

Dear All

Is the Church now irrelevant? And what about this 106<sup>th</sup>?

Many argue that "the Church is outdated, clinging to a Bible full of disproven ideas." I disagree – the Bible is not a single book, but a library containing history, poetry, spirituality, prayer, and prophecy. It requires careful, contextual reading. At ordination, every priest promises to preach the Gospel afresh in each generation – demanding courage, creativity, and faithfulness.

Recent research from Bible Society suggests Gen Z (aged 16-24) may be more open to faith than we assume. Their 2024 report,



So, what about this "106th"? It refers to the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury, Dame Sarah Mullally, the first woman (after 105 men) to be appointed to this historic role. After nearly 10 months of discernment (longer than the Conclave!), her appointment was confirmed last month.

This is significant. The Church of England began ordaining women as priests in 1994, with the first female bishop in the Church of England, Libby Lane, consecrated in 2015. Dame Sarah's path to this role is remarkable. She began in nursing and became Chief Nursing Officer for England at age 37—earning her a Damehood. Ordained in 2001, she served in South London, became a cathedral canon, then Bishop of Crediton, and later the first female Bishop of London.

This is no token appointment. Bishop Sarah is widely respected for being pastoral, thoughtful, and spiritually grounded. Her new role is significant—not only for the Church of England but also for the global Anglican Communion, where many still oppose the ordination of women. The Archbishop of Canterbury is not only a national leader but also primus inter pares—first among equals—across the Anglican Communion (which is made up of 96+ million people).

She will need wisdom, grace, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit as she seeks unity amid division. There is, I believe, reassurance that she was appointed following a long season of prayerful discernment.

I believe future generations need a Church that faithfully proclaims the Gospel - the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Not a Church that blows with the wind, but one that is rooted in Scripture, shaped by prayer, and committed to the truth, justice and the glory of God.

Bishop Sarah's appointment shows the Church of England is capable of taking bold, hope-filled steps. Please keep her and her family in your prayers,

#### Remembrance at Matlaske Airfield

There will be a number of services at different churches

and sites throughout the Matlaske Benefice on Remembrance Sunday this year. One of them will be at the Memorial Stone at the site of the former Matlaske Airfield, which was operational throughout the Second World War. All are invited to attend, and to whet your appetite, below is some information on the site from Matlaske resident Colin Airey.



RAF MATLASKE During the years leading up to the Second World War, government developed its air policies significantly. The focus for building up military sites became the East of England. Coltishall, which had been planned as a bomber station, was passed over to Fighter Command in May 1940, and Matlaske was prepared as its satellite airfield. It was one of nearly forty new airfields that transformed the landscape of Norfolk during the early years of the war.

Matlaske was unusual in that it was a square airfield bounded by public roads on all sides. There were three short grass runways within a concrete perimeter road. None of the runways were concreted over: they were of grass, supported by wire netting, and suffered from frequent water-logging. For this reason, the airfield was never granted full independent operational status

and continued as a satellite station to Coltishall. Personnel were accommodated in buildings throughout the Barningham estate. The more fortunate ones, (officers) were billeted in Barningham Hall or Itteringham Mill.

None the less, when it was barely operational, in October 1940, the airfield was bombed and machine gunned by the Luftwaffe. There were casualties, but no fatalities. In the subsequent years it became very busy. Hurricanes and Spitfires flew from there and a full range of Fighter Command planes, mainly acting as bomber escorts.

Owing to the water-logging problems, the airfield was among the earliest of Norfolk airfields to be closed before being used as a Prisoner-of-War camp and then as a Displaced Persons camp. It then returned to use as arable land.

In 2011 the Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust erected a memorial stone, dedicated to all the units and personnel based there. Ten years on, in November 2021, with the permission of the current landowners, a service was held at the memorial stone, dedicated not only to those who had lost their lives flying from Matlaske Airfield, but also to the victims of both World Wars from the Parishes of Matlaske and Barningham Winter. That service is being repeated at two-year intervals - with this year's event marking the end of Second World War hostilities.

On this note, Mike Ray-Jones reports that a small but hard-working team spent an hour or two one Sunday in October, raking away cuttings from the wild areas in the Plumstead

an hour or two one Sunday in October, raking away cuttings from the wild areas in the Plumstead Churchyard. The areas had previously been scythed, then left awhile to allow flower seeds to drop.

Scything is better ecologically than using powered tools, since it gives small animals a chance to escape and survive. It also cuts the material long rather than chopping it up into small pieces; longer material is easier to rake up and remove, thus preventing nitrogen from returning to the soil and making it more suitable for grasses rather than wild flowers.

Once the job was done, the team was rewarded with coffee and Melissa's excellent rock buns.

# The Village Gardener - To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



As I write this, it is THE most glorious Autumnal day, it started well with a beautiful low mist and now it's all golden amber light, deep blue skies and the trees and hedgerows are full of colour. It is always a big adjustment in October when the clocks go back, I am reminded of my Grandad who was determined to have none of this nonsense of the clocks changing, he literally stuck to GMT all year round. I think the person I feel more for is my Nana who still had to get his lunch ready on time!

Back to now, I think its worth having a bit of a plan. I try and get in the habit of going around the garden at least once a day just to get a bit of daylight and it's always much nicer outside then you think it's going to be. Shorter days also means there is less time to get stuff outside done so it's good to make lists especially as there's always an unseen tipping point in November when the focus relentlessly switches to Christmas.

This month in our garden there will be a lot of hedge cutting, clearing and tidying, washing down outdoor furniture and storing well and generally putting away, flower pots etc. All worthy stuff but the nicest task in November is planting tulips. I don't think anyone ever regrets planting tulip bulbs they are always the most tremendous lift when they show up in April or May, it's worthwhile making a note of what works and what doesn't work in your garden, just recently I almost added to cart a tulip collection that I did try here a few years ago, they were a beautiful collection but they are too dark for our garden. Instead I've ordered a collection that has brighter colours.

This month I will also be keeping an eye on the dropping temperatures and the dahlias. This year I am following Sarah Ravens advice and mulching in a mound over each plant. I am also making a note of the dahlias as my plan is to dig up any that don't work (next spring) and move them on. Top dahlias in my flower patch this year have been Sweet Sante, Le Baron and Schippers Bronze - the last is a joy, a really prolific and hard-working dahlia, good for bees and stands well as a cut flower and it also works well with a multitude of other colours, a total win!
