Letter from the Rector - Reverend Canon David Longe



Dear All

Churches are dominated by the cross, often reflected in their layout with the chancel at the east end set at an angle to represent how Jesus' head hung in death. While this may seem grim, the cross serves as a reminder that Jesus triumphed over suffering through the mystery of the resurrection, urging us to look beyond what we endure to hope and life.

Since ancient times the cross has been an object of scorn. A 2nd century graffiti on the Palatine Hill in Rome, known as the "Alexamenos graffito" (have a Google), mocks a Christian by depicting the cross with a donkey's head.

I write about the cross not only because grappling with the



Our assemblies begin with a lit candle, Jesus being removed from a cross and a moment's silence. Generously, Kay Corbett offered to replicate the cross as a gift for the school. With the help of Steve Carman, expertly sourced and sawed local wood for it, she carved a beautiful new cross.

The cross is carved from beech, its uniquely grained stained by fungus. The removable image of Jesus is intricately carved from an oak burr, with the stand also made of oak. Three prongs of reclaimed ebony represent the nails in Jesus' hands and feet and serve as a reminder of the suffering in the world.

The cross is a gift to the school, which can be stored safely when not in use. I am deeply grateful to Steve and Kay for creating something so special.

I hope these assemblies teach the children something about Christianity. Whether or not they attend church, my prayer is that this cross, along with our discussions, helps them see Jesus as a man of love and peace, a worthy role model. Despite the grimness of the crucifixion, the cross points to the mysterious yet wonderful promise of hope.

Moses was wrong to kill the Egyptian, but did he get his 'just deserts'? That is a question worth grappling, especially in the light of Jesus' words from the cross "forgive them for they do not know what they do" (Luke 23.34). Moses died, having glimpsed the beauty of the Holy Land from Mt Nebo. Jesus died forgiving those who were crucifying him. Today the land that Moses longed to live in is marred by violence. The message of the cross is one of hope, even amid great suffering.

My prayer this Eastertide is that you find hope in the mystery of the empty cross.

A Message from Baconsthorpe Parish Council

Keeping Baconsthorpe clean - Proper use of dog waste bins.

Baconsthorpe has two dedicated dog waste bins – one at the Castle and one at Long Lane – provided and maintained by the Parish Council. These bins are intended for use by dog walkers while out and about helping to keep our village clean and pleasant for everyone.

However, there has been a recent increase in the disposal of dog waste from private gardens into these bins causing them to fill up faster than usual. We kindly ask residents to dispose of garden waste in their black household bins which are collected fortnightly,

The Parish Council funds the emptying of the dog bins once a month at a cost of £112 for the year 2024-2025. This expense is covered by the Parish Council's share of the Council Tax and we aim to avoid increasing the cost to keep expenses – and ultimately Council Tax – low for residents.

Your cooperation in using these bins appropriately is greatly appreciated. Let's work together to maintain a clean and cost effective community. Thank you for your support.



St Michael's Church


The PCC are awaiting revised estimates for the work needed to create a better community space within the church. This project stalled last year but we hope to get on with it in 2025.

Village Gateways - at last!

Long-awaited improvements to signs on the approaches to Saxthorpe and Corpusty have come a step closer. These will include gateway-style signs, most of which will say 'Welcome to Saxthorpe - Please drive carefully'. These will be on the

approaches from Briston (B1354), Holt (B1149), Matlaske, and Aylsham/Norwich (B1149). The Parish Council has already paid for the gateway signs, and it is hoped that these will remind drivers that they entering villages and should slow down. After long delays Norfolk Highways have produced fresh proposals and the Parish Council is keen that installation should be carried out as soon as possible. As well as the busy roads north of the main village, there will be improved signs on the Heydon Road, Corpusty.

River Inspection

The Parish Council has carried out its annual inspection of the river next to the village green. It was noted that the baffles installed last year to encourage wildlife (following advice

from the Environment Agency) are altering the flow, as intended, but that they are also causing silting and weed grown that may need attention.

Children Youth & Families

Sunnier weather, Easter holidays, craft workshops and mothering Sunday seem to have made time speed by. Across the seven villages there are signs of all sorts of awakenings! Children, youth and families are very much present. To focus on one village this month: Saxthorpe/Corpusty Village. The village hall hosts drama lessons for children on a Friday evenings. The Brownie pack grows and is a strong group on a Tuesday evening. The village boasts two good playgrounds for children. The village had a litter pick and children were welcome to join in. The village shop is a great place for treats and ice cream on a hot day. Coffee, Cake & Chat at the Church on Wednesdays 10-11 has a growing children's area and crafts for school children in the holidays. The village hall breakfast fortnightly is a great outing for the whole family. The pub has regular bands with local musicians. The school is expanding and in an idyllic village setting.

