Dear Readers

Summer is upon us and flowers have been on my mind as I watch my, new to me, garden unfolding in Edgefield. We have inspirational Open Gardens ahead and Chelsea Flower Show behind us.

Flowers in church are very important to me. So many creative and generous people ensure the flowers on display brighten and cheer our sacred spaces. The flower arrangers work not only with the changes in the season and flower availability, but the Church calendar too, which can be a



challenge. During Lent there are generally no flowers, and this can be a real hardship and reflects this sacred period of abstinence from some of life's pleasures. We so often too, remember those we see no more with flowers in our churchyards.

There are references to flowers throughout the Bible, which can affect our mood and relax us. For example: Flowers appear on the earth, the season of singing has come, the cooing of doves is heard in our land. (Song of Solomon 2:12).

It is easy to be uplifted when we think of flowers blooming, the joy of singing with friends and the mesmerising sound of cooing doves.

Rather like human beings, flowers can be full of cheer or at other times full of hidden meaning, which can leave you pondering as in these Gospel verses that follow: Look at the lilies and how they grew: They don't work or make clothing, yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are. And if God cares so wonderfully for flowers that are here today and thrown into the fire tomorrow, he will certainly care for you. (Luke 12:27).

It is not only the beauty of flowers which affect our senses. Recently whilst officiating at a small funeral, the mother placed hand picked dark red and pink roses on the white coffin. Their fragrance was overwhelming and charged the atmosphere in the crematorium. So much love had gone into the growing and the harvesting of these beautiful blooms, and their perfume transformed the omnipresent sadness into something lighter. Some fragrances from flowers are captured and made into costly perfumes. Mary used aromatically smelling Nard, made from the roots of a rare flowering plant to anoint the feet of Jesus, during his last days as a sign of her love and faithfulness.

Flowers and their lavish perfumes transform our senses in ways which can intensify and deepen our everyday experiences. At significant life events like weddings and funerals they can take our understanding to another and different level of perception.

My heartfelt thanks to all those enlivening our churches with divine and delightful flowers throughout the seasons, with such love and faithfulness.

Sara Buxton - Deeply Missed by All



A huge cloud has descended over Barningham Winter with the untimely death of Sara Buxton, who was loved by all Daughter wife mother grandmother



all. Daughter, wife, mother, grandmother, Amelia Courtauld farmer, friend and community leader, she 01263 577250 was part of all our lives.

Sara seemed impregnable, ready to face dragons, and in full command of whatever she was doing. Her approach to rural life made anything possible. A mischievous glance across the PCC table, a giggle when something had not gone quite right, combined with a determination that practicalities need to be thoroughly considered, so that anything the

parish did was not only a success but done with style. Why use basic crockery for her delicious soup when Sara's beautiful Bridgewater set could be used by all!

Part of the Hannant farming dynasty, Sara grew up at Barningham Rectory and devoted her life to the people, land and cattle that surrounded the Rectory and Wells Farm, where she and Roger lived for over forty years. First with her father, Fred, then joined by Roger, they were a team that grappled with all the challenges thrown at farmers. She raised four fabulous children, Rachael, Rebecca, Ruth and Joe, and then became super granny to nine grandchildren as well as a much loved aunt and supportive cousin.

How could she have time for anything else? But Sara did, and never made a fuss. Cooking community lunches at Aldborough, organising fundraisers, key holder for neighbours - Sara found time for everyone. History doesn't record how many fêtes, garden openings, strawberry teas, sponsored walks, flower festivals, scrabble and quiz evenings, harvest lunches/suppers or wreath making days she organised during her 70 years. Nor do we know how many gallons of delicious soup she made, or the hundreds of cakes, mince pies, sausage rolls and naughty Mars Bar crispies she produced for local events, or left at people's doors when they were going through a rough patch. All typical of the positive and selfless way that she lived her life.

Sara was devoted to St Mary's, Barningham Winter and proud of her family's long association with its care and history. Many Hannant and Buxton christenings, marriages and funerals have taken place there and she has repaid the kindness of St Mary's with her service to it and its preservation.

Our lives are changed by Sara's passing. Fundraising, meetings, cleaning sessions, church services, soup and the fête's tombola will never be the same. She will be deeply missed forever by us all.

Rector David Longe recalls:

I first properly met Sara at a memorable PCC meeting: "Well, David", she said, "we have to pay for the insurance you know"! Her strikingly practical approach to all things in the church was a Godsend. It helped focus on what was important.

Sara was part and parcel of life in these parishes. Her care of her grandchildren was exceptional - I recall seeing her taking them to do the veg plot, hose in hand. All her family, and we, will sorely miss this wonderful and special soul. She gave so much, and we are deeply privileged to have been able to walk with her during our lives.

Daily News (London) - Wednesday 7 January 1920 ROYAL FESTIVITIES. The King and Queen, Queen

Alexandra, Queen Maud of Norway, and the other members of the Royal Family, are spending a pleasant time at Sandringham. This afternoon Queen Alexandra received three of the pupils from the West Norfolk and King's Lynn High School and presented to them prizes which her Majesty annually awards for the most popular girl in the school. Owing to the war, the prizes in the last few years had not been personally presented, and therefore there were three awards to be taken. The girls were Olive Hitchcock, of King's Lynn; Dorothy Leeder, of Matlaske, Norfolk; and Mary Cross, of Heacham, Norfolk, the two latter being scholarship pupils. The prizes, which are awarded on the votes of the pupils of the school, consisted of handsomely-bound Bibles bearing inscriptions.

