## Letter from the Rector–Reverend Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

#### Dear All,

Recently I asked the Bishop of Norwich to explain why the Church of England had set aside £100 million "for marginalised and vulnerable groups, in particular communities impacted by historic African chattel enslavement." This is a question I have been asked many times.

It is a 'hot topic' as the church is correctly identified as having huge assets, but little free cash. I am always mindful Parish Churches are constantly struggling to raise money to keep the ministry in the church alive, and so we may ask why this money is being put aside.

The Bishop explained that the Church Commissioners (of which he is one) look after money to help specified projects and to pay for Cathedrals and Bishops. Although the fund has grown extraordinarily, it is not for the day-to-day running of parishes like ours. In 2019, the Commissioners investigated whether it had been invested in the slave trade. Many have applauded the investigation, others not, with some even sending hate mail.

The Bishop explained how, as a child brought up in Ghana, he had made sandcastles on a beautiful beach outside a slave fort which, years later, he had visited seeing slaves' holding cells. One cell had been excavated (pictured) showing the brick floor, another maintained its dirt floor. This 'dirt' was detritus made by 1000s of slaves being packed into cells with nowhere to clean or relieve themselves.

Above the cells a chapel was built where a chaplain preached and cared for the garrison (did the chaplain heard the cries from the cells as he preached?).

The Commissioners found that the fund had been invested in the South Sea Company for 111 years and that c.20% of the current fund derives from this investment. The South Sea Company, created to service the government's debt following the wars in Europe, was involved in the slave trade, for instance it contracted the Royal African Company which shipped slaves to the West Indies.

The research also revealed that the then Archbishop of Canterbury had been written to by slaves petitioning for freedom; and a "Slave Bible" used on plantations was uncovered. This Bible had key texts removed, such as the book of Exodus where Moses tells Pharaoh to "let my people go" (5.1), and the verse in Galatians where St Paul writes "in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith... there is no longer slave or free" (3.26,28).

The Commissioners would like other organisations to donate to this fund, recognising that £100m is a

drop in the ocean.

Yet, are Commissioners right to do this? I believe the reasoning is laudable and the fund will make a difference (they are not reparation funds). I realise too - as noted - that Churches like ours are still struggling to balance their books.

The situation is complex. Jesus said "the truth will set you free" (John 8.31) - the truth is the Church of England invested in the slave trade, which the £100m seeks to address. Slavery however remains alive - c.50 million are estimated to be enslaved. Should we also address this truth? I believe we must.


#### More of Hempstead Trees

#### Tree trimming

The trees growing over village green playground equipment have now been cut back. Lower branches on the horse chestnut have been removed, but the very noticeable difference is in the weeping willow, which had to be reduced in size because of the risk of heavy branches dropping. Although it looks a sorry sight, the tree surgeons told that Parish Council that it is healthy and are confident it will recover strongly.

#### No-mow on green

Much of the northern half of the village green will be left un-mowed until July, apart from paths along the river and overflow stream, and diagonal paths across the meadow. The aim is to encourage wild flowers, although some additional seeding may be needed.

#### Little London Allotments

The Parish Council has been advised that the clearance of overgrown allotments should now wait until the autumn or early next year. A working group has been set up to look at how best to bring them back into use in ways that would benefit the wider community while keeping part of the site as a wildlife area.

Please remember that recycling and rubbish bins should only be left on the public road when the bin collection is due. Since the pandemic, some householders have been leaving their bins out permanently. Normally, they shouldn't be put out sooner than the evening before collection.

#### The Village Gardener-To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

#### To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

I have always had a proper soft spot for June which was probably helped along (when I was younger) by having a birthday in the first week of the month. I can remember seeing the blossoms coming out on the horse chestnut trees like icing turrets on a cake thinking not long now! May has always felt like an extended drumroll with all the trees, leaves and flowers coming out and then June was the Ta dah! Moment.

Creating a garden that looks effortless takes an awful lot of work patience and good luck weather wise. As I write this it's just a few days before the 18 acre garden my partner has worked in for 22 years and helped create is open for NGS Open Gardens....I know it will look stunning but that's only after weeks and weeks of preparation and years and years of sheer graft and determination. So I am hoping he has a brilliant Open Gardens day and the weather behaves. Now back to our own hopefully shorter to do lists!



Just like May....June is super busy in the garden but as I cannot think of a nicer place to be, that's just how it should be. So there is a lot of sowing to get done, do try and keep on top of the weeding. It can be faintly terrifying if your to do list is lengthy. So wait till you have dry day and using a sharpened hoe try and keep them in check. Now should also be a good time to basil planted, I would stick with growing it in your greenhouse unless you are really sheltered, we

are super exposed here so anything as tender as basil always looks very sorry for itself. Don't forget the trick with basil is to only water it in the morning. My other tip with herbs is to make sure you grow enough of them. We tend to grow the following: French leaf parsley, which has a fresher taste to it than curled leaf varieties and is less coarse than Italian leaf parsley. We also grow coriander (never enough of that!) rosemary and thyme (again never have enough thyme) chives and dill-a big favourite here, less pushy in flavour than fennel and it brings such a lovely twist to salads. I grow dill in amongst the flowers in the walled garden, it does always runs to seed but I don't mind as the flower heads are really pretty. This year we are growing holy basil which is supposed to have an amazing flavour. and tarragon for the first time. Lastly I should mention our absolute power house herb which is bay, this gets used nearly every day in our cooking, we have what I call our kitchen bay bushes that are plundered all the time but they are large enough to not mind too much, Thank goodness!

This month's question is from Sue who really struggles with white fly in her greenhouse, but doesn't want to use any chemicals in there. Happily there is a simple and pretty solution and that is to grow French marigolds in amongst your plants in the greenhouse, not only do they look lovely but the

smell of the marigolds specifically the limonene chemical the plants produce acts as a naturally white fly repellent. I have always grown a good dozen or so plants in our fairly small greenhouse, they seem to be more effective if grown in amongst our tomato plants. They also seem to work best if they are planted at the same time as the tomatoes go in. So best of luck!

#### Little Lifts run makes big return



The second Little Lifts Charity Trail Run took place on Sunday 21st April.

We were thrilled to sell out of spaces again and welcome 360 runners to the start line on a very cold and windy morning. Despite the temperature, runners were in great spirits and couldn't help but smile setting off up the avenue in front of the stunning Barningham Hall.

There were three distances (10km, 20km and 30km) and




