A Feather on the breath of God...

This month the church remembers the life of the wonderfully named Hildegard of Bingen – her festival is on 17<sup>th</sup> September, the day she died in 1179. I first encountered her about 15 years ago, when a PhD student told me about his dissertation work. Since then, as so often happens, I have kept coming across references to her. I was intrigued to learn that this medieval woman born in Germany in 1098, who became an abbess in charge of a community of nuns, wrote poetry and set her poems to music, and also studied and wrote about natural history and medicine. Her community practised herbal medicine, as many medieval women did, without writing down their remedies – because of Hildegard we have insight into



their methods. She is thought to be the first to record the use of hops to preserve beer! She was also a philosopher and theologian; all her life Hildegard saw visions of God, which she recorded and illustrated. Accompanying all this learning and creativity, however, was much physical suffering: at times Hildegard suffered intense and incapacitating pain. It is perhaps partly because of this sense of lacking control over her life that she told this little story:

Listen: there was once a king sitting on his throne. Around him stood great and wonderfully beautiful columns ornamented with ivory, bearing the banners of the king with great honour. Then it pleased the king to raise a small feather from the ground and he commanded it to fly. The feather flew, not because of anything in itself, but because the air bore it along. Thus am I 'a feather on the breath of God'.

Hildegard is intriguing for her sheer breadth of interests and learning, where for us it seems the arts and the sciences are in two camps and you have to pick one or the other. Or even worse, where the sciences are seen as in some way opposed to God. This would have been a foreign notion to Hildegard who no doubt saw herself as exploring the workings of God's creation. September is a month always bound up for us with a sense of new beginnings, because of the 'back to school' atmosphere; perhaps Hildegard's life might inspire us to explore something new, to learn more about God's world. Though we should be prepared to be taken to surprising places beyond our imaginings if like her we see ourselves as 'feathers on the breath of God.'

#### **Better Bus Stops**

Bus users - including school children - may soon be enjoying better bus stops on the B1149 Aylsham Road, Saxthorpe. County Highways has proposed proper bus stops on either side of the road on the Aylsham side of the junction with The Street. A new footway in the verge from The Street would serve the new stops, including dropped kerbs where people need to cross. The plans have been backed by the Parish Council, which will consider whether a bus shelter can be provided on the north side. (The Council meets on 10 September.)

#### The Village Gardener - To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



September is possibly the most poignant month in the year, full of nostalgia yet of new beginnings as well. The gears in the garden significantly shift this month, gone is the rather ambling meander through August. September is all brand new pencil cases, fresh garden resolutions and renewed purpose. This month everything feels more resolute and with a mind to gathering in and making the most of any golden days we are given.

First up is some sowing! Now is a great time to set coriander and spinach both are prone to bolt in most of the summer months but not this month, whether it's the shorter days or the lower light levels a crop set this month should do well. Next up are winter lettuces, chicories and other winter leaves for the kitchen. Get those set now if you can, if you've not got the room then the guttering method works just as well this time of

year as it did in spring, you will thank yourself for it in the colder months. If ,like us ,your rocket salad leaves normally get decimated by flea beetle, again September is the answer! As apparently the said flea beetle isn't as prevalent this month. Yet more reasons to be grateful for September!

Next up is making the most of your harvest in the kitchen garden, the trick is to nurture what you've grown so you get the absolute best out of it, be it pumpkin and squashes if you place bricks, tiles or wood underneath them it just raises them enough off the ground so they don't rot. While you're at it also nip out the trailing growing tip so that the plant focuses all its energy on ripening

the fruits it's already started. In the greenhouse you can slow down the watering but keep the floor dampened down, and make sure you remove nearly all the leaves on your tomatoes so that all the plants energy goes again into ripening. Finally get yourself all set for the apple harvest, whether that's making the most of windfalls or getting wooden crates and a cool dry secure place for them to see you through the colder months, it looks to me like a bumper fruit harvest this year so enjoy

This month's question is from Clive Wood who asks if there anything to be done to prevent blossom end rot in his tomatoes. I wish there was Clive! We have been particularly badly hit this year too and we've been at a loss as well. I'm aware that erratic watering can be to blame but as we've been quite diligent I can only imagine it's our erratic summer that's not

#### History Watch - Early Potato Varieties

"Flowers is all right, but its 'taters that feeds you!" (Tony Hancock, Hancock's Half Hour)

Can't argue with that Tony, especially when you consider all those different ways that the humble spud can be served up to satisfy our appetite.

'Twas not always so. Until the Spaniards discovered potatoes in Peru, early in the sixteenth century, the population in Europe had to manage with alternatives, maybe turnips and swedes.

And when potatoes did get to England it was only the wealthy were able to enjoy them. As late as the mid 1800s there were no spuds on the menu for the poor inmates of our workhouses, cost being a factor presumably.




Early in the 1900s different varieties were cultivated and one of the first, and a favourite of mine was the King Edward. It was so named as it made its entry in 1902 at the start of the reign of King Edward VII. Distinguished by their pinkish markings on white skin, if any potato could be described as attractive then this one is it. And our local celebrity chef Delia Smith likes it so it must be good.

The next variety to appear in 1911 was The Majestic. This was a great favourite from

the 1920s to the 1990s due to its heavy yield, You would get a great forkful of Majestic's from each plant in your garden or allotment. Later however modern science took over plant breeding and even better and more disease resistant varieties appeared. And the one we all know of now is Maris Piper, a very versatile spud introduced in 1966 and now our most widely grown variety. Enjoy your potatoes in what ever form they are served up, and thank those Spanish conquistadors for discovering them 500 years ago.