The astonishing turnaround in the fortunes of St Peter's Church, Corpusty (our cover picture), has been marked by the dedication of a commemorative stone (pictured below) in the beautifully renewed floor of the chancel. Yet the familiar sight of St Peter's standing guard over the villages below was nearly lost forever. After falling out of use

and becoming the target of vandals, it was only the unstinting efforts of the Friends of Friendless Churches, led by Roger Last and Lady Billa Harrod, that saved it from demolition.

Now in the hands of the Norfolk Churches Trust, the service of dedication, led by the Rector David Longe and dressed with flowers by Linda Joel, proved that St

Corpusty & Saxthorpe Summer Sizzle - August 31 2025

Our annual village event is again to feature the popular duck race along the overflow stream beside the village green. If you'd like a duck in the race, you can sponsor one at the regular Wednesday morning Coffee, Cake & Chat at St Andrews, or at any Village Hall event (fortnightly lunch, monthly Sunday breakfast or film night) - while ducks last! The minimum donation is just £1 but if you are able to offer more this helps with costs of next year's event and also a donation to both the Village Hall and St Andrews Church - last year £150 was donated to each.

Railings Restored

The metal railings that once lined Corpusty village green from its western end to Bloomfield House have been replaced by the parish council. The main aim is to improve safety, preventing children using the nearby play area from dashing on to the road. The railings have been positioned to allow parking to continue, while preventing this from spreading on to the green itself. The railings, which have self-closing gates near either end, are made of a type of steel that will not need painting.



Roof Repairs

Repairs to the roof of St Andrews have been extended from the south aisle to the southern side of the chancel, where one leak in particular proved hard to fix. The scaffolding was left in place to allow the specialist team more time to pin down the problem.

The Village Gardener - To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



Until a few days ago July's *To Plant a Garden* had had a very different look to it - all about the joy of July pottering about your garden gently dead-heading roses, tying in tomato plants and harvesting lovely fresh veg. However there appears to be a very testing and unwelcome visitor to our gardens. Especially in this area of Norfolk.

A few days ago we had been modestly very pleased with our garden this year, the beautifully sunny spring had meant everything has been glorious in the garden, the roses have especially enjoyed the high light levels and warmth and the recent rain had freshened up all the green foliage. However it was on our evening wander that we spotted a small area of damage on our box hedging. Because we have been worried about box blight for so long now we'd purposefully given up trimming our box, letting them grow into beautiful shapes that had been really

thriving. Our theory had been that box blight is more likely to strike when a plant is under stress/strain. So far our plan had held out, but on closer inspection we discovered several Box Moth caterpillars in the hedging. The Box Moth caterpillars are incredibly destructive and can literally strip a box plant of all its leaves in a matter of days and if they then turn their attentions to the bark of a box plant then there is a good chance the plant will die. Left unchecked the damage is rapid. The best thing to do is to carefully check your plants and to remove any caterpillars you find. A jam jar of warm water and a few drops of washing up liquid is one way of getting rid of them. The caterpillars tend to hide up in the centre of the plants during the day and then come out further in the evening to feed (so the evening is a good time to check for them). Check out the following website which is really useful www.ebts.org.

I have included images of both the Box Moth and the Box Moth caterpillar for reference. The Box Moth is quite striking in colouring/pattern, it's quite easy to identify but it's (sadly) more likely that you will notice the damage and caterpillars first.

We had hoped this patch of Norfolk might just escape but it's not to be. It should be possible to manage Box Moth but it is a lot of work to do so and there are only so many hours in the day, but we can but try!


Finally a big thank you to everyone who made it to the Open Gardens at Blickling Lodge, there was a good turnout despite the changeable weather and the garden looked glorious!

History Watch - Bale Oak



We use similes in our everyday conversations in order to emphasise a point - Hard as nails, Dead as a dodo, Blind as a bat, and so on.

But here's an old one a few may still recall: Big as Bale Oak. This was heard regularly by my generation even though the oak in question—which stood in the parish of Gunthorpe—had ceased to exist since 1860. But big it certainly was, and also ancient. By assessing its size experts consider it to be 1000 years old, ie back to the time of King Alfred. And its size was certainly prodigious. In circumference it measured 36 feet, and the largest branch was

almost as high as the nearby church tower. Its hollow trunk could contain twenty men standing up, and an enterprising cobbler had set up his workshop within the tree itself - so no business rates to pay I guess!

In 1790 an overzealous pollarding caused the tree's end. It never recovered and soon only a truncated portion remained. By 1860 it was considered dangerous and cut down and destroyed.

This demise did not go without notice though as a poet of the time penned the following in its memory:

"Here stand I all in disgrace,
Once the wonder of this place,
My head knocked off, my body dead,
And all the virtue of my limbs is fled,
'tis my fear that I should fright,
The travellers horse in the night,
So cut me down, it's my desire,
Commit me to the blazing fire,
And when you see me burn and smoke,
Say that's the end of old Bale Oak."

Lovely evergreen Holm Oaks now adorn the area, looked after by the National Trust. It's well worth a visit.


