After twenty-seven years of contributing to the Church & Village News in a variety of roles, Corinne is stepping back at the end of this year.

Born in Felixstowe, Corinne spent most of her childhood in London. Having completed a secretarial course, she went to work for the BBC at Broadcasting House in 1963 – working in the radio sports department for amongst others Harold Abrahams who became a sports commentator and journalist once his athletics career ended. In 1967 Corinne married Richard, who she met playing golf at Sheringham, and moved to Baconsthorpe. She continued to work for the BBC in Norwich in the television outside broadcasting unit for the agricultural department until she had children.

In 1994, during an interregnum, Corinne became editor and printer of the newsletter. Until this point the newsletter had been an A4 sheet, put in with the newspapers, listing church services.

With a grant, she bought a second hand photocopier and produced a booklet style newsletter with a correspondent in each village providing their village news. She and Richard would then print off the booklets and deliver them to the village correspondents who would deliver them to every house – not just those that took a daily paper. After five years Corinne handed over the printing and editing and became a village correspondent and treasurer.

When the five parishes became seven in 2015, Saxthorpe and Edgefield already had a newsletter printed at Barnwells in Aylsham so when the newsletters combined Barnwells continued to print them. In the previous twenty-one years three photocopiers had worked hard to produce the newsletter.

From its humble beginnings in 1994 Corinne has seen the Church & Village News go from a black and white, photocopied booklet with a team of six volunteers to a colour, professionally printed magazine with a team of more than fifty volunteers.

Corinne is handing over the Baconsthorpe baton to Hazel Martin who will gather all the village news and distribute the newsletters to those who deliver them.

Corinne will continue to be the chief marmalade maker for the Baconsthorpe Church Stall and the rector's administrator.

# Letter from the Rector - Reverend Canon David Longe 577252 / 07881 950294 / rector@matlaske.org.uk

Dear All

The US Catholic activist Dorothy Day once visited a school and challenged the pupils, by saying that she kept two coats in her wardrobe, one to wear and another to give to the poor.

As the magazine bearing this letter drops on your door mat, Advent will have just begun. All over the world schools and churches will be readying for speaking about the nativity, a story which begins with a heavily pregnant woman



travelling uncomfortably on a donkey at night with an anxious husband looking for a place to stay. Inn after inn turns the couple away; finally a stable is given as shelter. This 2000-year-old story will be re-told in a myriad of different languages, in songs, in plays, through scripture, in cartoons, in films and through advent calendars.

The start of the Christmas story is about the rejection of a family in need. It is about keeping them outside, away from warmth and security. (It alludes to how Jesus is abandoned by his friends and rejected by society when on the cross.)

The Holy Family's plight and Dorothy Day's anecdote, reminds us how many there are without shelter this Christmas, from those suffering on the Polish border, to the 1000s suffering in Afghanistan and those forced to live on the streets and under bridges in our streets and cities in this country.

The power and message of the story is that it resonates with so much of what we witness in the world, in our lives and in the lives of our neighbours. God is not revealed in a palace with silk sheets, but revealed in the infant Jesus in a manger warmed by straw and the love of two rejected travellers – Mary and Joseph. A story echoed today in the refugee camps around the world.

Maybe we would prefer to ignore this part of the story— after all it does not tie up with the tinsel image of Christmas, yet reflecting and pondering on Jesus' birth—the birth of the Prince of Peace—has poured hope and faith into the hearts of many, inspiring generous acts of love to those in need.

The mystery of the story teaches us that God is with us. That God is with those on the outside; those who are cold, isolated and rejected; and that each time we respond to their needs, we respond to Christ himself. For with every welcoming gesture, every gift given, we are brought closer to reflecting the love that God reveals to us through the incarnation of Jesus into this world.

I pray that you all may have a wonderful Christmas filled with the love of God, inspiring us all into acts of generosity - of keeping a second coat for those in need. It is, I believe, through our acts of love, that we will experience the joy, the peace, and the hope that Christ brings to the world.

