# Letter from the Rector-Reverend Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

#### Dear All,

Last monthwas the Norfolk Churches Bike Ride, and I bicycled around our 7 villages with two others. As we travelled, one shared the story of Fr Paolo Dall'Oglio (pictured) who christened their child in Damascus, Syria, when they lived near "Straight Street".

Straight Street is famous as St Paul ended up there for three days after he was blinded travelling from Jerusalem when he encountered a vision in which Jesus told him to stop persecuting the Christians. St Paul had been working for the religious leaders in Jerusalem to try to stamp out Christianity. Tradition has it that he approved the stoning

to death of the first Christian martyr, St Stephen. Thus, one of the most famous writers of the church whose writings include the great ode of love in 1 Corinthians 13, may be considered at worst a murderer or at least a zealous persecutor. It was in Straight Street that he was "transformed" from a hater of Christians to a love for Jesus and all humanity.

It is said that a certain man, Ananias, was told by Jesus in a vision to go to Paul and heal him and it is at this place of "healing", now a church, that the child was christened. The christening included ancient rites, with Paolo holding the child high after the baptism and all shouting hosanna.

Paolo, an Italian Roman Catholic priest, having studied Arabic, travelled to Syria in 1982 and came across the dilapidated monastery of Mar Musa al-Habashi (St Moses-the-Ethiopian) built in the 5th/6th century. Paolo restored the monastery, dedicating it to Muslim-Christian dialogue. Although thousands visited, Paolo was often in tension with the local community – he was accused of being stubborn, authoritarian, of being naïve about Islam and the culture. In 2012 he was expelled from the country, having voiced his opposition to President Bashar al-Assad.

Although versions vary, he was last seen in July 2013, having slipped back into the country, heading to Raqqa to negotiate the release of a TV crew. Reports in 2019 suggested he was being used as a bargaining chip when a Kurdish force surrounded an IS Redoubt in Eastern Syria. Later the prison he was believed to be incarcerated in was bombed, and he is assumed dead.

The Gospel reading for the Sunday following the bike ride included Jesus' words that we are to take up our cross and follow him. We all have crosses to carry: some are our hidden pains; others more obvious; and others have a cross thrust on them. Paolo's cross appeared to be his calling to love a place and people that ultimately (in all likelihood) led to his death – martyrdom like St Stephen.

Our crosses are painful. Yet in calling us to carry them (to be honest about them), Jesus says: "Come to me all who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest... for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

May this gentleness be with you all,

## Hempstead Arts

The weekend of 31st August and 1st September saw Hempstead Arts exhibition and sale again this year. This popular event was busier than ever and has built a great reputation for diverse art works affordably priced. The net proceeds raised for the Church was just over £2,800 and will be used to enhance the Church. As you may have seen and has been reported the re-roofing (which alas was more extensive than originally planned) has been completed, and a pew re positioned to give better access at the back of the Church. #### A Crest/Village Sign for Hempstead

Having lived here in Hempstead for twenty plus years I have often pondered the absence of a village crest. We have of course the splendid Hempstead sign that welcomes visitors at Court Green and formally announces the village of Hempstead (although the parish boundary is back towards Holt by Hempstead Mill).

What would be a suitable image that could be incorporated in a design for a carved sign that could grace our splendid village?

I had toyed with the idea of using the hemp plant as an image that might be incorporated in a design. Hemp in medieval times was grown locally and used to make rope and was in great demand by the ships and boats of a trading nation. Today the hemp plant image is often used in connection with the drug trade and might be considered an inappropriate image for our village sign.

I had written earlier this year in the Newsletter about the hedgerow oaks that grace our Norfolk country lanes and in particular about the prominent oak that fills the gap and closes the vista of

hawthorn hedges that lead up from Hempstead Mill. This oak because of its unique shape and position lends itself to be an ideal subject for a village sign. (See the rough image)

If the village is happy with this idea and happy to adopt it, I would happy to execute a carving incorporating the design as a gift to the village, to be displayed in an appropriate location and be known as "The Hempstead Oak"

The use of this as a logo for printed matter would be free to any one living in Hempstead now and in the future.



