# Letter from Ben Diaz - Experiences on placement in the Matlaske Benefice. David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

Dear All.

I have been asked to write a little about my experience on placement here and my journey to ministry - I am currently training to be a licensed Lay Minister. Spending time in the Matlaske Benefice and meeting you all has been a delight – in fact has been transformative. Thank you!

So who am I? I was born in Abu Dhabi into a deeply religious family. My lineage is rich with spiritual leaders: my uncle, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather were all ordained ministers in the Methodist Church, serving in India and after partition, Pakistan. In 1989 after my father's ordination, he was posted to Bethel Methodist Church in Karachi, and my mother and I joined him. Later, in 1997 he was transferred to



Oman, ministering to the Urdu-speaking congregation and in 2003 he joined the Church of England and served in Walsall until his retirement in 2012. In 2015, my wife Aziekah and I, together with our daughters Samantha and Anya, joined him settling in Norfolk in 2017. I now run a catering business and am a Labour Councillor.

Despite my very churchy family, my journey was not straightforward. My youth, spent largely in the Arabian Peninsula, mirrored the desert landscape around me—dry, barren, and spiritually disconnected.

In late 2021, I experienced an accident that left me hurt both mentally and physically. This traumatic event awakened a deep, unrelenting thirst for spiritual connection. I sought guidance from my parish priest and slowly through prayer and reflection discerned a calling to ministry. This brought a sense of peace and transformation, akin to finding an oasis in the desert of my life .

And so began my journey to train to become a Lay Minister.

When Matlaske was suggested as a placement as part of my training, I had no idea where it was! I expected some services, a few Bible studies, and to preach. But I was taken aback – behind the tranquillity of this rural Benefice I found a vibrant caring community, and the extensive work of the church in making Christ known. The relentless efforts of the Ministry Team, Church Wardens and the PCCs are commendable. They taught me that if people are not coming to the church, the church can be taken to the community – the church isn't the building; it is the people - evidenced by the coffee mornings, toddler group, family services, school assemblies, welcoming new families with honey and rosemary, and bringing Communion to those at home. This is an example of the love and care that define this community.

People ask me which area of ministry I feel called to. In truth, I am still exploring, as discerning our calling from God is an ongoing process seeking to be open to God's guidance in prayer. Just as Samuel responded to God's call, I strive to listen and respond to God's voice in my life. I have left it in God's hands to choose how to use me

As my placement ends, I want to thank you all for your welcome and your guidance and as I keep you in prayer, may I ask you to keep me in prayer as I continue my journey seeking to go where God leads. Thank you – I hope to visit again soon.

# Hempstead Church repairs in May

In her Quinquennial report, the Church Architect flagged a crack in one of the A-frames. This has now been braced with a new piece of oak from Hole Farm. On the north side of the roof, slipping tiles and leaks were caused by rotten batons and perished felt. This will now be replaced and, we hope, last another 50-60 years.

Damp getting into the tower has been caused by blown cement render on the east side. Sam and Matt, our excellent builders, have removed the cement and repointed the flint work with lime mortar



which will allow the building to breathe. The flint work under the render was in poor condition and they have now stabilised it.

Inside, a pew has been moved to create a larger social space in the back of the church, and at the rear of the church the shed has been prepared for when we can (hopefully) get a water supply from the redevelopment of the derelict chicken farm.

The cost is being covered by a trust set up by the late Robin Carver, with additional funds raised by Hempstead Arts, the village fete and private donations.

# Taylor-Swift residency at St A's!



OK, so we are talking about the Taylor-cast bells and feathered swifts - and although recordings will be played to attract these amazing birds to the tower of St Andrews, they feature the calls of other swifts, not songs crafted by the global singing sensation.

Two cabinets, each with three swift nest boxes, have been installed in the louvred windows high in the tower. The work was carried out by Caroline Spinks of Norwich Swifts Network, aided by James Kimbley, making St Andrews just the third church in Norfolk to have swift boxes.

"They really are amazing birds," said Caroline. "When they leave the nest it can be two or three years before they land again." Fossils show that swifts have been around for millions of years, but in this country numbers have declined by 60%, largely as a result of new roofing techniques that provide few nooks for nesting.

It is hard to say how long it will be before swifts set up home in St Andrews, but Caroline said that swifts showed interest as soon as the caller system was turned on. "It might take up to two years, but sometimes it is much quicker than that."

Unlike some other birds and bats, swifts are good neighbours and don't stain nest sites with their droppings. Swift boxes, and even swift nest bricks, are widely available if you would like to help these wonderful birds. Thanks to Maureen Kimbley for supporting the cost of the cabinets in St A's.