# **David Wooff**

David passed away peacefully at the Norfolk & Norwich Hospital on 10th November. He was a fine servant and leader of the local community, whose contribution will not quickly be forgotten. Pauline and David retired to Norfolk after spending many happy holidays here, and he soon offered his talents to help his neighbours. One of his first tasks was to help create the village sign, which has been a boon to many a lost motorist! He became treasurer and fabric officer of the parish church, very practical roles for a keen scholar of theology – but ones that he fulfilled efficiently. He established the Church Building Trust, which made several vital but neglected repairs - the heating being perhaps the most important! He also chaired the PCC for a while.

David was a friend and support to the ever-changing clergy. For many years he was a leading organiser of the village fete, a job he enjoyed and in which he certainly achieved much. 'He was a wonderful man, says one person in the village. 'So kind and welcoming,' says another. There are so many complimentary memories. He was a true Christian, an excellent communicator, a man who mixed with all, a thoughtful man who got things done, quietly efficient, very energetic in the church bike ride, a trusty custodian of our ancient church, a friend to all, loved and respected. Of course, he will be deeply missed by Pauline and Ingrid (who were with him at the end), and by all his friends and relatives, but this writer is sure that David is still very busy in the Church Triumphant.

Pauline and Ingrid would like to thank everyone for the kind and very moving letters and cards which they have received, paying tribute to David, as well as giving support to themselves. David's funeral will take place at St Peter's, Matlaske, at 2 pm on 7<sup>th</sup> December.

# Remembrance Sunday

The airfield at Matlaske was constructed during 1940, one of nearly forty airfields that transformed the landscape of Norfolk during the early years of the Second World War. It was constructed according to a standard plan - three intersecting runways with a concrete perimeter road. The entrance with the control tower was near Matlaske gap. Personnel were accommodated in Nissen huts in the vicinity of the airfield or, the more fortunate ones, in Barningham Hall or Itteringham Mill. It was not a large airfield. Its runways were not concreted over: they were of grass, supported by rubberised wire netting. It suffered from frequent water-logging and there were problems with flooding in bad weather.

For these reasons, RAF Matlaske was not given full independent operational status and acted, within Fighter Command, as a satellite station to the major Airfield at Coltishall. None the less, when it was barely operational, the airfield was bombed by the Luftwaffe twice in late 1940/early 1941.

In the subsequent years it became a very busy wartime airfield. Not only Hurricanes and Spitfires flew from there but also a full range of Fighter Command planes, mainly acting as Bomber escorts. Two major users of the airfield were Squadron 137 (Whirlwinds) and Squadron 56 (Typhoons).

When the airfield was closed down in 1946, the site was used as a Prisoner of War and then a Displaced Persons camp. It then returned to its pre-war status as farmed arable land. Several of the airfield buildings survived in a ruinous state for decades but were eventually demolished before the end of the century.

In 2011 the Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust (ABCT) erected on the site a memorial stone, dedicated to all the units and personnel based there.



Ten years on, on Sunday November 14th 2021, by kind permission of the current owners of the land, T and J H Neill, a service was held in the open at the airfield site, dedicated not only to those who had lost their lives flying from Matlaske Airfield but also to the victims of both World Wars who had been residents of the Parishes of Matlaske and Barningham Winter.

The service was conducted on behalf of Revd David Longe, by Mr Duncan Wood, Church Warden of St Peter's Matlaske. It was attended by about 15-20 local residents. The names of the fallen from both parishes and both World Wars as well as those who lost their lives flying from RAF Matlaske were read out by Mr Wood. Ms Karen Neill laid a wreath at the Memorial and led the singing of the hymns. The service concluded with the National Anthem played on the horn by young Artie Longe with the congregation singing in accompaniment.