## The Village Gardener – To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow

This month I am hoping for a good version of October all crisp fresh mornings, beautiful blue skies and golden light, no saucepan lid skies please!. We have already just passed through a rather cold nippy start to September and as I write this in the middle of same said month, it was chilly enough to see your breath this morning. This has got me thinking about who in the garden needs to be packed away sooner rather than later this year. It's always much better and easier to prepare a cosy refuge for your more tender plants now rather than an unhappy scramble when the temperatures do suddenly plummet. I managed to pick up a couple of really beautiful pelargoniums this summer from Salle Open Gardens that have sat happily all summer outside our north facing front door and it's just occurred to me that more space will be required for them! I can also highly recommend a visit to Salle when they open their



gardens over the summer months, their walled kitchen garden is just stunning and absolutely full of beautifully grown veg, herbs and cutting flowers and fruit trees, it was a complete joy to wander around. They do a couple of NGS Open days and they are also open on Tuesdays throughout the summer, so it's well worth a look. The other garden we managed to visit this summer, which completely blew us away was Houghton, having not visited for nearly 30 years I was staggered by the difference. Both the scale and grandeur of Houghton is something else, it's also both impressively maintained and beautifully designed they must have a formidable team of gardeners!

Now back to more humble surroundings! Lots to do in the garden this time of year...if you are

growing leeks these will need earthing up with soil (to help produce a longer blanched and sweet shank for cooking) and whilst we are in the same family group, now is a good time to plant onion and shallot sets and garlic, as they all need to be in the ground before a cold spell which helps trigger them to split and divide this is especially important for garlic. Elsewhere in the garden there is plenty of planning, tidying and sorting to be done. Having lost so many dahlias this year, I have lots of gaps to plan and fill and varieties to track down that I was particularly fond of and who we lost to the long damp winter. Not the worst of the gardening chores! Elsewhere in the garden we are planning to grown more fruit trees, especially quince, having struggled on for years with our two beautifully pollarded quince it's time to accept that the relentless powdery mildew they suffer with means they are just really unhappy where they are in our walled garden. So the plan is to start again and plant a pair of quinces and a good old Norfolk variety cooking apple (either a Norfolk Beauty or Norfolk Dumpling both irresistible names) on our top lawn, I for one cannot think of anything nicer than having too many quinces!!

Finally for this month I wanted to share something sad yet hopeful, for the past few years we have barely had any swallows here in our garden, however this year we had two swallows swooping and diving around in May, then all quiet again and then in late July early August we had a delightful flock of 11 swallows who used both the telephone wires and tree in our garden for 'training school' purposes, no idea where they had been nesting but they were an utter joy. Then finally on Sunday we had over 100 swallows all lined up on the wires all set to leave for warmer climes, whilst so sad to see them leaving (swallows I think are one of the most cheering of birds) it was encouraging that so many of them had gathered there. Fingers crossed we get to see some of them next year!

This month's question comes from MaryAnn who asks if it is possible to grow a large leaf lime tree from a sucker removed from its original parent tree, sadly it isn't....the sucker needs to use the original root system from the parent tree. However all is not lost! As October is the start of bare root season so it's easy and inexpensive way to start a large leaf lime tree off...Good Luck!

#### Nature Watch

#### Building our views of the sea

'Very flat, Norfolk.' So said playwright Noel Coward. Really! Did he try to ascend Bard Hill, Salthouse, on a pushbike? I doubt it! If he had, that statement would have been retracted as he encountered this special feature of our Norfolk coastline, for we have something that our adjoining counties



of Suffolk and Lincolnshire do not possess - a huge glacial moraine left behind by the last Ice Age some 12,000 years ago. Known as the Cromer Ridge, it gives us hills that rise to over 200 feet quite close to the coast, and spectacular views of sea and coastline.

Imagine the power of those glaciers that moved these millions of tons of rocks and spoil several hundred miles. Stones found in the moraine are known to have emanated from as far away as Scandinavia. It was our good fortune that the North Norfolk coast was as far as the glaciers reached before retreating, leaving us with these hills to enjoy.

Head to the coast and whichever route you choose you will need to descend this ridge. One favourite of mine is Colgate Hill on the drop from Kelling to Weybourne, but you are spoilt for choice: Bard Hill Salthouse, the Runtons and Cley offer the same vistas. A cycle is perhaps the best way of seeing them. You can zoom down at high speed, but far better to stop and take in the view as the sea, coast and marshes open up ahead of you. I realise you now have a big hill to climb on the way back, but the reward for those views makes it a small price to pay.