#### Willow's kindest cut

Corpusty Primary pupil Willow Dixon-Keeling has donated almost 17 inches of her fabulously long locks to help people who have lost their own hair through cancer treatment or other illnesses.

The haircut was carried out by Attic Hair Artistry in Holt and Willow then donated her beautiful tresses to the Little Princess Trust, along with £1400 raised through sponsorship. The Trust is a charity that makes real hair wigs for those who have lost hair through illness.

# The Village Gardener-To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

As I am sat here writing this, basically a High Summer double bill for both July and August, the irony is not lost on me that our wood burner is on and there is a good hearty warming soup on the hob bubbling away nicely, as sadly June is proving to be quite a challenge weather wise. Not so much flaming June as really quite soggy June! However I do think it is preferable to the extreme temperatures and drought we were suffering with this time last year. We have noticed over the past year several trees either fairly young or well established ones, that had been put under such a huge strain by the extreme weather that they have since been badly struggling or have sadly died. Any tree that is really stressed is going to be much more vulnerable. So as I now look out at yet another rainy June day I am consoling myself with the fact that at least this weather is much kinder on our trees!

Meanwhile in the garden it's also not all plain sailing! My main concern at the moment are our dahlias that are being absolutely decimated by slugs! Normally they are such power houses they can outgrow any issues with slugs, this has not been the case this year. My guess is the winter conditions were perfect for slugs and that we have had a big increase in numbers. I have never used slug pellets (and I do not intend so start now!) as I am not a fan. I have used 'slug gone' in the past (a far less toxic solution) whilst I have started my dahlias off in the greenhouse, which has worked quite nicely but I am balking at using lots of it in the garden. I have heard a good tip in the last week which is to soak a wide length of wood and leave it near an affected area, the slugs will then use that as somewhere cool damp and dark to hide out underneath during the day, so you can in turn remove or destroy them then. I will let you know how we get on! Elsewhere in the border the roses have taken a battering too, with many of the buds getting too waterlogged to open properly, the only solution to that is to keep deadheading the failed buds and hope we get enough breaks in the rain so that we get some more blooms.

There are plenty of tasks on the to do list for both July and August...the first of which is to keep tabs on the weeds, difficult when everything is in their favour at the moment! My usual technique of hoeing weeds off on a sunny day isn't working out, so it's the more time consuming alternative of pulling them out. Elsewhere there is loads of pruning to be done, be that perennials in the border so you get a second flourish, wisterias and rambling roses after they have flowered. Your lavenders if you have them will benefit from being cut back too so they don't get leggy. Ditto your perennial herbs such as rosemary, sage, thyme and mint, if you cut them back now they will bounce back nicely before the temperatures start to drop in September. Now is also a good time (end of August) to get a good patch of parsley on its way. We tend to grow the French flat leaf variety as it lasts better than its Italian cousin that can get a bit big and coarse. It's a good plan to soak the



seeds overnight in warm water to attempt to remove the germination inhibitors that coat the seeds before you sow them the next day. If you've got a fairly sheltered spot you should be able to keep your parsley going over most of the winter.

It's hard to predict what sort of weather we will be up against in July and August and what impact it will have on the garden, so it seems best to just roll with what we have and to work with it rather than against it, that's the theory anyway! So with that thought we wish you a good rest of the summer in your garden, whether you are in waders or sandals! We will be here in September in 'Back to School' mode with plans and tasks for the coming months!

This month's question is from Liz Harris who asks when the best time to divide rhubarb plants is, the quick answer Liz is not yet! I would hold on to later in the year, when you have two alternatives, if your plants are simply congested then I would simply cut and divide them and replant in the same spot. If however they have been losing their vitality and are looking a bit sorry for themselves I would cut and divide and replant in another spot in your garden. Rhubarb plants tend to get a bit depleted if they have been in the same spot for longer than 6 to 8 years. Good Luck!

#### Hornsea 3 abnormal loads

Orsted have warned that, as part of the Hornsea 3 wind farm project, abnormal loads will be using roads through our parishes for much of 2024 - including the B1149 Holt Road and B1354 Briston Road.

Starting on 1st of July there will be up to four abnormal loads - 50 tonnes in weight and 4.5m width - during daylight hours on two days of each week. Orsted have said that they will avoid movements close to schools at the beginning and end of the school day. Occasionally other abnormal load movements will necessary, although none of any sort will take place in August, restarting mid-September.

These movements are subject to change, so details may not be available until nearer the time. If you need to avoid these loads, it's a good idea to opt-in to updates by emailing community@hornsea3. co.uk using the subject line: **Hornsea 3 ALM Updates, or by** calling (freephone) 0800 158 2354.