# History Watch - North Norfolk Home Guard Arthur Pentney



The BBC TV programme *Dad's Army* although humorous in itself does the real Home Guard of 1940 – 1944 no favours. There were no ancient dodderers like Jones, Frazer and Godfrey here – our local platoons comprised much younger men, exempt from military service due to reserved occupations, mainly farm labourers. These chaps would have been fit due to the daily physical nature of their work, and once properly trained, armed, and defending their own villages would have given a good account of themselves in the expected German invasion of 1940 when Britain stood alone.

As a youngster, I recall my father in uniform returning home after Home Guard duties, 'cheese cutter' cap on head, and hanging his sten gun up on a hook on the wall. The Baconsthorpe section met in The Jolly Farmers, a more convivial location I suspect than either the village school or reading room! On one occasion my mother was horrified to learn that the late publican, Arthur "Brew" Burton was lying in his coffin in the same room as where the section was meeting, to which father retorted, "He ent goin' to do us no harm, is he?"

The Home Guard's main attack weapon was the spigot mortar, a nasty looking piece of kit which was attached to – yes – a spigot, fixed into a circular construction of concrete. About four feet in diameter and four feet high, sunk into the ground, these were strategically placed and quite common. One was located in the corner of the playground at Baconsthorpe, now sadly covered over.

With the threat of invasion receding, the Home Guard were put on more prosaic tasks to relieve the regular army, such as night patrols and guard duties. The organisation was kept in place until late 1944, when it was finally disbanded. A useful outfit, I feel, which did not deserve the *Dad's Army* moniker given to it.

I am very grateful to Robin and Linda West for the photograph: taken at the putting green in Sheringham, it shows about seventy Home Guard personnel from our local villages, 'cheese cutter' caps much in evidence.





# The Village Gardener

To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow



Ah, December... the old adages really are true... time is flying! I found myself bemoaning the wall to wall festive ads as being far too early this year, then realised with a start that Christmas is literally just round the corner. This year we will be reusing last year's small Christmas tree – we set it out in good time in the New Year, ensured it wasn't too crowded so any re-growth is even and happy... fingers crossed we will repeat the exercise. If you have got the space I would highly recommend it - every little bit helps, I feel. The trick is to position the tree (when it's inside) in a coolish spot away from radiators in the hope it won't become dehydrated too quickly as the tree will (in a bid to save itself) drop all its needles to conserve moisture, so do also use the largest pot size possible and water well... good luck!

Now off outside! Always lots of clearing and sorting to be done this time of year. Once the majority of the leaves are down, it's a good plan to clear any ponds you might have of the decaying leaves especially if you have fish as they can affect the water quality. Over to the veg plot... a nice task for Boxing day (if you're already feeling a bit Bah Humbug) is to set some onion seeds. The joy of growing onions from seed is the sheer variety. Whilst onion sets have their role it is rather nice to stray off the path a bit and grow such joys as Long red Florence or Keraval Pink, there is also the added bonus of knowing that something you set in the darkest days of mid-winter will come into its own in mid-summer. If you're still desperate to get outside over the festive season, then take a moment to see if you need to put down any new paths... giveaway signs are super worn/muddy areas in your garden, when only the bare bones of your garden is on show over the winter, then it's easier to see how it's working as a whole... so to speak.

Finally, a task whilst in an armchair by the fire! Do take the time to make sure you have ordered any seeds you need for an early kick-off in January (the ones that really struggle to reach productive maturity if they don't have a long enough growing season). By this I mean aubergines, chillies and peppers, which will also need a heated propagator or a nice cosy windowsill.

This month's question is from Jane Ellis, who says that whilst she really loves hellebores (Christmas Roses) and buys a new plant every year, she has never had much success with them. The trick with hellebores is location, location, location! It's unlikely to be an issue with the plants themselves, however where you site them can be a problem. Whilst hellebores tolerate shade, they do not like being either too dry or too damp, meaning they just won't thrive, so I would suggest a different position that is just so... Good Luck!
