month of the year in the garden . . . as I write this in the middle of April, we have been rather off brief with cold temperatures, high winds and torrential rain. But at the weekend we had a real glimmer of what's hopefully to come in May. Lovely blue skies, warm sun and the garden seemed to give a sigh of relief!

So what's on the to-do list this month? The quick answer is literally everything! May is the busiest month of the year, so this month is mainly getting seeds in the ground and lots of weeding. But also being mindful that we can still get caught out with late frosts, the owners of a garden Mick has taken on asked him to put their lemon trees out earlier this month, as we both talked about it, we recalled a very treasured lemon tree we had lost to a frost many years ago. Much gardening is 'doing' but also 'not doing' and the last thing those lemon trees needed was a blast of icy winds in April. So patience is a virtue and the lemon trees are still tucked up and snug until at least the end of May!

Whilst not strictly gardening talk, I wanted to pass on something lovely. A few weeks ago waiting outside the doctors at Aldborough surgery I struck up conversation with a super knowledgeable chap who despite it being a very overcast day told me the name of each and every bird that was singing. Then last weekend as we were all eating our lunch outside the conversation came round to the Merlin App that helps identify birds by their song. Nearly an hour later with apps installed we had had the most enjoyable time identifying 14 different varieties of song birds in our garden. The app also helps you to remember which bird is which by highlighting their name as it picks up a particular song. We knew we had a few hearty wrens, but we

were also made up to discover, linnets, chiffchaffs, chaffinches, gold finches, dunnocks, nut hatches, willow warblers and yellow hammers.

This month (instead of answering one of your questions . . . back to normal next month) I am going to remind you about the NGS Open Gardens at Blickling Lodge, Blickling NR11 6NF on Sunday 19th May 12-5pm. It really is the most beautiful of gardens with a Georgian house surrounded by 17 acres of glorious parkland, with a walled garden and stunning woodland and water garden. Like last year the refreshments are all in aid of the Matlaske Benefice (a most worthy cause) and we both very much hope to see you there!