The Churches

Children across the parishes children received a terracotta flower pot as an Easter gift and were invited to come and paint it. Saxthorpe, Edgefield and Barningham Winter churches held workshops and excited children came and got creative, stayed for refreshments and played awhile. It was very enjoyable and successful. Such a shame Corpusty was hit by the chicken pox but recovered children could at least pop along to any of the sessions. Mothering Sunday saw families pour out to a traditional honouring of mothers and those that nurture and care. Saxthorpe with the brownies helping had 22 children - a lively and joyful occasion. On Good Friday Baconsthorpe church hosted a Holy Week service around the cross, children gathered in the village hall to engage in some cooking and crafts joining the adults afterwards in the church for tasty hot cross buns and treats. Easter Sunday and Edgefield Church had lots going on for the whole family, building an easter garden, a craft and a treasure hunt in the church yard which of course culminated in a chocolate egg.



At school, pupils of my generation were always told our county's highest point was at Piggs Grave near Melton Constable. This was as agreed by the Ordnance Survey. Their one-inch map of the time showed Piggs Grave at 323 feet, whereas that later Young Pretender Beacon Hill at West Runton was slightly lower at 320 feet. Case proved wouldn't you say?

Well not necessarily, as later maps using metric heights gave Beacon Hill 102 metres (334 feet) with Piggs Grave 101 metres (331 feet). I was never convinced by this later upstart's claim. At Piggs Grave you can climb up to the trig point, put your hand on it and say this is Norfolk's highest point. You cannot do this at Beacon Hill, there is no specific trig point there, just a spot height somewhere on the road.

Now a few years ago, a colleague Robbie N and myself have often thought that Bodham Hill near the tall mast on New Road might be a contender for Norfolk's highest point. The Ordnance Survey in their wisdom did not calculate any heights up this stretch of road, and so we were determined to correct this omission. Armed with suitable measuring and levelling instruments we started from a known bench mark at the bottom of the hill and worked our way up to the top. Result? 326 feet.

Ah well - at least we can claim it as Norfolk's third highest, and there are some lovely views from up there looking in a south-westerly direction towards Melton Constable.

One thing that can never be taken away from us: Norfolk has the lowest 'High Point' of all the English counties. Even Cambridgeshire, half of which appears to be below sea level, has a higher high point than ours. Fame or what?

Joyful May! Quite simply the loveliest of months and quite possibly the busiest yet most beautiful month in the garden. The to-do list might well be endless and you probably won't get through half of it (I know I won't!)...but May is a joy and one we have waited all Winter for. In a vain attempt at efficiency, I have taken to having to having three lists on the go, a list for the greenhouse because it's literally all going on in there and a general outdoor gardening list and then there's my fantasy island list of all the extras I would like to get done but as there are only 24 hrs in a day and a limited budget...I don't stand a chance...But what is a garden if not an aspirational dream!! And there is nothing nicer than dreaming about gardens.

So back to the lists, there is happily a lot of seed sowing to be done this month and potting up. So do make sure you are stocked up with potting compost. However we are back to that

same frustrating scenario of having looked at our overwhelming amount of plastic flower pots last winter, thinking we could move a few of them on and now finding we don't have anywhere near enough. Mental note to self to come up with a different way to store them over the winter so they don't look like an unruly muddle that urgently needs de cluttering. Gardening...it's all lessons ... literally all of the time.

Try to remember to successional sow your salad leaves and anything else that has a quick growing turnover you want a steady supply of, I find it really useful to note dates down on our calendar so I have a visual reminder of when I next need to do some sowing and so I don't get over run with too many salad leaves that have bolted and then are too bitter and inedible.

Hopefully If all goes to plan our courgette plants should be ready to go out at the end of the month, it's always so tempting to get a head start and get them out earlier and it's never worth it, frosts are particularly disastrous to both courgette and pumpkin plants and all it takes is a sneaky drop in temperature and your back to square one again. I did read a good tip about soaking your courgette plants well before planting them out so I shall definitely be trying that one. At the same time I am planting out the courgettes I will be sowing the basil in the greenhouse, again any earlier and basil just sulks (even in the greenhouse...unless you've got a bit of heat in yours) I will also be planting out (in the greenhouse) my tomatoes aubergines and chilli peppers a red letter day if ever there was one. Happy May!

No question this month but instead a shameless plug regarding 'Blickling Lodge NGS Open Garden' on Sunday 8th June if you've not been before it is the most stunning beautiful garden all

17 acres of it, a proper labour of love complete with cricket pitch, walled garden, woodland and water garden. All the money raised from refreshments on the day will go towards the Matlaske Benefice. Do come along... it really is the most lovely way to spend a June afternoon!




